THE last Letters from Toulon inform us, That the French Fleet is laid up in that Port; and that there is a great misery in all Provinces. 'Tis confirmed from

Tripoli, that Mr. Lodington the English Consul, has renewed the Peace with that Government. We have an account by a Vessel from the Coast of Barbary, that the Algerines have taken the City of Tunis, having granted good Conditions to the Inhabitants. The Upton-Galley arrived here the last Week from England; and on the 23d, an English Ship called the Blackham, bound to this place, arrived at Port Ferrato.

Turin, January 2. The Marquis de Leganes, Governor of Milan, came hither some days ago, and has since had several Conferences with the Duke of Savoy, and the Principal Officers of the Army, about the Affairs of the War. Our Troops have all Orders to be in a readiness to march, which make us think there is a design to attack Casal during the Winter. In the mean time we are assured from all hands, that the Garrison of that place is reduced to great necessities.

Milan, January 4. Our Troops employed in the Blockade of Casal, have intercepted a Letter written by the Governor of that place to the French Court, wherein he presses very earnestly for speedy Relief, and particularly for a supply of Money to pay the Garrison; and declares, he shall otherwise be forced to surrender it to the Enemy.

Venice, January 7. All the Advices from the Levant give an account, That the Turks are extremely concerned at the loss of Scio, which they look upon as a matter of such consequence to them, that they have resolved to make their utmost efforts for the regaining of it; The Venetians, at the same time, employ their Care and Endeavours, not only to maintain this Conquest, but to enlarge it, by making farther attempts upon the Turkish Islands in the Archipelago; and have accordingly sent Instructions to the Captain-General, and are hastning all the Succours they can to him.

Vienna, Jan. 8. The Preparations for the War are carried on here with great application. The Count de Raventlau has made an agreement to raise 2000 Danes for the Emperors Service, who, 'tis said, are to march with some other Troops to Piedmont, to supply the room of the Germans that are to be sent from thence to the assistance of the Spaniards in Catalonia. Prince Eugene of Savoy arrived here the last Week from Turin. General Caprara is made a Knight of the Golden Fleece. The Count de Tcherin is gone to his Estate in Bohemia, from whence he will continue his Journey to Poland, to take care of the Emperors Interests at the Diet of that Kingdom, which is to meet the 12th of this month. We hear from all hands, that the Turks are very intent upon their design of recovering Scio; That several Troops are already sent for that purpose to Salonica; and that the Grand Visier will himself command the Forces employed in that Expedition. They write from Hungary, that the Imperial Commissary was providing Wagons and Horses for the use of the Turks of Gyula, who are to be conducted to Temeswar, and that they believed they should, in their next Letters, give an account of the Garrisons being marched out.

Transport, January 16. Three thousand French

commanded by the *Sieur de Melac*, were in motion the last Week towards the Neckar; and their Vanguard attempted to pass that River, but the Ice not being strong enough to bear them, several were drowned, and the rest thereupon retired to their main Body, which is marched back to their Quarters, without doing any thing considerable. The Imperial Troops in the Frontier places, are ordered to keep strict Guards to observe the Enemy; and they were drawing together to oppose the Troops beforementioned, but hearing of their retreat, returned likewise to their Garrisons. Prince Lewis of Baden has put off his Journey to Vienna till the beginning of the next month; and many think he will not go thither at all this Winter, that he may lose no time in hastning the Preparations that are making in these parts for the next Campaign.

Gortorp, January 8. The Duke of Holstein Gortorp died here the 6th Instant, in the 54th year of his Age, after a Sickness of 8 or 9 days, leaving his Son Prince Frederick his Successor, Aged about 20 years.

