Whitehall, November 12.

THE Parliament met this day at Westminster, whither His Majesty went, attended with the usual Solemnity, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne in the House of Peers, His Majesty made a most Gracious Speech to Both Houses of Parliament; which follows.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Am Glad to Meet you here, when I can say, Our Affairs are in a better Posture both by Sea and Land, than when We parted last.

The Enemy has not been in a Condition to Oppose Our Fleet in these Seas, and Our Judging so great a Force into the Mediterranean, has Disappointed their Designs, and leaves Us a Prospect of further Success.

With Respect to the War by Land, I think I may say, That this Year a Stop has been put to the Progress of the French Arms.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have had so much Experience of your good Affection to Me, and of your Zeal for the Publick, that I cannot doubt of your Assistance at this time; I do therefore earnestly Recommend to you, to Provide such Supplies, as may Enable Me to prosecute the War with Vigour; which is the only Means to procure Peace to Christendom, with the Safety and Honour of England.

I must likewise put you in mind, That the Act of Tonnage and Poundage Expires at Christmas; and I hope you will think fit to continue that Revenue to the Crown, which is the more necessary at this time, in regard the several Branches of the Revenue are under great Anticipations, for extraordinary Expences of the War, and subject to many Demands upon other Accounts.

I cannot but Mention to you again, the Debt for the Transport Ships employed in the Reducing of Ireland, which is a Case of Compassion, and deserves Relief.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I should be glad you would take into your Consideration the Preparing some good Bill for the Encouragement of our Seamen: You cannot but be Sensible, how much a Law of this Nature would tend to the Advancement of Trade, and of the Naval Strength of the Kingdom, which is Our great Interest, and ought to be Our principal Care.

Leghorne, Nov. 1. Yesterday arrived here a Vessel in 24 hours from Toulon, and brings advice, that the French Fleet was returned into that Port, and all the Ships were disarming, many of which had received considerable damage in the Storm they met with as they came back from the Coast of Catalonia. This day arrived here the Carmarthen Galley, Capt. Jones Commander, from England, who

in his passage from Alicant took a French Bark laden with Corn from Barbary, and bound to Mar-

seille. **Turin, Nov. 6.** The Duke of Savoy went from hence the 28th of the last month to view the Garrisons of Coni and Demont. The night following a Fire happened here, which burnt some Houses, with a Magazine of Hay. Our Troops are all in their Winter Quarters, of which about 18000 are lodged in Piedmont. Prince Eugene of Savoy will part from hence in few days for Vienna. The Count de Palsi, one of the General Officers that commanded the German Troops in these parts, is lately dead at Milan. The Spaniards are resolved to continue the Blockade of Casal this Winter; and talk of besieging it in the Spring. We have an account this day, that the French Forces which remained about Diblom, separated on Wednesday last, and that they have begun to repass the Mountains. The Mareschal de Catinat took lately a Review of them, and found them very much weakened by Sickness and Desertion; He is expected in a day or two at Pignerol, and after having visited that Garrison, will return to France.

Venice, Nov. 8. The Senate have received Letters from the Captain General Zeno of the first of October, containing the Particulars of the taking of Scio, which are in substance the same you have already had an account of; only they add, That by the Capitulation made with the Garison, 'twas agreed that the Castle should be surrendered within 3 days after signing of the Articles; That one of the Gates should be immediately delivered up; That the Garison should be permitted to Embark with their Arms and Baggage, and should be Conducted to Smirna; That they should leave behind them all the Cannon and Ammunition; as also all the Jews and Renagadoes; That all the Christian Slaves, both Men and Women, should be released; and, that the Turkish Gallies which were then in the Ports of that Island, should remain in the Power of the Venetians. This Capitulation was executed accordingly. Our Troops found in the Castle 150 Pieces of Brass Cannon, and 50 of Iron; and most of the Christians who obtained their Liberty took service in our Troops. We hear from Dalmatia, that the Turks after having made several fruitless Attempts upon Cicalut, drew off the 21th of the last month, and were marching back to their Quarters.

Vienna, Nov. 6. The States of Hungary, who were lately assembled at Buda to regulate the Winter Quarters and Subsistence of the Imperial Troops, have finished that Matter, and are separated again. General Caprara and the Count de Heydrheim are shortly expected here; In the mean time the Council of War has had several Meetings to order the Recruits for the next year. The last

Advices from the Frontiers inform us, that the Grand Visier was returned to *Adrianople*, his Forces being all gone into their Winter Quarters. General *Veterani* was on the 15th of the last Month still posted on the Frontiers of *Valachia*. We are told that he is sent for to Court to give the Emperor a particular Account of the state of Affairs in *Transylvania*, where he has for several years had the chief Command of the Emperors Forces.

