Rome, Novemb. 6.

Cardinal *Gurck*, and the Cardinal *de Fourbin*, had this Week long Audiences of the Pope; The Business of the first was to assure him, that the Imperial Troops would not give the least disturbance to the Frontiers of the Ecclesiastical State, and that to remove all Jealousie of that kind, the German Regiments which had Orders to Winter in the Duchy of *Modena*, (confining upon the Province of *Ferrara*) are commanded to take their Quarters in the Duchy of *Mantua*; which has given the Pope so much satisfaction, that 'tis believed the new Levies he has ordered to be made will be Countermanded. The Cardinal *de Fourbin* repeated his instances in the name of the French King, that the Pope would Grant him the Right of Nominating to the Archbishoprick of *Cambray* when it next becomes vacant; the Election being at present in the Chapter. The Minister of the Duke of *Savoy* continues his Solicitation to have the Decree of the Inquisition against the *Vaudois* Revoked, and the Pope has appointed a Congregation to consider of that Matter.

Milan, Nov. 10. The Count *de Palsi*, one of the General Officers, who Commanded the Emperors Forces in *Italy*, died in this City on the 2d instant. On the 4th arrived here Prince *Eugene of Savoy* from *Turin*; He has had several Conferences with our Governor, the Marquis *de Leganes*, about the Preparations for the next Campaign, and intends to part from hence the next Week for *Vienna*. *Casal* will be closely blockt up this Winter.

Venice, Nov. 12. The Senate have received no Letters from the Captain General since the first of *October*; tho' there is advice come to some private hands, that he was sailed with the Fleet towards *Metellin*; but this is not to be depended upon. Here is likewise a Rumor, that there has been some Action between the Venetians and the Turks, near the *Isthmus of Corinth*, occasioned by the latter's endeavouring to make an Incurfion into the *Morea*; but it is spoken of with so much uncertainty, that we must stay for our next Letters from those parts to know the Truth of this Report. We have Advice by the way of *Ragusa*, that the taking of *Scio* had occasioned a great Consternation at *Constantinople*.

Turin, Nov. 15. The Duke of *Savoy* has ordered some new Fortifications to be made at *Coni*. Of his Royal Highness's Troops, and the Imperialists, about 20000 Men are to remain this Winter in *Piedmont*: And the rest of the German Forces have their Quarters assigned them in the Duchies of *Mantua*, *Parma*, and

Montferrat, into which they are entred without any difficulty.

Warsaw, Nov. 7. The Advices from *Lemberg* and other places on those Frontiers, give an account, that several Deserters are come from *Caminiac*, who all agree in their Report concerning the great want of Provisions and other Necessaries there is in that place, so that it will be impossible for the *Garilon* to subsist this Winter without a very considerable Relief; of which they have no prospect at present; The Tartars being so discouraged by the ill success of their late attempt, and the great loss they then suffered, that they will not in haste venture upon a new one; And besides, they are like to be employed in the defence of their own Territories against the *Cossacks*, Subjects of this Crown, who infest them with their Incurfions. On the 9th of the last month a Body of between 3 and 4000 of these *Cossacks*, commanded by *Hali* their General, passed the River *Niester* near *Tahinia*, and entred into the Country of *Budziacke*, where they plundered many Villages, and took a great number of Slaves, Horses, and Cattle, and returned to this side the River with a very considerable Booty. Another Party of 1500 of our *Cossacks* has fallen into the Country of those *Cossacks* that Revolted some years ago to the Turks, where they committed much spoil, and brought back with them a great deal of Plunder. Some of the Forces of this Crown cut off a Party of Tartars about ten days ago, who came out of *Caminiac*; They were in all above 300, and of these but 5 or 6 escaped.