Paris, January 17. The Ministers of this Court have not yet been able to regulate the Poll-Tax, by reason of the difficulties they meet with in settling the way of raising it, as well as the apprehensions they have of the great disturbances it will occasion in the Provinces. An Edict has been Published to turn the places of the Receivers of the Gabels, Aids and Customs, into Hereditary Offices; in consideration whereof, they that at present possess them, are to pay great Sums of Money. The French King appears to be very much troubled at the Death of the Duke of Luxembourg, and cannot yet pitch upon any body to succeed him in the Command of his Army in Flanders. There being a great want of Horses to Recruit our Cavalry, a Reform is ordered to be made of five men in every Troop, who are to be put into the Foot. They write from Brest, that some Frigates are fitting out there, to serve as Privateers upon the conditions formerly mentioned. Captain du Bart, who arrived lately at Dunkirk, brought with him only 15 Merchant Ships, 6 whereof were laden with Corn for the French Kings account, and 6 for the Merchants. Several Expresses are arrived here by the way of Boulogne, Calais and Dunkirk, with the News of the Queen of Englands Death.

Brussels, January 19. Their Electoral Highness's of Bavaria arrived here privately the 11th Instant, about 8 in the Evening, Orders having been given before by the Elector, for omitting the appearance of the Burghers in Arms, and the other Publick Solemnities that were intended on this Occasion; The Courts of Justice and Finances, and all the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, have since made their Compliments to Their Electoral Highness's; To which the Magistrates and Commonalty of this City, have added a Present to the Electors of 12000 Crowns in Gold; And the Students in the Jesuits College, made, the 14th Instant, a Cavalcade to attend them to the Palace. The Weather is extremely Cold in these Countries, beyond what has been usually known. And at present, all is very quiet on our Frontiers. The Count de Sinzendorf, who was sent hither by the Emperor with the Character of his Envoy Extraordinary, to Complement their Electoral Highness's upon their Marriage, having performed his Commission, intends to leave this place to-morrow on his return to Vienna.

The States of *Holland* are still assembled; and their Deputies have had several Conferences with those of the Admiralty. Lieutenant Admiral *Alemonde* will be going in few days for *England*, a Man of War being appointed to carry him over.

Dublin, January 9. They write from *Kinsale* of the 4th Instant, that the *Dover*, who sailed thence the day before with two Merchant Ships for *England*, was put back by contrary Winds. The *mountague*, the *Dolphin*, and the *Pearle* Men of War, with the *Oxenden* from *Galipoli*, were still in that Port.

Falmouth, January 12. The 7th in the Evening, put into this Port the Expedition of *London*, *Jeremiah* Tivy Master, who came from *New-England* with the *Supply*, the *Fire Tree*, and the *Falkland*, and two other Merchant Ships, under Convey of the *Nonfuch-Frigat*. On the 3d Instant, the *Fire-Tree* being at some distance from the Convoy, fell in with a French Man of War of 50 Guns, and was taken; and about Noon, the *Nonfuch* came in with, and engaged the said French Man of War; The Fight continued the remaining part of the day; And at 10 at Night, Captain *Tivy* spoke with the Commander of the *Nonfuch*, (the *Falkland* being then in his company) and afterwards made the best of his way for this Port. The 9th arrived here the *Providence* of *London*, *Thomas* Hurl Matter, in five Weeks from *Virginia*; In his Voyage outward, he took a French Ship laden with Sugar and Cotton, and carried her to *Virginia*. Yesterday in the Morning, came in the *Weymouth* from the Eastward, to take under her Convey the *Samuel* from *India*, and some other Ships bound for *London*.

Weymouth, Jan. 12. On Thursday last came in here the *Mary* Magdalen of *London*, bound to *Spain* from *Cadiz*, having been separated from the rest of her Company in bad weather.

Cowes, Jan. 12. This morning came into our Road the Restoration of *London* from *Malaga*.

Falmouth, January 13. The 9th came in here the *Joseph* and *Thomas* of *London*, with Wine and Brandy from *Cadiz*; The *William* of *London* with Currans from *Zant*; The *Yarmouth* of *London* from *Malaga*. The 10th arrived in this Port the *Joseph* of *Hamborough* from *Malaga*; The *Nofra Signora* of *Amsterdam* from *Malaga*; The *Consent* of *London* from *Cadiz*; And a Dutch Man of War from *Cadiz*. Yesterday came in the *Gift* of *Weymouth* from *Cadiz*; The *Phoenix* of *London* from *Virginia*; The *Joseph* of *London* from *Seville*; The *Two Blacks* of *Horne* from *St. Ubes*; The *Dove* of *Touhain* from *Cadiz*; The *Palm-Tree* of *North-Yarmouth* from *Antegoa*; And a Dutch Ship from *Suranam*; And this day arrived here the *Jeftus* of *Amsterdam* from *Cadiz*. His Majesty's Ship the *Mountague* came in this Evening in 4 days from *Iceland*.

