And the Justices of the Peace are required to keep Watch and Ward, and to raise Hue and Cry according to the Laws of the Kingdom, and to put in Execution the Proclamation illued the 18th Aug. 1693. for the more ef-fectual suppression of all Tories, Rapperies, and Robbers. And laftly the Judges of Affize and Justices of the Peace are to cause this Proclamation to be publickly Read and Published in open Court at their respective Affizes and Quarter Sessions.
