“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council.

“And whereas by Order in Council of the 26th day of April, 1916, Your Majesty was pleased to approve of the payment under certain conditions of extra pay to Officers and Men employed as Observers in the Royal Naval Air Service:

“And whereas it is now necessary to make further provision for the pay and emoluments of the Observer Branch:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the proposals set forth in the annexed Schedule, with effect as from the 2nd day of April, 1917, except as shown in Paragraph 4.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

“SCHEDULE.

“1. Observer Officers in the Royal Naval Air Service to be graded in the following ranks:—

OBSERVER BRANCH.

- Probationary Observer Officer.
- Observer Sub-Lieutenant.
- Observer Lieutenant.
- Flight Observer.
- Squadron Observer.
- Wing Observer.
- Observer Captain.

FLIGHT OFFICERS.

(Corresponding Rank.)

- Probationary Flight Officer.
- Flight Sub-Lieutenant.
- Flight Lieutenant.
- Flight Commander.

Squadron Commander;
Wing Commander.
Wing Captain.

"2. The pay and allowances of Observer Officers to be as follows:—

Probationary Observer Officers, 7s. 6d. a day, and, in addition, 3s. per day for each day on which they are required to make ascents.

Observer Sub-Lieutenants and Officers of higher rank, the pay of their corresponding rank in the Royal Navy, and, in addition—

Officers qualified in wireless telegraphy, 5s. a day flying pay, together with 3s. a day skill pay, both payable continuously.

Officers not qualified in wireless telegraphy, 5s. a day flying pay, payable continuously.

"3. Flight Observers and Squadron Observers to be paid at the same rates as if they had served for 4 or 8 years respectively as Lieutenants, Royal Navy, and to rank with Flight Commanders and Squadron Commanders respectively, but not to rank with Lieutenant-Commanders, Royal Navy, until they attain 8 years' seniority in the relative rank of Lieutenant.

"4. Commissioned service as Observer prior to the 2nd day of April, 1917, to count for increases of pay in the scale of the rank.

"5. Warrant Officers under training for service as Observers to receive the pay of their rank, and, in addition, 2s. a day for each day on which they are required to make ascents. On qualification as Observers to be given either acting or confirmed rank as Warrant Officers, second grade, with the pay of the rank and the following allowances:—

Warrant Officers qualified in wireless telegraphy 3s. a day flying pay, together with 1s. a day skill pay, both payable continuously.

Warrant Officers not qualified in wireless telegraphy 3s. a day flying pay, payable continuously.

"6. Flying pay to qualified Observers to be continued at Admiralty discretion during periods of leave, sickness, internment or captivity."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, bearing date the 12th day of December, 1885, it was ordered that Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, should apply to the group

of British Possessions therein mentioned, that is to say, Her Majesty's East Indian Territories, Ceylon, and the Straits Settlements:

And whereas by a further Order of Her said late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, also bearing date the 12th day of December, 1885, it was ordered that Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, should apply to the group of British Possessions therein mentioned, that is to say, the Straits Settlements, Hong Kong, and Labuan:

And whereas under and by virtue of Letters Patent dated the 30th day of October, 1906, the boundaries of the Colony of the Straits Settlements were extended so as to include the Colony of Labuan:

And whereas by the Straits Settlements and Protected States Fugitive Offenders Order in Council, 1916, as amended by the Straits Settlements and Protected States Fugitive Offenders Order in Council, 1917, it is ordered that the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, shall apply as if the Protected States named in the Schedule to the first mentioned Order were British Possessions:

And whereas by reason of their contiguity, or the frequent inter-communication between them, it seems expedient to His Majesty, and conducive to the better administration of justice therein, to apply Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, to the above mentioned British Possessions and Protected States, and such application has been requested by the Rulers of the said States:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the Powers in this behalf by the Fugitive Offenders Acts, 1881 and 1915, and otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) On and after the 1st day of February, 1918, the hereinbefore recited Orders in Council of the 12th day of December, 1885, shall be revoked, without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, or to any proceedings commenced before the said date, and Part II. of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, shall apply to the group of British Possessions and Protected States hereunder mentioned, that is to say:—

British India;
Ceylon;
Hong Kong;
The Straits Settlements;
The Federated Malay States;
Johore;
Kedah and Perlis;
Kelantan;
Trengganu;
Brunei;
North Borneo;
Sarawak.

(2) The Governor-General of India, and the Governors of Ceylon, Hong Kong, and the Straits Settlements shall cause this Order to be proclaimed in the Territories and Colonies under their respective Governments.

