Rome, Dec. 18.

THE Pope has ordered most of the Soldiers that were lately raised, to reinforce his Frontier Garisons towards *Ferrara* and *Bologna*, to be discharged again, being satisfied that the Insinuations of the French Cardinals, who endeavoured to give him a Jealousie of the Neighbourhood of the Imperial Forces quartered in the Duchies of *Mantua*, *Parma*, and *Modena*, had no other ground then the Reports they themselves had got to be spread abroad to create a misunderstanding between this Court and the Imperialists, in which they have now the Mortification to see themselves disappointed. An Express arrived here some days ago from *Paris*, with the News of the Death of the Archbishop of *Cambray*, which the Cardinal *de Fourbin* communicated to the Pope the same day, and renewed with all his instances, that he would grant the French King the Power of nominating to that Archbishoprick, which is disputed by the Chapter, who claim the Right of Election. The Pope having appointed a Congregation of Cardinals and others to moderate the great Excesses in Apparel, they agreed upon several Orders and Regulations for that purpose, which were approved of by the Pope, but upon some new difficulties that are arisen about the putting them in execution, the publication thereof is still deferred. The Pope has declared to the Venetian Ambassador, that his Gallies shall return to the *Levant* early in the Spring, and he will write to the Great Master of *Malta*, that the Gallies of that Order may be ready at the same time.

Turin, Dec. 22. The Bishop of *Aost* is gone from hence to the Court of *Rome*, with new Orders from the Duke of *Savoy* to solicit the Revocation of the late Decree of the Inquisition against the *Vaudois*, the Instances that have been made for this purpose by his Royal Highness's ordinary Minister there, not having had the desired effect; the Pope, as it seems being desirous to have this matter laid a Sleep for the present. The Marquis *de Parolle* is arrived here from the Blockade of *Casal*, and has given his Royal Highness an account of the strict care that is taken to hinder every thing from going in or coming out of the place, which by this means is already reduced to great Straights; He will return thither in few days to continue the same vigilance in order to prevent the Garisons receiving any Relief, which many are of Opinion will oblige them before the Winter is over, to think of Capitulating, and if they do not, 'tis generally thought they will be formally attacked in the Spring. Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* is still at *Milan*; from whence he will be going in few days towards *Vienno*.

Cornwall, Jan. 8. N.S. The *Newfoundland* Ships bound to *Bilboa*, under Convoy of His Majesty's Ship the *Archangel*, which arrived here the 20th of the last month, sailed again the 5th instant, with two Dutch Ships, having on board the Spanish Soldiers ordered for *Biscay* to relieve the Garison of *Pampelona*, which is to march to *Catalonia*; but they were forced back yesterday by contrary Winds. The same day came in here the *Phoenix* of *Zealand*, Captain *Peter Miller* Commander from *Hial*, and bound to *Holland*, who off the North Cape met a French Privateer of 30 odd Guns, but being in Company a of Dutch Privateer,

the French made the best of their way to get from them.

The Letters from *Lisbon* of the 28th past tell us, That there were 4 English Men of War cruising on that Coast, viz. the *Concebury*, *Newcastle*, *Mary*, and *Dragon*, who had taken a French Man of War of 32 Guns and 200 Men, called *la Sphere*; and had put the Prisoners ashore in *Portugal*, but intended to carry the Prize to *Cadiz*. The 24th arrived in the River of *Lisbon*, the *Joseph*, Captain *Brooker*, with two other English Ships bound thither from *Newfoundland*, having seen ten sail more, that were bound to *Oporto*, safe in that Port.

They write from *Madrid* of the 29th, That Admiral *Rossell* continued with the Fleet under his Command in the Port of *Cadiz*, and that his Ships were Careening. The Conde de *Banos* was on the 27th banished from the Court; and the Duke of *Albuquerque* is declared General of the Coast of *Andaluzia* in the place of the Duke of *Sessa*. The Moors continue to Besiege *Cordova*.

Edinburg, Jan. 2. We received last night late by a flying Packet from Mr. Secretary *Jobnstowne*, the sad and surprising News of the Queen's Death; The Earl of *Annandale*, who presides in the Council during the Chancellors absence, immediately ordered the Council to be called, and to meet at nine of the Clock this day, where a Letter to the King was resolved on, and sent this night to the Lord Chancellor now at *London* to be delivered. They express in it with much Zeal and Duty, their Concern for the Death of the Queen, their Sense of the loss that both they and all His Majesty's other Subjects, and the whole Protestant Interest suffer by it. They Bless God Almighty for preserving His Majesty to support them under the weight of so great a Calamity: They Pray God to continue them long such a Happiness; And they conclude with a Dutiful Offer of themselves, and of all that is theirs, for Defending and Maintaining His Majesty's Person, Title and Government, against all his Enemies, whether at home or abroad.

There are also two Letters to the King sent to the Secretaries, with Expressions of Duty and Concern, much in the same Strain with that from the Council. The one is from the Session or Supream Court of Justice, which met this day, but laid aside all other Business. The other is from this City. The Committee too, (or Committee of the last General Assembly) which
