Vaice, Off. 29. The taking of the Island of Sciois confirmed from all parts, and we are now rold these puticulars. The Garison in the Castle, which was composed of 4000 Men, capitulated the 16th of the last month, be the place was surrendred the next day: The Turkish Soldiers were transported to Sm rna, and 1500 Christian Slaves were released. The Venetims took some days before 3 Turkish Galleys, who were going with Succors to Scio. On the 18th the Auxiliary Galleys left the Fleet, and returned homeward, the Captain General having made rich Presents to the principal Officers for their good ferrices in the taking of Scie, which is looked upon here as a fuccefs of the greatest consequence to our Affairs, seeing the Turks, by our being Masters of badvantageous a Port in the Archipelago, are in great danger to be cut off from the supplies of Provisions which they used to receive from Egypt, and other parts by Sea, and without which the City of Constantinople can hardly subsist. The last Letters from Dalmatiz inform us, that the Enemy were drawn together again on that Frontier, to the number of 9 or 10000 Men, and that their design seemed to be to attack Ciclut, having with them several Pieces of Cannon and two Mortars, and that General Delfino had likewise assembled the lesces of this State to oppose them.

Warfaw, October 20. The King of Poland re-ceived fome days ago an Express from the Crown General, which was dispatched on the 6th Instant from his Camp at Kudrine, and brought this account. On the 4th Instant we received advice, rhat a Body of Turks, whereof about 1000 were Janisaries, had joined near the River Niester with 30000 Tartars, in order to conduct a great Convoy of Provisions to Caminice, and to change the Garison of that place; whereupon a Council of War was held; and on the 5th the Sieur Jable. nowski, General of the Forces of Politind; advanced towards the Neifter with his Cavalky, Dragoons, and the choice of his Foot, and 18 Pieces of Cannon; The Sieur Sapiha, who was encamped at some distance from us, joined us in our march with the Forces of Lithuania, and 12 Pieces of Cannon. The 6th a Detachement swam over the Niester and posted the melius on the other odes. the Niefter, and posted themselves on the other side; The Enemy having notice of it, a strong Party came and attack'd them, but our Troops maintained their ground, and gave opportunity to the rest of the Army to pass the River; and the Engl my seeing this, retired to their Camp, which was not far from thence. Our Troops having put themselves in order of Battle marched on, and actack'd the Enemies main Body; The Fight lasted 8 hours, and at last the Turks and Tartars were put to flight, several thousands of them being killed upon the place, and many Prisoners taken, with about 4000 Wagons laden with Rice, Oyl, and other Provisions, Arms, Ammunition, Cloarhs, Money, and all manner of Necessaries for the Garison of Caminice. The night coming on him dered our pursuit, otherwise the flaughter of the Enemy would have been much greater. Their Troops are since dispersed, and there is a great contusion among them; and in all probability this defeat will be followed by the loss of Caminiee, which is not now in a condition to hold out this Winter. The Baron de Seller, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, arrived here yesterday, and presented to the Princess of Peland the Jewels and other rich Presents that are sent her by the Elector.