(3) The Governor, as defined in the Straits Settlements and Protected States Fugitive Offenders Orders in Council, 1916 and 1917, shall cause this Order to be proclaimed in the Protected State in which he exercises the functions of Governor for the purposes of the Fugitive Offenders Acts, 1881 and 1915.

Hume Long, two of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 13th day of December, 1917, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a Separate District or New Parish for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the Parish of Norton, partly out of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, and partly out of the Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, all in the County of Durham, and in the Diocese of Durham:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of Norton, the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, and the said Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees are Cures wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for Public Worship and for Pastoral Superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the Inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said Parish of Norton, of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, and of the said Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a Separate District or New Parish in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is within the limits of the said proposed Separate District or New Parish a Consecrated Church in use for the purpose of Divine Worship, and such Church is named 'The Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton':

"And whereas by a certain Indenture, bearing date on or about the 13th day of December, 1917, and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843 1844 and 1856,' or some or one of them, between the Reverend Canon Thomas Errington Scott, Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Norton, of the *first part*, the Right Reverend Francis John, Bishop of Chester, Patron of the said

Vicarage of the Parish of Norton, of the *second part*, the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham, the Ordinary of the said Vicarage of the Parish of Norton, of the *third part*, and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of the *fourth part*, (which Indenture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice), the said Thomas Errington Scott did, with the consents of the said Francis John, Bishop of Chester, as such Patron as aforesaid, and of the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham, as such Ordinary as aforesaid, grant and confirm unto the Minister or Incumbent of the District or New Parish hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and to his successors, two perpetual clear yearly Rent Charges or net annual sums of £100 and £50 respectively, to be payable quarterly on the usual quarter days in every year, free from and clear of all charges for First Fruits and Tenths, and of all deductions, taxes, charges, rates, assessments, and outgoing whatsoever, (except on account of the tax on income or property, if any), and to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon all that the said Vicarage of the Parish of Norton, and the Tithes or Tithe Commutation Rent Charges, Glebe Lands, and Hereditaments, and all other the Endowments and Emoluments for the time being to the said Vicarage belonging, the first of such quarterly payments in respect of the said clear yearly Rent Charge or net annual sum of £100 to be made on such of the said quarter days as shall happen next after the date of the licence of the first Minister or Incumbent of the said intended District or New Parish, and to be a proportionate part of the said quarterly payment calculated from the date of the said licence to the said quarter day, and the first of such quarterly payments in respect of the said clear yearly Rent Charge or net annual sum of £50 to be made on such of the said quarter days as shall happen next after the avoidance of the said Vicarage of the Parish of Norton by the said Thomas Errington Scott, and to be a proportionate part of the said quarterly payment calculated from the date of such avoidance to the said quarter day:

"And whereas certain Hereditaments and Premises situate within the said Parish of Norton, and the said Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts, or of some or one of them, and we have, in respect of such Hereditaments and Premises agreed to make and pay out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the Minister or Incumbent of the said intended District or New Parish, and to his successors, as from the date of the licence of the first Minister or Incumbent to such District or New Parish a grant of £155 per annum to be payable until the date of the avoidance of the said Vicarage of Norton by the said Thomas Errington Scott, and a perpetual grant of £105 per annum to commence from the date of the same avoidance of the said Vicarage of Norton:

"And whereas the said grants will, after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our Common Seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 111:

"And whereas the said two yearly Rent Charges or net annual sums of £100 and £50 respectively have been granted by the said Thomas Errington Scott as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District or New Parish, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said Parish of Norton, of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, and of the said Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, become and be constituted a Separate District or New Parish for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the said Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton, shall, as from the day last mentioned, be, and for that purpose we hereby specify the same Church as, the Parish Church of the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District or New Parish, that is to say, of the New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Thomas Errington Scott, and by his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Vicarage of the Parish of Norton for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All which we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council.

"THE SCHEDULE TO WHICH THE FOREGOING SCHEME HAS REFERENCE.

