

we are told, that the *Santal* from the East Indies, with two Barbadoes Men, arrived last Wednesday in the Port of Corke; Though the Letters by the last Post from Corke, do not make mention of the arrival of any Ships there. The *Elizabeth* of Boston is arrived at Ballimore bound for Bristol.

Falmouth, Nov. 26. This morning came in here two Privateers of Middleborough, the *Summer* Frigate of 18 Guns, *Jasper* Navans Commander, and the *Swallow* of 14 Guns, *Peter Cook* Commander, and brought in with them two Prizes, viz. the *William* of 4 Guns, and the *Antonio* of 10 Guns, both of St. Malo, and bound with Glais and Bale Goods, one for Bourdeaux, and the other for Bayonne.

Plymouth, Nov. 27. Yesterday passed by this Harbour to the Westward with a fair Wind, Their Majesties Ship the *Rupert*, with 7 or 8 English and Dutch Men of War more, having under their Convoy a Fleet of about 100 Sail of Victuallers, Storeships, and Merchantmen bound to Cadix. The *Hope* of Copenhagen is come into this Port from St. Ubes.

Kensington, Nov. 28. This day His Majesty was graciously pleased to Confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *Thomas Day* Esq; Mayor, and *William Danes* Esq; Sheriff, of Bristol, as a Mark of his Royal Favour for their Loyalty and Zeal to Their Majesties Government, and their great Care of the Government of that City.

The King's Most-Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council having received Information, that one Joseph Bradshaw (being a tall slender man aged, about 30 Years, of a fair complexion, commonly wearing a light Periwig, being, or pretending to be a Notary, and lately living near Doctors-Commons, London) with others his Accomplices, Armed with Swords, Pistols, and other Weapons, did on Wednesday the 21th Instant, in the Night time, make an Assault upon John Swift, Marshall, and Keeper of the Prison in the Savoy, where divers Persons were in Custody for High Treason, and did dangerously wound the said Swift and two of his Servants, and broke open the Prison Doors, whereby divers of the Prisoners escaped, and one Person was killed, but the said Bradshaw made his Escape, and fled from Justice. His Majesty by the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to Order a Reward of two hundred Pounds unto such Person or Persons as shall apprehend the said Bradshaw, and bring him before some Judge, Justice of Peace, or other Magistrate, who are forthwith to commit him to the next Gaol, there to remain till thence delivered by due course of Law, and to give notice thereof to one of Their Majesties Principal Secretaries of State, or to the Lord Chief Justice, or some other of the Judges of the Kings-Bench, that he may be proceeded against according to Law. And His Majesty doth hereby Order and Direct the Lords Commissioners of Their Majesties Treasury, forthwith to pay unto such Person or Persons as shall apprehend and bring the said Bradshaw before some Judge, Justice or Magistrate, as aforesaid, the said Reward of two hundred Pounds.