Francfort, Nov. 13. The Forces that acted on the *Rhine* this Summer are all in their Winter Quarters. The Count *de Hobenlo*, the Imperial Minister, has had several Conferences with the Deputies of *Franconia* and *Suabia*, as well about the Subsistence of the Confederate Forces during the Winter, as the Preparations to be made for the next year.

Paris, Nov. 16. They continue to disarm the Men of War at *Toulon*. The *Marschal de Noailles* is arrived here from *Catalonia*, where *Monsieur de Sr. Silvestre* is to Command in his absence. The last Letters from *Pignerol* say, that the French Troops were marched to their Winter Quarters. The Duke *de Verulam* is gone to *Marseilles* to take possession of the Office of General of the Gallies. The Price of Corn rises still; and Money grows scarcer every day. Some Persons who advanced 3 Millions this last Summer to provide Provisions for the Army, have not yet received more than the tenth part of what is due to them; though they have long and very earnestly solicited the payment of the whole. The French King continues to be very much troubled with the Gout.

Brussels, Nov. 17. The last Letters from the Court of *Poland* tell us, that the Electors of *Bavaria* would begin her Journey hither on the 3d of this month. The Count *de Bergeyck*, who went lately to the *Hague*, returned to this place two days ago. They write from *Namur*, that the French had prepared 2000 Tickets to be given in payment to the Tradersmen and Innkeepers of that City, for what the Soldiers shall have need of, which are to be repaid in the Spring by the Officers of the French King's Revenue; which has extremely discontented the Inhabitants there. We have at present a very strong Garrison in this place, which is to remain here during the Winter.

Hague, Nov. 19. N. S. The Count *de Camnitz*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, assisted yesterday at the Congress of the Allies; and will have his Audience of the States-General the next week. The Prince *de Vaudemont* parted from hence last night for *Brussels*. The States of *Holland* are Adjourned to the 24th of this month.

Pembroke, Nov. 9. On Tuesday last came into our Harbour the *Gift* of and for *Bristol* from *Barbadoes*; she came from thence in *August* last under Convoy of Their Majesties Ships the *Tyger* and *Mermaid*, in company of divers other Merchant Ships, from whom she was separated the 3d of *October*.

Falmouth, Nov. 8. Yesterday came in here two *Guernsey* Privateers, one of 14, and the other of 10 Guns, commanded by Captain *Pollet* and Captain *Tupper*, who brought in with them a French Ship bound from *Dunkirk* to *Nantz*, carrying 8 Guns and 20 Men.

Newcastle, Nov. 10. On Friday last arrived here an English Merchant Ship bound home from *Russia*.

Plymouth, Nov. 11. There are now coming into this Port the *Charles the Second* and the *Sampson* from the *East-Indies*, and a Ship from *Virginia*, with two of our Cruisers.

Plymouth, Nov. 12. Their Majesties Ship the *Assistance*, Capt. *Littleton* Commander; and the *Anglesey*, are come in here, and with them the *Charles the Second*, Captain *Dorvil* Commander, and the *Sampson*, Capt. *Brunhill*, both from the *East-Indies*, but last from the *Barbadoes*; whence they came with two other *East-India* Ships and the *Barbadoes* Convoy; from whom they were separated about a month ago. Captain *Littleton* came up with them on the 3d Instant about 34 Leagues S. W. by W. from *Scilly*; and on the 6th with the *Bird Pink* from *Virginia*, which is likewise arrived in this Port.

Whitchhall, Nov. 12. This Morning the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of *Lou-*

don, in their due Formalities, attended the King at *Whitchhall*; where the Recorder, in the Name of the City, did Congratulate His Majesty's Happy and Safe Return, and the Prosperous State of His Majesties Affairs both by Sea and Land; with Heartly and Affectionate Wishes for the full Accomplishment of all His Majesties Glorious Undertakings, for the Honour and Welfare of His own Kingdoms, and for the Peace of Christendom; which His Majesty was pleased to Accept very Graciously. And as a Mark of his Royal Favour, was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Sir *John Sweetapple*, and Sir *William Cole*, the present Sheriffs.

After which they Attended the Queen at *Exington* with like Congratulatory for His Majesties safe Arrival, and with great Expressions of Thanks to Her Majesty for Her Wife and prosperous Administration of the Government during His Majesties Absence, to the Honour of these Kingdoms, and the Entire Satisfaction of all Their Majesties good and faithful Subjects.