"The New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Norton, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the Parish of Norton, in the County of Durham, and in the Diocese of Durham, which is bounded upon the south partly by the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, partly by an isolated portion of the Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, and partly by the New Parish of Saint James, Stockton-upon-Tees, all in the said County and Diocese, upon the south-east partly by the said Parish of

Stockton-upon-Tees; and partly by the Parish of Billingham, in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-east by the said Parish of Billingham, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west, and upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Billingham from the said Parish of Norton at the centre of the bridge which carries Billingham Road across the stream called Billingham Beck, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Billingham Road for a distance of 40 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets High Street, and extending thence south-westward, first across the southern end of High Street, and then along the middle of Norton Road, for a distance in all of $7\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the junction of Norton Road with a roadway called Bowes Yard, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Bowes Yard, of Blandford Street, and of the footpath in continuation thereof, for a distance in all of 11 chains or thereabouts to the junction of the said footpath with the roadway leading from the Fox Almshouses to Darlington Lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned roadway for a distance of $42\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Stockton Branch Line of the North-Eastern Railway across such roadway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said Line of Railway for a distance of $33\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Norton from the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees.

"II. Also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, which is bounded upon the east, upon the north, and upon the west, by the above described portion of the said Parish of Norton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west, and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Norton from the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, is crossed by the said Stockton Branch Line of the North Eastern Railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said Line of Railway for a distance of $17\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the stream known as Lustring Beck on the eastern side of the said Railway, and extending thence north-eastward, first to the middle of the said stream (thereby crossing the North Shore Branch Line of the said Railway), and then along the middle of such stream, for a distance in all of 15 chains or thereabouts to a point on the western side of Norton Bridge, which carries Norton Road across the said stream, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Stockton-upon-Tees, from the said Parish of Norton.

"III. And also all that isolated portion of the said Parish of Stockton-upon-Tees which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say:—upon the west, upon the north, and upon the east, by the above described portion of the said Parish of Norton, and upon the south by the said New Parish of Saint James, Stockton-upon-Tees."

And whereas Drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incum-

bents of the Cures out of which it is intended that the District or New Parish recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the 7th and 8th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 94, the Act of the 13th and 14th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, and the Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, and of the New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, both in the County of Southampton, and in the Diocese of Winchester:

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the 8th day of August, 1853, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, four Separate Districts for spiritual purposes were constituted out of the Parishes of Saint Mary, Southampton, and South Stoneham, and the District Chapelries of Portswood, and Saint James, West End, all in the said County of Southampton, and in the said Diocese of Winchester, and one of such Districts was named 'The District of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne':

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the 26th day of February, 1867, and published in the London Gazette on the 1st day of the following month, a Consolidated Chapelry was assigned to the Consecrated Church of Saint Mary, situate at Scholing, in the Parish of Hound, in the said County of Southampton, and in the said Diocese of Win-

chester, and such Consolidated Chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Scholing':

"And whereas the said District of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, and the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Scholing, have become New Parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, by the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94:

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, and of the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend, and propose, that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, and of the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, shall be altered so that all those portions of the said Parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, and of the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured *pink*, shall be dis severed from such Parish and new Parish respectively, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne.

"And we further represent, recommend, and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending, and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All which we humbly represent, recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council.

"THE SCHEDULE TO WHICH THE FOREGOING SCHEME OR REPRESENTATION HAS REFERENCE.

"The territory to be annexed to the New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, in the County of Southampton, and in the Diocese of Winchester, being:—

"I. All that isolated portion of the Parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, in the said County and Diocese, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the north-east by the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, upon the west by the District of the Ascension, Bitterne Park, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the south-west partly by the said District of the Ascension, Bitterne Park, and partly by the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary Extra, Southampton, in the said County and Diocese.

"II. And also all that portion of the New

Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, in the said County and Diocese, which is bounded upon the north-east by the New Parish of Saint James, West End, in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-west by the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, upon the south-west by the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary Extra, Southampton, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary Extra, Southampton, from the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, at the junction of Merryoak Road, Spring Road, and Furze Lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Furze Lane for a distance of 34 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bursledon Road and Thornhill Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Thornhill Road for a distance of 46 chains or thereabouts to the point near its junction with the road leading from Bitterne to Botley where Thornhill Road is crossed by the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Scholing, from the said New Parish of Saint James, West End."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patron and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 13th day of December, 1917, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter

55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of St. Margaret, Scotswood, situate in the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint James, Benwell, in the County of Northumberland, and in the Diocese of Newcastle:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Margaret, Scotswood, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Herbert Louis, Bishop of Newcastle (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint James, Benwell, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the *Map* or *Plan* hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Margaret, Scotswood, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Margaret, Scotswood.'

