Rome, October 30.

THE Duke d'Erce, Captain General of the Popes Forces, is gone to *Bolonia* and *Ferrara*, with full power to act as he shall judge necessary for the security of those Frontiers. The Duke of Savoy's Minister at this Court continues his Instances to have the Decree of the Inquisition against the Vaudois revoked, but hitherto has not been able to obtain it; and the French Cardinals do all they can to oppose him. The Pope has not yet declared himself about the promotion of Cardinals that has been so long and impatiently expected by those who hope to have a share in it. We hear that the Popes Gallies are arrived at *Gallipoli* in their return from the *Levant*.

Venice, Nov. 6. The news of the Enemies having raised the Siege of *Ciclat* in *Dalmatia*, comes by Letters from thence of the 21st past; which tells these Particulars. The Turks appeared (a second time) before that place the 17th of *October*, in number about 16000 Soldiers, Horse and Foot, and 6000 Pioneers, commanded by four Bassa's. The same day they raised a Battery of 7 Pieces of Cannon, and another of two Mortars, and in the Evening attack'd some of our Outworks, but were beaten off by those that had the guard of them. The night following the Enemy opened their Trenches. The 18th they fired all day from their Batteries; and gave another assault to our Outworks, but with no better success than they had in the former. The 20th the Besieged made a Sally with 250 Men, and beat the Enemy from some of their Works, which they demolished, and then retired; Another Party of our Men forced the Turks from a very advantageous post, where was a Well to supply their Troops with Water, the loss whereof did very much inconvenience them: And we had Advice about the same time, that General *Delfino* was coming to our Relief with the Forces under his command: All which so discouraged the Enemy, that they marched away this morning, leaving behind them a good quantity of Provisions, and some of their Baggage.

Turin, Nov. 8. The Duke of Savoy is returned hither from visiting the Garrisons of *Coni* and *Dumont*: The German Troops that remained about *Chivas* are marched to their Winter Quarters. Prince *Eugene* of Savoy is gone post to *Milan*, upon the news of the death of Count *Palfi*; and from thence designs to go on to *Vienna*. The Spaniards have posted their Troops about *Cornal*, in order to block up that place during the Winter, in the same manner they did the last. The French Forces are separated, and they have sent most of their Cannon to *Pignerol*; where the Marechal de *Catinat* is shortly expected, to take a Review of that Garrison, and after that he will return to *Paris*.

Cadix, October 18. The 14th Instant arrived in this Bay the Fleet of Victuallers and other Merchant Ships, both English and Dutch; with their Convoys, in 21 days from *Spithead*. The same day came in 6 English Men of War with divers Tenders from the Fleet; as the Spanish Men of War did on the 16th. And on the 17th Admiral *Russell*, with the whole English and Dutch Fleet, Anchored in this Bay. And we are told that the Admiral intends to go out again, and to cruise near the *Streights* mouth according to the account he shall receive of the motions of the Enemies Fleet; which by our last advice had appeared on the Coast of *Catalonia*, but was again retired from thence.

Vienna, Nov. 10. We have yet no certain advice of the Grand Vissiers departure from *Belgrade*; But 'tis confirmed from all hands, that the Tartars are gone home, and the Turkish Troops marched to their Quarters, and that they lost above 16000 Men the last Campagne. The Turks have put a new supply of Provisions into *Temeswaer*, which was conducted thither by 4000 Men; They intend likewise to furnish the Garrison of *Gyula* with Necessaries for their subsistence during the Winter, but have not yet found an opportunity to effect it. General *Caprara* and the Count *de Heyderheim* are on their way hither from *Hungary*; where the Imperial Forces are all in their Winter Quarters. Orders have been sent to the Officers to recruit their Troops with all possible expedition; and it's said that the Hereditary Countreys will likewise raise a certain number of Men (as they did the last year) for the service of the next Campagne.

Francfort, Nov. 17. The Deputies of the Neighbouring States are now assembled here, finally to adjust all Matters about the Winter Quarters for the Confederate Troops that made the last Campagne on the *Upper-Rhine*; and so soon as this is done, it's believed Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* will begin his Journey to *Vienna*. The French are laying up Magazines at *Neustadt* and *Landau*, and do greatly oppress the Country People, within their power, by exacting from them great quantities of Corn and Hay for that service.

Cologne, Nov. 19. The Lord *Lexington*, Envoy Extraordinary from Their Majesties of Great Britain to the Emperor, went from hence yesterday towards *Vienna*. The States of *Bonne* have granted the Elector of *Cologne* the Supply he demanded, and his Electoral Highness has thereupon given out Commissions for raising four new Regiments.

