HE Fleet under the command of Admiral Ruffell continues in this Port; The Weather has been very Stormy for these last 3 weeks, but the Men of War have not received any damage. On the 2d arrived here 7 or 8 English Merchant Ships from arrived here 7 or 8 English Westernam the West-In-Malaga. The Galeons designed for the West-Inin will now very quickly begin to lade. The Moors are still before Genera, but have hitherto made so little progress in the Siege, that we do not apprehend the place to be in any danger.

I they write from Faulma, that the Marquis de Gastanaga their new Viceroy, arrived there the first of this month; and that he had taken a review of all the Spanish Troops quartered thereabouts. The Lettersfrom Cortagons of the 13th confirm the loss of two Genouese Ships and several Satees in Almeria Bay, who were cast away in a violent Storm the 24th of the last month; and farther tell us, that a great Venetian Ship perished at the same time off Cape Paul, with all her Men.

Corums, Dec. 25. The 20th arrived here the Acts Angel, Capt. Christopher Fog Commander, with several English Merchant Ships from Newfoundland. They write from Bilbon of the 13th, that the day before came in there the Fleet of Merchant Ships bound to that place from England and Holland: And from Vigo, that the Flying-Horse, Samuel Weston Commander; and the Mary, John Dudley, were arrived in that Port from Newfoundland. The Letters from O Porto of the 18th fay, they had an account from Lisbon, that the English Cruisers had

taken two Sally Men of War.

Lightone, Dec. 13. This day arrived here a Bark in 6 days from Tripeli, and brings advice, that Mr. Lodington, the English Conful, was returned thither, and had confirmed the Peace with that

Twin, Dec. 22. They continue to talk here of belieging Gazal early in the Spring. The Officers of his Royal Highness's Troops are very busie in making their Recruits. Prince Eugene of Savoy is gone to Vienna.

Vinice, Dec. 24. By a Vessel which arrived here two days ago from Constantinople, we have advice, that the Visier was returned to Adrianople, and that the Grand Signior had ordered him to use his utmost endeavours for the regaining of Scio; The Bassa of which place has had his Head cut off since his return to Constantinople, for not desending it better: The Grand Viller has dif-d

patched Chiauses to the Governments of Argiers, Tunis, and Tripoli, to require them to lend their Ships to the Levant, in order to join the Otroman Fleet in the Spring. The Senate here gives out Commissions daily for new Levies, having refolved to augment their Forces in the Levent a-

gainst the next Camgagne.

Vienna, Dec. 29. On the 25th Instant arrived. here an Officer from Hungary with an account, that the Turks at Gyula being reduced to the last extremities through the want of Provisions, had at last agreed to jurrender the place to the Imperialists upon Articles concluded between them and the Governor of the Imperial Garison of Segedin, provided the Emperor did confirm the Capitulation; and the tame evening he parted again from hence with the Emperor's Ratification of it; and with a Gold Chain and Medal which his Imperial Majesty had ordered to be given him for bringing this Welcome News. There are Letters from Twikey which fay, that there had happened a great Tumult at Adrianople, which was chiefly occasioned by the news of the taking of Soio, but the Caimacan upon the first notice of it, went with a Body of Spahi's and Janifaries, and dispersed them. after having cut in pieces some of their chief Leaders.

The Capitulation concluded between the Baron d'Hayn, Commandant of Segedin, in the Name of the Emperor, and Effendi Ibrahim Ozelobi Mehmet and Oda Bassa, deputed by the Bassa and Garison of Gyula.

Il that is found in the Arsenal of Gyula, as A Powder and other Ammunition, with all other things great and small; all the Cannon within the Fortress and Palanke, and all Instruments and Utensils of War, shall be delivered into the hands of the Commandant of Segedin, or such as shall be appointed by. him. All Mines and Powder hid under Ground shall be faithfully discovered by the Turks; and no frauds or imbezlements committed; and all Fires shall be extinguished at their marching out.

II. All Prisoners shall be released without any ran-

III. The Garison, together with all the Inhabitants. as well as Strangers that are within the place, may march out with their Wives, Children, Goods, and Cattle, and shall be conducted in 5 days (if defired) to Temefwaer; but they are not to go out with Colours Flying and Drums Beating, except the Janisaries, to whom one Colours is allowed. The Radziens in the place that have a mind to go away with the Garison, may freely do it, and others that will stay, shall remain there without any trouble or molestation.

IV. There shall be provided for them that go out 320 Wagons, and 50 Saddle Horfes during their Journey.

V. The Turks may fell fuch of their Goods as they have not a mind to carry away with them.

VI. The Garison, &c. shall march out so soon as the Emperor's Ratissication of this Agreement arrives as Gyula,

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