"And with the like consent of the said Herbert Louis, Bishop of Newcastle (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Margaret, Scotswood, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always that, so long as the Reverend Edward Worsfold Mowll, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint James, Benwell, shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said Church of Saint Margaret, Scotswood, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Edward Worsfold Mowll: and Provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE TO WHICH THE FOREGOING REPRESENTATION HAS REFERENCE.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Margaret, Scotswood, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint James, Benwell, in the County of Northumberland, and in the Diocese of Newcastle, which is bounded upon the north-east by the New Parish of Saint Luke the Evangelist, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, upon the north-west partly

by the District Chapelry of All Saints, Gosforth, and partly by the New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Sugley, all in the said County and Diocese, upon the west by the said New Parish of the Holy Saviour, Sugley, upon the south by the middle of the River Tyne, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the River Tyne opposite to the southern end of the tramway leading from the said River to the Delaval Benwell Colliery, and extending from the said point in the middle of the River Tyne northward first to the said tramway and then along the middle of such tramway (thereby crossing Scotswood Road) for a distance in all of 9 chains or thereabouts to the point where such tramway crosses the middle of Delaval Road, and extending thence first westward, then north-eastward, and northward, along the middle of Delaval Road for a distance of 41½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Benwell Lane, and extending thence first north-westward, and then northward, along the middle of Benwell Lane for a distance of 6 chains or thereabouts to its junction at the village of Old Benwell with the Road leading past Benwell West Farm, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Roadway or Footpath leading past the eastern side of Benwell Hall and the western side of Benwell Lodge into the Road known as Benwell Bank, and extending thence first northward, then westward, and then north-westward, along the middle of the said Roadway or Footpath for a distance of 34 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the said Road known as Benwell Bank, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Benwell Bank for a distance of 26½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Road known as Two Ball Lonnen, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Two Ball Lonnen for a distance of 18½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Road leading to Fenham Hall, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned Road for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to the point where such Road is crossed by the Boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint James, Benwell, from the said New Parish of Saint Luke the Evangelist, Newcastle-upon-Tyne."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Newcastle.

THE MOTOR SPIRIT (CONSOLIDATION) AND GAS RESTRICTION ORDER, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS. DATED THE 3RD DAY OF JANUARY, 1918.

Whereas the Board of Trade deem it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects petrol and petrol substitute, and whereas by an Order in Council dated the 2nd January, 1918, it was ordered that Regulations 8G and 8GG should cease to have effect as from such date as might be fixed by Order made by the Board of Trade, and whereas it is expedient to include in one order all the purposes for which motor spirit may be used; and whereas the Board also deem it expedient to exercise their powers under the said Regulations for the purpose of regulating the use and consumption of Gas for driving motor vehicles.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade, in exercise of their said powers, hereby order as follows:—

DEFINITIONS.

(1) In this order:—

“Petrol or Petrol substitute” means any inflammable liquid substance capable of being used for the purpose of driving internal combustion engines, whether such substance has been or is liable to be taxed or not.

“Gas” means any form of gas capable of being used for the purpose aforesaid.

“Motor Vehicle” means any vehicle or cycle propelled by means of an internal combustion engine or by means of a steam engine of which the fuel is either wholly or partly petrol, petrol substitute, or gas.

“Private Motor Vehicle” means a motor vehicle in respect of which motor car duty is payable under Section 86 of the Finance (1909-10) Act, 1910.

“Trade Vehicle” means a motor vehicle which is constructed or adapted for use and is used solely for the conveyance of any goods or burden in the course of trade or husbandry, and whereon the Christian name and surname, and place of abode or place of business of the person, or the name or style and principal or only place of business of the Company or firm keeping the same are visibly and legibly painted in letters of not less than one inch in length.

“Omnibus” means a motor vehicle in respect of which Excise duty as a hackney carriage has been, or is liable to be, paid, including a char-a-banc, waggonette, brake and stage carriage, which is ordinarily used for plying for

hire, and in which when so used the passengers are charged separate and distinct fares for their respective places therein.

"Motor Cab" means a motor vehicle in respect of which Excise duty as a hackney carriage has been, or is liable to be, paid, which is licensed by a police or local authority to stand or ply for hire, and which is not an omnibus.

"Hire Car" means a motor vehicle in respect of which Excise duty as a hackney carriage has been, or is liable to be, paid, which is kept for the purpose of being let for hire by a person who is a coachmaker, or whose trade or business it is to sell or let vehicles for hire, and which is neither a motor cab nor an omnibus.