Hamburg, Nov. 19. The last Letters from the Court of *Poland* tell us, that the Electors of *Bavaria* would begin her Journey for *Flanders* on the 3^d of this month: That the Forces of that Crown were gone into their Winter Quarters; and that their General was returned to *Warsaw*. They

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tell us from *Copenhagen* of the 16th Instant, that they had Advice of Sir *Cloudefly Skovell's* arrival at *Gottenburg* with the Squadron under his command.

Paris, Nov. 19. The *Mareschal de Tourville* is on his way hither from *Toulon*; where they continue to disarm all the Men of War; The Seamen belonging to the Western Provinces are sent to *Brest* and *Port-Louis* by the Canal of *Languedoc*. The French Court is much alarmed at the taking of *Scio*, which, together with the other losses the Turks have suffered the last Campagne, they apprehend will dispose them to make a Peace with the Emperor and his Allies; upon which occasion several Expresses have been of late dispatched to our Ambassador at *Constantinople*, with directions to employ his utmost endeavours to hinder it, and in order thereunto to amuse the Turkish Ministers (as he has hitherto done) with the Promises of giving the Enemy a great Diversion the next year. Several Edicts are come out for raising of Money, but they not being sufficient to produce the Fonds that are wanting, it is now in agitation to raise a Tax by a Poll. They write from *Dan-kirke*, that Capt. *Du Bart* failed from thence the 13th to the Northward, to convoy home divers Merchant Ships that are coming with Corn from *Dantzicke*.

Brussels, Nov. 21. The Elector of *Bavaria* has given the Office of Great Bayliff of the *Walloon-Brabant*, vacant by the death of the Count de *Dongelberg*, to the Baron d'*Isire* one of the Deputies in the States of *Brabant*. All the Advices from the French Conquests assure us, that the People there are grievously burthened by the new Taxes and Impostions that are daily invented, and laid upon them by the French Kings order; which occasions great Complaints and Uneasiness among them. We have Advice, that *Du Bart* passed by *Offend* the 13th Instant with 5 or 6 Ships, taking their course to the Northward.

Hague, Nov. 23. N. S. The Duke of *Holstein-Ploen* has been at *Huy* to view that Garrison, and the new Fortifications that are making there, and is returned from thence to *Maeftrecht*. The Deputies of the Admiralties, who have had several Conferences with those of the States, about our Maritime Affairs, are gone home again. The Spanish Envoy, Don *Francisco de Quiros*, parted from hence the 20th Instant for *Brussels*, from whence he will return hither in 8 or 10 days. The last Letters from *Venice* tell us, that their Forces had taken at *Scio* 236 Pieces of Cannon, 3 Gallies, 26 Saicks, with divers other Vessels, and a great quantity of Ammunition; and that 6000 Turks were transported from thence to *Smirna*. They confirm likewise the raising of the Siege of *Ciclut* in *Dalmatia*.

Falmouth, Nov. 12. This morning arrived here the Spanish Expedition in seven days from *Coranna*; and brings advice, that Admiral *Russell* Anchored the 7th of the last month in *Cadiz Bay*. This morning failed hence a *Flushing* Privateer called the *Middlung*, to cruise on the French Coast.

Plymouth, Nov. 13. Yesterday came in here a *Flushing* Privateer with two French Prizes, one laden with Salt, and the other with Wine. This day arrived in this Port a Danish Ship of 400 Tuns called the *Angel Gabriel* from *Norway*.

Weymouth, Nov. 14. Yesterday arrived here the *Grensey* Galley, Capt. *Stephens* Commander; and brought in 3 Prizes, one a French Ship called the *Diligent* of *Alsore de Grace*, burthen 120 Tuns, and of 8 Guns, laden with Salt, and having a Commission from the French King; The other two are Ships of 99 and 50 Tuns, and are laden with Wines from *Bourdeaux*. Capt. *Stephens* took them

last Monday on the Coast of *Normandy*; and some days before he had taken a French Bark of 14 Tuns laden with Rye and Beans for *Bourdeaux*.

Deal, Nov. 17. On Wednesday last a Danish Ship of 24 Guns and 50 Men bound home from *St. Ubes*, called the *Crown*, was loit on the *Goodwin Sands*, but all the Men, Sails, and Cables, were saved by the Boats that went from hence to her assistance. There came this day into the *Dorset* a great Fleet of Suedes and Danes outward bound.
