Barbadoes, November 6.

ON the 28th of September last here arose a very violent Storm of Wind at South West, which continued 3 days, and forced ashore 26 Sail, of Ships, Brigantines, and Sloops, that were in our Road; 6 Ships and 3 Sloops are since got off again and refitting; Of those cast away several were empty, and the rest not full laden, and all the Men are saved, except Capt. Sympton Commander of the *Merchants-Adventure*, and 5 or 6 Seamen, with 2 or 3 Negroes. His Majesty's Ship the *Bristol* put out to Sea; and the *Play-Prize* with 8 Merchant Ships rid out the Storm. The Fleet of Merchant Men that sailed from hence the latter end of August under Convoy of His Majesty's Ships the *Tyger* and *Maid*, (the former having on Board Colonel Kendall, who had before given up the Government of this Island to his Successor Colonel Russell) met with very bad Weather in the Latitude of 34, which dispersed them, and on the 26th of the last month the *Tyger* returned hither, having lost all her Masts.

Vienna, Dec. 29. Among the other preparations that are making here for the next Campagne, particular care is taken of the Gallies and Barks that are to serve on the *Danube*, who being by the experience of the 3 last years, found to be of very great benefit to the Imperial Army, Orders are not only given for refitting those that were made use of the last Summer, but likewise for augmenting their number, and for building some of greater force than have yet been employed in this Service. The States of *Transylvania* are now assembled to consider of providing for the Subsistence of the Imperial Troops during the Winter, and so soon as they are separated General *Veterani* purposes to return hither, to give the Emperor a particular Account of the State of Affairs in that Principality. All the Advices from *Turkey* say, the taking of *Scio* has greatly alarmed the Ottoman Court, and that they are using their utmost endeavours to regain it.

Hamburg, Jan. 4. They write by the last Letters from *Poland*, that the Provincial Dyets had begun to meet in order to choose and instruct their Deputies for the General Dyet which is to assemble at *Warsaw* the 12th of this month. The Letters from *Sueden* tell us, that the Baron de

Heckeron was returned to *Stockholme*, in order to continue his Residence there as Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the *United-Provinces*; and that there was a Discourse, that the King of *Sueden* had resolved to send some of his Troops to the Emperors assistance in *Hungary* against the next Campagne.

Cologne, Jan. 7. The *Brandenburgh* Troops quartered in this Diocels are ordered to be in a readiness to march. Recruits are raising in all these parts for the Service of the Allies.

Dublin, Jan. 4. The Letters from *Kinsale* of the 30th past say, that the day before sailed from thence for *Bristol* the *England* Frigate, Capt. *Cooper* Commander, and under his Convoy 4 or 5 Ships from *Corke*; as also the *Dover*, Capt. *Douglas* Commander, for *Plimsouth*, with the *Elizabeth* and *Mary* from *Antegoa*, John Pearce Master, and the *Anne* of *Bristol*, Capt. *Barrington* Master. The 29th arrived at *Kinsale* the *Pearle* Frigate, Capt. *Holmes* Commander, from *Bantry*, and under his Convoy the *Okeuden*, Capt. *Swaine*, and the *James* and *Elizabeth* of *Weymouth*, George Gripe Master, from *Barbadoes*, but last from *Castlehaven*. The *Rap-eries* continue to do much mischief in the Western Parts of this Kingdom, and several Companies of Soldiers are quartered in the most convenient Places, and Parties are daily sent out to search the Woods and Mountains, in order to apprehend them.

Guernsey, Dec. 22. On the 30th of the last month sailed from hence 7 Privateers belonging to this Island, and a little time after one of them took from the French a Vessel of about 90 Tuns laden with Iron. And on the 6th Instant Capt. *John Stephens* retook an English Ship of 100 Tuns laden with Tobacco from *Virginia*, called the *True-Love* of *Biddisford*.

Falmouth, Jan. 7. On the 5th in the Evening came into this Port the *Owners-Love*, Capt. *Mighells* Commander, who on the 31th past left His Majesty's Ships the *Norwich* and *Prince of Orange* with the Fleet under their Convoy for *Virginia*, about 80 Leagues S. W. from the *Lizard*, and bore away for this place his Ship being very leaky. On the 4th a Ship was cast away to the Westward of the *Lizard*, and all the Men lost, and by some things that are driven ashore, 'tis supposed she came from *Seville*. Yesterday put into this Port a French Prize of 60 Tuns laden with Tin, Lead, and Oranges, from *Lisbon*, having

ving been taken about 8 days ago by a small Fishing Privateer.

Plymouth, Jan. 8. Yesterday arrived here the *St. Nicolas*, Andrew Holland Master, bound to Copenhagen, laden with Chestnuts.

Weymouth, Jan. 9. Yesterday came into Portland Road the *Atlas* of Amsterdam burthen 300 Tuns, laden with Salt from *St. Ubes*; from whence she came in Company of a Fleet of Dutch Merchant Ships, but was separated from them about 4 days ago in bad Weather; This Ship was so leaky that her Men were about leaving her, but our Custom-House Officers went off with a Pilot and brought her in.

Cowes, Jan. 9. Yesterday and this day are come into our Road about 12 Sail of Dutch Ships from Cadiz and *St. Ubes*, and divers others of the same Fleet are gone by for *Spithead*. There are also come in the *Elizabeth* with Fruit from *Avero*, and the *James* from *Usbon*, both bound to London.

Deale, Jan. 9. Yesterday came into the Downes the *Smirna-Factor*, and the *Loyalty*, with several Vessels from the Westward.

Deale, January 12. Yesterday failed the *Smirna-Factor* with some Merchant Ships to the Westward. And last night arrived in the Downes His Majesty's Ship the *Lenox*, with three Merchant Ships from *Cadiz*, and one from *Galipoli*; who were separated from the *Northumberland* about 50 Leagues to the Westward of *Scilly* in bad Weather.

Kensington, January 12. The Mayor, Bayliffs, and Burgeses of the Town and County of *Southampton* assembled in Common-Council, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty; Expressing their deep Sorrow for the surprizing Loss of our late Gracious Queen; beseeching God to support His Majesty under His present Grief, and that it may not hinder the Progress of his Heroick Designs, for freeing us and all Europe from Slavery and Oppression, and for protecting us in our Religion and Property, and Assuring His Majesty of their constant Loyalty and Resolution to stand by and assist His Majesty against all His Adversaries both Foreign and Domestick, to the utmost of their Power; Which Address was delivered by Sir Charles Windham, and Sir Benjamin Newland, Members of Parliament for that Town.

The Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of *York*, have also made a very Loyal and Duriful Address to His Majesty, Condoling the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory, and Assuring His Majesty, that their Lives and Fortunes are all Devoted to His Service. Which Addresses His Majesty Accepted very Graciously.