"Necessary household affairs" means the obtaining and carrying of food, fuel, stores, medical and surgical requisites, visits to a registered medical practitioner, dental surgeon, legal adviser, professional agent or bank, the conveyance of children or young persons to or from a school, college or place for the purpose of receiving elementary or secondary education; and house removal.

"Performance of a public duty" includes attendance at or upon any Court of Justice or at or upon any body or person exercising public duties when such attendance is in connection with the business of such Court or such public duty; and the performance of a duty undertaken at the direction of a Court of Justice or for or in connection with the service of a Government Department or such body or person as aforesaid when such duty is duly authorised by such Department, body or person, and the performance of their duties by officers of police and fire brigades, but for the purposes of this Order does not include attendance at a place of worship.

"Red Cross Purposes" means:—

(a) The conveyance of sick or wounded members of His Majesty's Forces for hospital or medical treatment;

(b) The conveyance of stores, nurses, and duly authorised officials to and from a hospital in connection with the service of the hospital, where the journey cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished;

(c) The conveyance of a member of a county or district Committee of a hospital or of one of the Societies hereinafter mentioned to a Committee meeting where the journey cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished;

(d) The conveyance of sick or wounded members of His Majesty's Forces who are otherwise unable to take exercise, from and to hospitals for a total running distance not exceeding twelve miles, when the journey is undertaken solely for that purpose;

(e) The conveyance of sick or wounded members of His Majesty's Forces from and to hospitals to and from places within six miles of the hospital, where they can rest or walk about, if the Medical Officer of the hospital certifies that such drives are necessary, and if the journey is undertaken solely for that purpose;

and extends to the said purposes if undertaken for the Red Cross Society, St. John Ambulance Association, St. Andrew's Ambulance Association or any similar Society recognised by the Admiralty, Army Council or States

acting in Naval or Military co-operation with His Majesty in the present war.

REGULATION OF THE USE OF PETROL, PETROL SUBSTITUTE, AND GAS.

(2) Save as is hereinafter expressly authorised, no person shall use or cause or permit to be used any petrol or petrol substitute for any purpose whatsoever, or gas for the purpose of driving any motor vehicle or motor boat.

(3) Petrol or petrol substitute, provided it has been obtained in accordance with the provisions of a motor spirit licence issued by the Petrol Control Department of the Board of Trade since the 20th June, 1916, and gas, if a permit has been granted for its use by the said Department, may be used for the following purposes:—

Private Motor Vehicles.

A. For driving a private motor vehicle where such vehicle is used:—

(1) In the conveyance of a person or goods to or from the nearest convenient railway station or port, in connection with a journey by rail or sea, provided that the journey to or from the station or port cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished;

(2) For the purpose of the profession, trade or business carried on by, or the necessary household affairs of, the person on whose behalf the motor vehicle is being used, where the journey cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished; provided that the conveyance of a person for the whole or part of the distance between his residence and place of business shall not be deemed to be a journey undertaken for the purpose of his profession, trade or business if railway or other means of communication be reasonably and conveniently available.

(3) In the performance of any public duty for the whole or part of a journey which cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished either in whole or in part;

(4) On any sudden or urgent necessity, where life or limb is or may be endangered;

(5) For the conveyance of a sick or injured person for the purpose of receiving medical or surgical treatment or for the removal of such person from a hospital or nursing home or from one residence to another; and, if the journey cannot otherwise be reasonably and conveniently accomplished, for the purpose of attendance upon such person, and for visits to a person who is dangerously ill;

(6) For funerals;

(7) In the conveyance of a duly qualified medical practitioner or veterinary surgeon, while it is being used by him for the purposes of his profession;

(8) For Red Cross purposes;

Whether a journey can be reasonably and conveniently accomplished otherwise than by a private motor vehicle depends on all the circumstances of the case, including the length and purpose of the journey, the age and state of health of the person using the motor vehicle, the time occupied in relation to the distance, and the availability of trains or public service vehicles.

Trade Vehicles.

B. For driving a trade vehicle for any purpose for which such vehicles may by law be driven.

Omnibuses.

C. For driving an omnibus,

(1) While plying for hire upon any route on which it or any other omnibus was accustomed to run during the calendar month immediately preceding the date of this Order or upon any route which is certified by the Chief Officer of Police for the police area in which the petrol or petrol substitute is used (or in the Metropolitan Police District by the Chief Officer of the Public Carriage Branch of Metropolitan Police) to be necessary or desirable in the interests of the travelling public.

