THE Cardinal de Fourbin has pressed the Pope with much earnestness to grant the French King power to dispose of the Archbishopric of Cambrai in the same manner as he does of the other Bishopricks in France, but has not yet been able to obtain an Answer to his satisfaction. Here has been lately published by the Popes order a new Regulation for reforming the manners and way of living of the Monks; But that against the Excess of Apparel is not yet Printed, the Pope thinking it sufficient that notice should be given thereof to the Persons of the chiefest Quality, with an intimation, that their conforming thereunto will not only be very acceptable to him, but the most effectual means to have the like done by People of lower Ranks. We are told that the present Duke of Modena, Prince Rinaldo d'Este intends to quit the Purple, and to send back his Cardinals Cap to the Pope, with a Request that he will grant him a Dispensation to Marry. They write from Sicily, that there has lately happened another Earthquake in that Kingdom, but they do not tell us the particulars, which makes us hope the damage is not considerable.

Venice, Jan. 10. They are now preparing here another Convoy for the Levant, which may be ready to Sail about the middle of the next month, and with this opportunity will be sent thither a considerable Sum of Money for the payment of the Troops, as well as the necessary Stores both of Ammunition and Provisions. Two new Men of War will be launched here the next week, and several Gallies are likewise building in the Arsenal to reinforce our Fleet. The last Letters from Dalmatia say, that the Troops on both sides are very quiet in their Winter Quarters; and that the Bassa's of Bosnia and Arcegovina had received Orders from the Port to make new Levies, who are to serve in Hungary the next Campaigne. The Margrave Charles of Brandenburg is arrived here from Turin, with several other Persons of Quality, to pass the Carneval in this City.

Turin, Jan. 5. The Troops employed in the Blockade of Casal are going to be relieved by others that are to march thither from Montferrat and the Milaneze; 'Tis confirmed from all hands, that the Garison of that place begins to be in great want of Provisions, and that they will hardly be able to subsist this Winter. There is a discourse, that 5 or 6000 Men are to be sent in the Spring from the State of Milan to Catalonia, and that in their stead others are expected there from Germany. They are making preparations here for an early Campaigne.

Vicna, Jan. 12. We have yet no Advicethat the Turks are marched out of Gyula, but believe our next Letters will bring it; for we hear that the Baron de Hayn, Governour of Segedin, went thither on the 6th Instant to see the Articles of Capitulation put in Execution, having caused the number of Wagons and Horses, agreed on, to be provided for the use of the Garison, which is to be conducted to Temeswaer. The Recruits for the Emperors Forces are made with great diligence; and we are told that his Imperial Majesty is Treating with several Princes of the Empire, who are to assist him with some of their Troops for reinforcing his Army in Hungary. Prince Eugene of Savoy, who lately arrived here from Piedmont, is often in Conference with the Ministers of this Court about the Affairs of the War.

Frankfort, Jan. 19. On Tuesday last a French Party from Philipsburg thought to have surprized the little Town of Eppingen, where some German Soldiers are quartered, but they were beaten off with the loss of about 60 Men.

Hamburg, Jan. 16. They write from Poland, that most of the Provincial Dyets had elected their Deputies for the General Dyet; but some were broke up in disorder without coming to any Choice; and that the King had sent Directions to these to meet again; which 'tis feared they will not do with any better success, because of the great Heats and Differences of some of the Leading Men among them. They write from Moldavia, that they are providing in that Country a new Convoy for the Relief of Gaminiec.

Paris, Jan. 21. The Edict for raising the Poll Tax is at last passed the Seal, and sent to the Sovereign Courts to be Registred; so that it will be published in few days; The Tax is much moderated from what was at first intended, and yet 'tis feared it will occasion disorders in the Provinces; The Clergy are exempted from it, because greater Sums are expected from them at their general Assembly, which will be shortly held here. The Taxes upon Fountains and Water Pipes, and the new Creation of Offices are also continued, though it was given out that they would be laid aside in consideration of the Poll Tax's being so grievous to the People. The News of the taking of Tunis by the Algerines is confirmed by the way of Marseilles.

Brussels, Jan. 23. We have an account from Mons, that at the last Muster of that Garison, 5 Men were disbanded in every Troop of Horse, who are to serve towards recruiting the Foot; and that the like is done in all the other French Quarters. The Marechal de Boufflers is gone to view the Garison of Namur. These passes nothing of moment on the Frontiers. This Court goes into Mourning next Tuesday for the Queen of England.

Hague.

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Hague, Jan. 25. N. S. The States-General have caused the Death of the Queen of England to be notified to all the Foreign Ministers residing here; who have since been to make their Compliments of Condolance to the President of that Assembly. The States have likewise sent Directions to all their Ministers abroad, to put themselves and Families into the closest Mourning. The States of Holland will separate this week after having settled the Fonds for the Expences of the War. The Deputies of the Admiralties are still here, and have frequent Conferences with those of the State.

Jamaica, November 5. Our Governor Sir William Beeston, having sent the *Advice*, the *Hampshire*, and the *Experiment*, to the Coast of Hispaniola, to annoy the French all they could; They accordingly Anchored before the Town of Leoganna, which they battered with their Cannon, and set fire to a rich French Merchant Ship that was in the Road. Captain Harman, Commander of the *Advice*, received a Shot from the Shore, of which he died a few days after; and the said three Frigats are since returned hither.

Plymouth, Jan. 15. Yesterday the Lord Cutts reviewed the Regiments in Garison here, and made Detachements out of them, who embarked the same day for Jamaica: From whence the *Germoon Advice-Boat* is arrived in this Port with Letters of the 5th of November. The *Dover* and *Mountague* came in yesterday from Ireland, having under their Convoy the *Samuel* and *James* of London from Montserrat; The *James* of London from Barbadoes; The *Oxenden* of London from Galipoli; and the *James* and *Elizabeth* of Weymouth bound to London from Barbadoes; and the *Weymouth* arrived here from Falmouth, with the *Samuel* from India, and about 18 Sail of other Merchant Ships under her Convoy.

Yarmouth, Jan. 16. Yesterday passed by this place to the Southward a Fleet of Laden Colliers with their Convoy.

Deal, Jan. 17. On the 15th sailed out of the Downs the *Smirna-Facitor*, *Jersey*, and *Seaborse*, with several Merchant Ships to the Westward.

Portsmouth, Jan. 17. The Convoys bound to the Straights and the West-Indies that sailed on Tuesday, were put back again yesterday by the contrary Wind, but it coming fair they sailed again this morning.

Kensington, Jan. 18. His Majesty has been pleased to Nominate the Reverend Dr. *James Garwiner*, Subdean of the Cathedral Church of *Lincoln*, to be Bishop of that See; and a *Gongé d'Elire* to the Dean and Chapter thereof is passing accordingly.

Kensington, Jan. 19. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of *Exeter*, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty, wherein they Express their deep Affliction for the Death of our late most Gracious Queen of Blessed Memory, and pray for His Majesty's long and prosperous Reign; To which they will endeavour to contribute with all Zeal and Vigour.

The City of *Norwich* has also made a very Loyal Address to His Majesty, Condoling the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory, and humbly begging Leave to Assure His Majesty, that they will to the utmost of their Power defend His Majesty against all his Enemies, whether Foreign or Domestick. Which Address His Majesty Accepted very Graciously.
