London, January 1.

This day the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of this City, in their Formalities, went to Kensington, and there presented to His Majesty the following Address.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being deeply sensible of the Un-speakable Loss of Your Majesty, this City, and Your Kingdoms, by the Death of Your Royal Consort, our Gracious Queen, do with most afflicted Minds Console Your Majesty therein.

And do Humbly beseech Your Majesty, not to suffer so deep a Resentment on this Occasion, as may be dangerous to Your Royal Person, and give further Advantage to Your Majesty's Enemies.

And we earnestly Implore Almighty GOD, who hath Excited Your Majesty to so glorious a Work, as the Preservation of the Religion and Liberties of Your Majesty's Kingdoms, to preserve and prolong Your Majesty's Health and Sacred Life, for the support thereof.

And we most humbly Assure Your Majesty, That this Your Loyal City, will Heartily, Dutifully, and Effectually stand by and assist Your Majesty, to the utmost of their Power, against all Your Enemies, whether at Home or Abroad.

To which His Majesty made this Gracious Answer,

Take your Address kindly, and you are sure of My Affection.

London, January 1. The Lord Mayor and Common-Council of London have resolved to put up on the Royal-Exchange the Statues of His Majesty, and of the late Queen of Blessed Memory, in acknowledgment of the great Benefits and Advantages this City has received under Their Majesties most Gracious Government.

Lisbon, November 30. The King of Portugal has, upon the Instances of the Spanish Minister at this Court, resolved to send two Regiments of Foot to the Assistance of the Garison of Ceuta, which is now besieged by the Moors; and has accordingly given Orders for Transporting them thither. The Marquis d'Aranches, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Crown to the Emperor, began his Journey to Vienna on the 13th of this month.

Milan, Dec. 18. Our Governor, the Marquis de Leganes, has given Orders for recruiting the Forces in the Service of this State with all the expedition possible. Casal is very closely block'd up, which reduces the Garison to great necessities. The Duke of Parma died the 8th Instant in the 65th year of his Age.

Warsaw, Dec. 11. The King of Poland has issued out Circular Letters, summoning a General Dyet of this Kingdom to meet the 12th of the next month. The Advices from Wallachia and Moldavia say, that they had received Orders from the Ottoman Port to provide another Convoy of Provisions for the relief of Caminiec, the Garison of which place is brought to such extremities, that as all the accounts we have from thence assure us, they cannot subsist this Winter, unless they receive a considerable Succor. The Forces of this Crown, and the Great Duchy of Lithuania, are now in their Winter Quarters, and there is a discourse of augmenting them against the next year: But this will depend upon the Resolutions that shall be taken in the Dyet.

Vienna, Dec. 22. The Venetian Ambassador residing here has lately delivered to my Lord Lexington, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great-Britain, a Letter for His Majesty from the State of Venice, being the first that Republick has written to His Majesty since his accession to the Crown; Which he desired his Lordship to send forward to England. The Count de Martinitz will part from hence in few days on his Embassy to Rome, and the Count de Tcharin in the same Quality for Poland, the latter designing to be at Warsaw by the 12th of the next month, which is the day appointed for the meeting of the General Dyet of that Kingdom. Monsieur Heemskerke, the Dutch Ambassador, who lately returned hither from Turkey, has made his Visits to the Emperor's Principal Ministers; and 'tis said that he will remain all the Winter at this Court. The preparations for the next Campagne are made here with great diligence; The Imperial Officers have already raised great part of their Recruits; and several Magazines are providing in Hungary. The last Letters from Slavonia give an account, that the Radziens, who are quartered on those Borders, hearing that 400 Turks