(2) For ambulance, hospital, or Red Cross purposes or for naval, military or munitions service, or the conveyance of workmen to and from their work, or for the conveyance of sick and wounded members of H.M. Forces, although the omnibus is not plying for hire.

(3) For conveying persons, luggage, and goods to or from a railway station or port in connection with a journey by rail or sea.

Motor Cabs.

D. For driving a motor cab for any purpose within the limits of the area where it is licensed to stand or ply for hire, and to any place situate not more than three miles from the boundary of such area and for returning from such place.

Hire Cars.

E. (1) For driving a hire car, notwithstanding anything contained in a permit formerly issued under Regulation 866 of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, where the car is hired.

(a) for the conveyance of a person or goods to or from the nearest convenient railway station or port in connection with a journey by rail or sea;

(b) for the purpose of the profession, trade or business carried on by, or the necessary household affairs of, the person hiring the car;

(c) for the performance of a public duty by the person hiring the car;

(d) on any sudden or urgent necessity where life or limb is or may be endangered;

(e) for the conveyance of a sick or injured person for the purpose of receiving medical treatment, or for the removal of such person from a hospital or nursing home or from one residence to another, or for the purpose of attendance upon such person, and for visiting a person who is dangerously ill;

(f) for funerals;

(g) for Red Cross purposes.

It is hereby declared that the provisions of this clause apply to all hire cars, as hereinbefore defined, whether or not they are standing or plying for hire in a street, public place or railway station where it is lawful for them so to do without a licence.

(2) The owner of every hire car shall keep a record of all lettings, with the names and addresses of the hirers and particulars of the journey, except where the letting took place when the car was standing or plying for hire in a street, public place or railway station, and such record shall be open for inspection at all times by a Police Officer or an Officer of the Board of Trade.

Fire Engines and Motor Ambulance.

F. For driving a motor vehicle which is a motor fire engine, or other vehicle used for fire brigade purposes, or a motor ambulance.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

(4) Petrol, petrol substitute or gas may be used for the purpose of driving a motor fishing boat or other motor boats used for the purpose of the profession, trade or business (other than the trade or business of letting motor boats for hire or for conveying passengers on pleasure trips) carried on by the person on whose behalf the motor boat is being used; or for driving a motor tractor or motor plough used for the cultivation of land or other agricultural purposes; or for driving a motor sweeping or watering machine or other vehicle used for sanitary purposes; or for purposes other than the provision of motor power to motor vehicles provided that petrol or petrol substitute, if subject to duty as motor spirit under Section 84 of the Finance (1909-10) Act, 1910, must be obtained in accordance with the provisions of a motor spirit licence issued by the Petrol Control Department of the Board of Trade.

RACE MEETINGS, GAMES AND SPORT.

(5) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, no person shall use, or cause or permit to be used, any petrol, petrol substitute or gas for driving any motor vehicle whatsoever, either for the purpose of his profession, trade or business or otherwise, to or from any race meeting, game or sport, whether for the whole or part only of the journey, except for the purpose of attendance upon or removal of a sick or injured person, or upon any sudden or urgent necessity whereby life or limb is or may be endangered, or for the purpose of police or fire duty.

Provided that the distance between a person's place of residence, whether permanent or temporary, and the nearest convenient railway station shall not be deemed to be a part of such journey if the use of petrol, petrol substitute or gas for the purpose of proceeding to such railway station is otherwise permitted by this Order.

Provided also that nothing in this paragraph shall apply to an omnibus plying for hire on its ordinary and accustomed route and at its ordinary and accustomed hours and fares.

SPECIAL PERMITS.

(6) Nothing in this Order shall prevent the use of petrol, petrol substitute or gas for any purpose by any person to whom a special permit in writing has been granted by the Petrol Control Department of the Board of Trade for such times and subject to such conditions, if any, as may be specified in the permit.

ONUS OF PROOF.

(7) The proof that petrol, petrol substitute or gas was used in accordance with the provisions of this Order shall in all cases lie upon the person or persons using or causing or permitting the use thereof, as a condition of its user.

GENERAL.

(8) Where petrol, petrol substitute or gas is being used by any person for a purpose permitted by this Order in the driving of any motor vehicle or motor boat, any other person or persons may accompany the person using such petrol or petrol substitute.