Vienna, Nov. 17. They write from the Frontiers, That the Grand Visier had received Orders to hasten his return to *Constantinople*, and to bring back with him most of the Troops that served in *Hungary* this Summer, which 'tis thought necessary to keep in and about that City this Winter, to prevent any Insurrection of the People, who are much alarmed and disturbed by the Venetian Fleet's appearing in the *Archipelago*, and hindring them from receiving the Supplies of Provisions which used to come thither by Sea. General *Caprara* is not yet arrived from *Hungary*, staying to see all Matters fully settled about the Winter Quarters. General *Veterani* was by the last Letters from *Transilvania*, still posted on those Frontiers, as well to observe the Tartars as to prevent the Relief of *Gyula*. The Council of War meets here frequently to order the necessary preparations for the prosecution of the War. And we are told that the Emperor is resolved to have a much greater Army in the Field the next Campaign against the Turks than he had the last.

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Cologne, Nov. 26. The last Letters from the Upper Rhine inform us, that all Matters were adjusted by the Deputies of the Neighbouring States about the Winter-quarters of the Confederate Forces, and the furnishing of Provisions for the Magazines against the next year. The Brandenburg Troops who are to Winter in this Diocess have their Head Quarters at *Sons*.

Hamburg, Nov. 26. The last Letters from the Court of Poland give an account, That her Electoral Highness of Bavaria did not begin her Journey on the 2d of this month as was intended, and that her departure was put off till the 15th. They continue by Order of the Elector of Brandenburg to make great preparations for her Reception at Berlin.

Paris, Nov. 26. The Letters from Thoulon of the 14th instant tell us, That most of the Men of War were laid up, and that they were at work to do the like with the rest. The Marechal de *Tourville* was still there, but would set out in few days on his return hither. The Duke de *Vendôme* arrived the 12th at *Marseilles*, and took possession of his Command of General of the Gallies. On Tuesday the Council met at *Versailles*, and had again under Consideration the Poll Tax, which 'tis said was at last refused on, but the Sum, and manner of raising it is not yet determined. They talk likewise of setting up a Lottery, tho' 'tis thought 'twil hardly succeed here, by reason of the want of Money which grows greater every day. The Price of Bread rises again, and 'tis feared it will be as scarce as it was the last year. A great many Robberies have been of late committed here, and the Court de *Choseul*, and the Count d' *Albret*, were set upon some days ago by 1 hieves, and dangerously wounded. The Marquis de *Cleranban* is returned from the Army in *Piedmont*, where they reckon they have lost 8000 men by sickness this last Campaign: The Archbishop of *Cambray* died the 16th of this month.

Brussels, Nov. 28. The French Troops which the Marechal de *Boufflers* drew lately together upon our Frontiers, are separated again and returned to their Quarters. The French now give out, that their design was only to cover a Convoy which was sent from *Mons* into *Flanders*, but others believe they intended to attack *Nimue*, but were disappointed by the readines they found the Confederate Forces in to oppose them. The Advices from the French Conquests say, that Orders are sent to the several Communities and Parishes to furnish a certain number of Men for recruiting the French Troops, from which no Man under the Age of 60 is exempted. The Elector of *Bavaria* went this day with much Solemnity to the Cathedral Church of this City, where *Te Deum* was Sung for the Victory lately obtained by the Poles over the Turks and Tartars near *Caminiec*; after which all the Cannon round the Town were thrice discharged.

Hague, Nov. 30. The Dutch East Country Fleet are arrived in the *Texell*, and other Ports of this Country; They came from *Gottenburg* under Convoy of 7 English and 9 Dutch Men of War, commanded by Sir *Cloudesty Shovell*. The Princess of *Waldecke* is dead at her House at *Cuylenburg*.

Plymouth, Novemb. 20. Yesterday arrived in this Port the *Three Brothers* of London, in 21 days from *Cadix*; The Master whereof informs us, That the Fleet Commanded by Admiral *Russel* lay in a readines to Sail, in order to observe the French in case they endeavoured to repass the *Streights*.

London, Nov. 22. This day was Launched at Mr. *Snelgrove's* Yard near *Deptford*, a new Ship for Their Majesties Service, called the *Pembroke*, of 60 Guns.

Whitehall, Nov. 22. This day Died at his Palace at *Lambeth* the most Reverend Father in GOD, Dr. *John Tillotson*, Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*, in the 65th year of his Age. He was promoted to that Metropolitain See in May 1691: And as his Piety, Learning, and other Eminent Abilities, gained him a general Esteem, so they make his Death very much and justly lamented.