Bristol, January 14. The *England-Frigat*, with the *Hannah* from *Jamaica*, came yesterday into *King's-Road*. And this day put in here a Dutch Man of War of 52 Guns, called the *Arms* of *Medenblieke*, who, on the 12th of the last month, came from *Lisbon* with several other Dutch Men of War, and a great Fleet of Merchant Ships, from whom he was separated in bad Weather, and forced up this Channel.

Deal, Jan. 14. On the 12th arrived in the *Downes* His Majesty's Ship the *Northumberland*, with a large Fly-boat called the *Fire-tree* laden with Masts from *New-England*, which was taken the 3d Instant by a French Man of War, and re-taken by the *Northumberland* about 8 Leagues from the *Stars*, making for *St. Malo*. The same day came in the *Mary* from *Cadiz*. On Saturday arrived in the *Downes* the *Maidston* with several Coasters from the *Westward*.

Pontinouta, Jan. 15. The *Supply* laden with Masts from *New England*, whence she came under Convey of the *Nonfuch* is arrived at *Spirhead*; having left the said *Frigat* engaged with a French Man of War about 100 Leagues from the *Lands End*. The Convoys bound to the *Streights* and the *West Indies* failed this day from *St. Helens*.

Kingsington, January 15. The Justices of the Peace of the County of *Middlesex*, assembled at their Quarter-Sessions held at *Hicks's-Hall*, made an humble Address to His Majesty, expressing their deep Sence of the great loss His Majesty, and the whole Nation, have sustained by the Death of the Queen of Blessed Memory; and assuring His Majesty that they will, in their Stations, endeavour, to the utmost, to Preserve and Maintain His Majesty's Government.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of *Chester*, have also made a very Loyal Address to His Majesty, wherein they express a deep Sorrow for the Death of our Most Excellent Queen, Pray for His Majesty's long Life and happy Reign; and assure His Majesty of their true Allegiance, Zeal, and sincere Fidelity,

upon all occasions, and to the utmost of their Abilities.

The Burgesses and Freemen of the Borough and Corporation of *Liverpool* in *Lancashire*, have likewise made an Humble Address to His Majesty, Condoling the unexpressible loss which His Majesty, and the whole Kingdom, do sustain by the Death of our late most Gracious Queen, and begging leave to assure His Majesty of their readiness, and firm Resolution, to venture their Lives and Fortunes, in the Defence of His Majesty's Person and Government. Which Address was delivered by the two Members of Parliament for that Corporation.

The Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of *Malmesbury*, in the County of *Wilt*, have likewise, in an Humble Address to His Majesty, expressed their great Sorrow for the Death of the late Queen; and do assure His Majesty, that they will defend his Royal Person and Government against all his Enemies, of what Quality soever. All which Addresses, His Majesty accepted very graciously.

Whitehall, January 15. This day was Published His Majesty's Proclamation, for Enlarging the time for Bounty-Money, to such Seamen and Landmen as shall voluntarily come into His Majesty's Service by the 10th of *February* next; and for Regulating of Protections.

London, Jan. 16. This day the Election of the Most Reverend Father in God *Thomas Tenison* D. D. (late Lord Bishop of *Lincoln*) to be Archbishop of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of *Canterbury*, was Conformed in the Church of *St. Mary le Bow*, *London*; the Commissioners present for that purpose being, the Lords Bishops of *London*, *Durham*, *Winchester*, *Cowenry* and *Litchfield*, *Exchester*, *Salisbury*, *Bangor*, and *Ely*.