(9) Nothing in this Order shall prevent the use of petrol or petrol substitute obtained under a motor spirit licence, or of gas, by the holder of a gas permit, for the purpose of driving a motor vehicle for a distance not exceeding 20 miles in connection with the bonâ-fide sale or intended sale of such vehicle, provided that the

seller has obtained the permission of a Superintendent or other Chief Officer of Police of the area in which the motor vehicle is kept.

(10) Nothing in this Order applies to the use of petrol, petrol substitute or gas for the purpose of driving motor vehicles in the exclusive use of a Government Department; or motor vehicles enrolled for War Service under a scheme authorised by the Army Council or Secretary of State for War which are provided for the purpose of such service with petrol or petrol substitute from Army sources under due authority, and while they are actually employed on the service for which they are so enrolled. A certificate issued under the authority of the Army Council or Secretary of State for War shall be evidence that the motor vehicle is enrolled under such a scheme authorised by them.

(11) Where at the date of this Order a motor vehicle or motor boat had been fitted with apparatus for the purpose of driving it by gas, it may be driven for any purpose authorised by this Order without a gas permit until the 9th February, 1918, after which date no motor vehicle or motor boat in respect of which a gas permit has not been granted shall be driven by gas.

(12) Infringements of this Order are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

(13) Regulations 8c and 8cc of the Defence of the Realm Regulations shall cease to have effect as from the 10th January, 1918, and the Motor Spirit Restriction Order (No. 1), 1917, and the Motor Spirit Restriction Order (No. 2), 1917, are hereby revoked without prejudice to any act or thing done or suffered or to any prosecution or proceeding instituted or penalty incurred under the said Regulations or Orders.

(14) This Order may be cited as the Motor Spirit (Consolidation) and Gas Restriction Order, 1918, and shall take effect as from the 10th January, 1918.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

RAW ASBESTOS ORDER (INCLUDING ASBESTOS CRUDE AND ASBESTOS MINE FIBRES).

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling them, and with the concurrence of the Army Council and the Minister of Munitions, hereby order as follows:—

1. No person or Company shall on or after the date hereof until further Notice sell, supply or deliver any raw Asbestos, including Asbestos Crude and Asbestos Mine Fibres, whether situated in or outside the United Kingdom, or purchase or negotiate for the purchase or take delivery of any raw Asbestos, including Asbestos Crude and Asbestos Mine Fibres, situated outside the United Kingdom, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence or permit issued under the authority of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

2. All persons and Companies engaged in the manufacture or sale of Asbestos or Asbestos products shall make such returns with regard

to their business as shall from time to time be required by or under the authority of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 9 of the year 1918.

SCOTLAND, NORTH-EAST COAST, WITH ORKNEY AND SHETLAND ISLES.

Former Notices.—Nos. 762, 888, 1024, 1129 and 1248 of 1917.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Pentland and Moray Firths—Restriction of Traffic; Pilotage Regulations.*

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart

No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—

(a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;

(b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burghead, except within three-quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded area.

2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray firth should therefore endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half-an-hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause 1.

3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

Caution.—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel, and are strongly advised not to take it.

II.—PILOTAGE REGULATIONS.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the ports of Cromarty and Inverness for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty and Inverness will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty or Inverness.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under

way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbetness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

