

*Brussels, Novemb. 3.* The Troops that lay near *Deynse* under the Command of the Count de *Thian*, are separated, and marched to their Quarters, and he is gone to take possession of the Government of *Audenarde*, which the Elector of *Bavaria* has lately conferred upon him. The Officer who commands the Fusiliers appointed for the Guard of the Forest of *Seignies*, has obtained an Order from his Electoral Highness to fortifie *Waterloo*, for the better security of his Men, and they have accordingly begun to cut Pallisadoes for that service. The Elector of *Cologne* continues at *Liege*, where he was Received with great Demonstrations of Joy; He intends to return hither against the arrival of the Electors of *Bavaria*.

*Dublin, October 28.* Their Majesties Ships the *Pearle*, and the *Dover-Prize*, sailed hence last Friday with the Ships under their Convoy, the first for *Milford*, and the other for *Kinsale*. The *Elizabeth of Bristol* arrived the 22d at *Corke* from *Antegoa*.

*Newcastle, October 30.* On Saturday failed from hence above 100 Sail of Laden Colliers to the Southward, and the same day came in a Fleet of Light Colliers.

*Hilmonth, Nov. 1.* Their Majesties Ships the *Kings-Esther* and *Coronation* arrived here this day, with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy from *Virginia*.

*Whitehall, November 4.* This Evening came in the Dutch Mail of Tuesday last, and brought the following Advices.

*Turin, Oct. 25. N. S.* Our Troops are marched to their Winter Quarters; The Duke of *Savoy* is treating with some Officers who are to raise foreign Regiments against *Spring*. The French Troops are cantoned in the Valleys of *Pragelas* and *La Perouse*.

*Venice, Oct. 26. N. S.* The Senate has received advice, that their Forces have made themselves Masters of the whole Island of *Scio*, and that the Fleet was afterwards sailed towards *Tenedos*, which they hoped to be likewise possessed of in few days, the Turks having no Troops there to oppose them.

*Vienna, Oct. 27.* On Sunday last arrived here a Gentleman dispatched by the King of *Poland*, to acquaint the Emperor with the great Victory his Forces had obtained over the Turks and *Tatars*; The particulars we yet know are as follow. The Crown General *Jablenski*, and the *Sieur Sapiha* General of *Lithuania*, being informed that the Turks and *Tatars*, making together above 40000 Men, under the command of *Sultan Shaban Gey*, were upon their march to conduct a great Convoy of Provisions to *Carnieie*, they made a show of retreating, as if they had not thought themselves strong enough to engage the Enemy, but afterwards changing their march, they passed the *Niefter* about two Leagues from *Carnieie*, and attacked the Enemy with great Courage and Bravery; The Fight lasted several hours with almost equal advantage on both sides, but towards evening it began to incline to the Poleys, who thereupon pressing upon the Enemy with new vigor, soon after put them to flight: Of the Enemy above 5000 are said to be killed, as many made Prisoners, and between 4 and 5000 Wagons taken, drawn by 6 Oxen each, and laden with Ammunition, Provisions, and Ammunition, for the Garrison of *Carnieie*.

We have advice from *Turkey* by the way of *Belgrade* and *Transylvania*, that the *Venerians* have taken the *Castle of Scio* after a Siege of 16 days. The Grand Visier was according to the last Letters from *Hungary* still encamped with part of his Forces near *Belgrade*; the rest being gone into their Winter Quarters. The Imperial Army continued near *Futacke*.

*Francfort, Nov. 3.* The Forces on the *Rhine* are gone into their Winter Quarters, the Saxons continue their march homeward.

*Paris, Nov. 5. N. S.* 'Tis confirmed by the last Letters from *Toulon*, that the French Fleet was returned into that Port; That they had begun to disarm all the Ships except 6, who are to cruise during the Winter; and that the Seamen of the *Western Provinces* are to march back by Land to *Brest*. The great Ship that was missing, being separated from the Fleet in a Storm, is arrived at *Toulon*, having lost all her Masts; and was in great danger, when a French Privateer came very opportunely to her assistance; she had on board a whole Battalion. The *Marschal de Boufflers* is arrived from *Blanders*, the *Marschal de Lorge* will be here to morrow, and the *Marschals de Tourville* and *de Noailles* are daily expected. The last Letters they have received at this time from *Constantinople* give an account, that the Grand Signior was very ill; and 'twas believed he would hardly recover; and that the *Serap* had on the 4th would succeed him.

*Brussels, Nov. 7.* The Electors of *Bavaria* is expected here till towards *Christmas*. The *Granles*, Governor of the *Citadel* of

*Ghent*, is made General of the Artillery in this Country.

*Off. 30. Hague, Nov. 9.* The Wind coming Easterly last night, the King went from hence at 3 this morning, in order to embark for *England*, but by that time His Majesty was arrived at the *Oranie Polder*, the Wind changed again to the West, and in the Evening His Majesty returned hither.
