Rome, November 27.

ON Sunday last *Te Deum* was Sung in the Popes Chapel (who on this occasion officiated himself) for the taking of *Scio* by the Venetians; All the Cardinals, and Foreign Ministers, were present at this Solemnity, and afterwards made Illuminations; *&c.* except the Cardinal *de Fourbin*, who did not appear, or take any part in these publick Rejoycings, saying; He had no Orders from the French King so to do. The new Levies are not only discontinued here, but the Pope has ordered those that were made to enter into the Service of the Venetians.

Naples, November 26. On the 13th Instant the Popes Gallies, who are returned from the *Levant*, put into the Port of *Baye* near this place; and on the 15th they proceeded on their Voyage to *Civita-Vecchia*. They left the Captain-General *Zeno* at *Sicily* about the 28th of the last month, he being resolved to remain there the whole Winter with greatest part of the Venetian Fleet.

Turin, November 26. The French Troops that were in the Valley of *Prouse*, are gone into their Winter Quarters, having endured great hardships in their march by reason of the cold Weather, and the abundance of Snow that has lately fallen. The Duke of *Savoy* has given Orders to his Officers to recruit their Troops; and there is a discourse as if every Parish will be obliged to furnish a certain number of men.

Venice, Dec. 3. We have received Letters of the 10th of the last month from *Scio*, which say, The Captain-General had kept there 18 Men of War, 3 Gallies; and 14 Gallies, with greatest part of the Land Forces, as well to secure that Island against any attempt of the Enemy during the Winter, as to cut off their communication with *Egypt* by Sea. The same Letters add, that several of our Light Frigats were sent out to cruise in the *Archipelago*; and that two *Maltise* Privateers had taken two Turkish Vessels richly laden. 'Tis confirmed from the *Morea*, that the Turks who lately made an Incurfion into that Country were retired again, having lost several hundred men, who were cut off by our Troops as they were stragling up and down in small Parties to Plunder the Country. They are preparing here another Convoy for the *Levant*.

Frankfort, December 12. The Officers of the Confederate Troops are making their Recruits; And the Deputies of the Neighboring States continue their Conferences about the preparations for the next Campaigne.

Hamburgh, December 14. The Letters from *Berlin* tell us, that the Electors of *Bavaria* parted from thence the 8th Instant on her Journey towards *Flanders*; She was accompanied out of Town by their Electoral Highness's of *Brandenburg*, and a great number of Persons of Quality.

in Coaches and on Horseback; The Regiment of Guards, and the Burghers, were in Arms; And the Cannon was several times discharged round the Town.

Paris, December 13. We are told, that Orders are sent to *Toulon* for fitting out several Men of War, but seeing all the General Officers of the Fleet are come from thence, 'tis thought they are only intended for Cruisers to secure our Trade in the *Mediterranean*, and particularly, to give some satisfaction to the City of *Marseilles*, which has of late sustained very great losses by the Enemies taking of their Ships; some of them very richly laden. The Council continues to meet about settling the manner of raising the Poll-Tax, which is to begin with the New Year. The late Tax upon Fountains is very grievous to the Provinces, and that of *Dauphine* has already made a representation to the Court against it. The General Assembly of the Clergy is appointed to be in *May* next, and twenty Millions will be demanded of them; and besides, they are to be liable to the Poll-Tax. They write from *Nantes*, that the *Sieur de St. Clair*, who went some time ago with 4 Men of War to the *West Indies*, had miscarried in his design upon the English Colony at *St. Johns Fort* in *Newfoundland*, having been beaten off by the Ships that happened to be then there, and by the Inhabitants Posted on the shore; and that one of the French Men of War, commanded by the *Sieur de Vigney*, who went the nearest, had between 30 and 40 men killed, and 60 wounded. On the 5th Instant, several Frenchmen coming from a Tavern at *St. Germain en Laye*, met three English Officers, one of which had commanded in the *Basse* in *Scotland*, and falling upon them with their Swords, after having given them divers wounds, killed them all three, and afterwards made their escape; but Orders are given to have strict search made for their apprehension. The Count *d'Estree*, and Monsieur *de Chasteau-renaut*, are arrived here from *Toulon*; and the *Marschal de Tourville* is expected in few days.

Brussels, December 15. The Court and Nobility here, are preparing to go and meet the Electors of *Bavaria*: The Officers who are to provide for her Reception in the Country of *Guelderland*, are sent away this day. The great Chamberlain goes on *Saturday* with 6 Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber, (who are the Prince *de Chimay*, the Prince *de Sreenhuyfen*, the *Marquis de Deyns*, the *Marquis de Spinola*, the *Marquis de Lede*, and the Count *de Noyelles*) and all the Ladies that are to have Places about her Electoral Highness; And the Elector himself sets out on *Tuesday* next, accompanied with the Prince *de Vaudemont*, the Duke of *Holslein*, the *Marquis de Bedon*, and several other Persons of Quality; as also the Foreign Ministers residing at this Court.