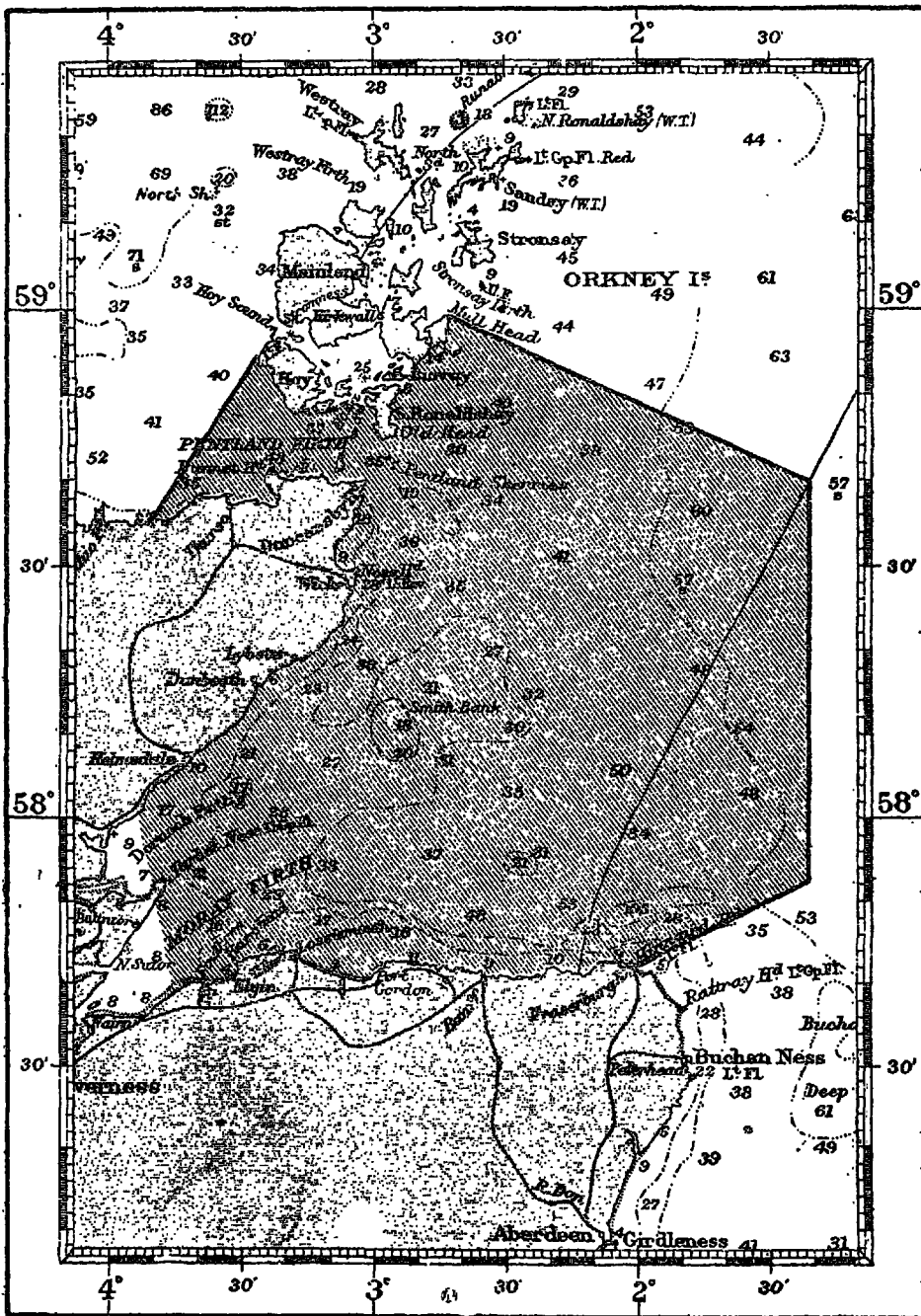
I.—SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.
2. Examination services have been established in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

II.—PORT OF KIRKWALL AND APPROACHES.

1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.
2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.
3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours



- sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very carefully.
3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.
 4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.
 5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

- of darkness, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.
4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.
 5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boat shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach

the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler and repeated at the Hellier holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":
By day—Two balls, vertical.
By night—A red light.

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":
By day—A cone, point upwards.
By night—A green light.

Gate Closed: By day—Three balls at Hellier holm.
By night—Three red lights at Hellier holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (N. 56° W. Mag.), one mile from the entrance.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way, and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship shall then keep a full half mile directly astern,

and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. *Caution.*—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

(3) *Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.*

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

Note.

This Notice is a re-publication of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

Two light-buoys have been established to mark a gateway on the northern side of the entrance to Belfast lough about 8 cables south-eastward from Cloghan point, as stated in the former notice.

When making for this gateway, vessels must maintain a course of 201° (S. 40° W. Mag.) or 21° (N. 40° E. Mag.) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the gateway.

The Gobbins head light-and-whistle-buoy, exhibiting a *flashing red* light, situated in lat. 54° 48' 10" N., long. 5° 38' 20" W., approximately, serves as an additional aid to vessels.

Vessels approaching Belfast must be careful to look out for and close the Patrol Vessels off

the port, and strictly observe any instructions communicated to them by the Patrol.

A drifter will be stationed at a distance of about half a mile north-eastward of the gateway.

This drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the gateway.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the gateway.

To indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound vessels the drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal *white* lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the gateway is clear for outward bound traffic.

Vessels approaching Belfast lough in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signals, and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the gateway is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the gateway, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving must exhibit their side lights.

Before attempting to leave Belfast lough, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

Note.—The above light-buoys are to be inserted on the plan on Chart No. 1825*a* and also on Chart No. 1577, in addition to the charts quoted in the former Notice.
