Leghorne, January 3.

Yesterday arrived here Capt. Matthews in the Cloudsly Galley from Newfoundland; He stayed some days at Gibraltar, and sailed from thence about the 15th of the last month; and says, that the English Frigates cruise so diligently about the Streights Mouth, that no French Ships can pass it; and that they had taken divers Prizes. By a Vessel from Marsilia we are told, that the Traders of that place have of late suffered great Losses at Sea; and that their Commerce is almost ruined. The Blackham Frigate continues still at Porto-Ferraio; where she lately arrived from England.

Venice, Jan. 8. Two days ago arrived here a Ship called the St. Joseph, the Commander whereof says, that he came out of the Archipelago the 28th of November, and from Milo the 6th of December; That a Slave who had made his escape out of the Turkish Gallies, was come to the place last mentioned, and reported, That the Ottoman General Zeno being informed that the Ottoman Fleet was ordered to sail towards Smirna, he went from Scio with the Men of War and Gallies of this State, to meet the Enemy, and coming up with them near Metelin, he engaged the Turkish Fleet, burnt and destroyed several of their Ships, and put the rest to flight; and that the Venetians had afterwards landed upon the said Island of Metelin, and made themselves Masters of it. The same Report comes by the way of Zant; But we can give no great credit to it, until it comes from more Authentick Hands.

Vienna, Jan. 15. The States of the Lower-Austria assembled here on Wednesday last; and the Chancellor of the Court, according to Custom, gave them in Writing the Emperors Proposition or Demand of a Supply towards carrying on the War, since which they have resolved not only to raise an Extraordinary Subsidy, but likewise to furnish Men for recruiting the Imperial Forces. Prince Lewis of Baden is expected here from Germany towards the end of this month, to assist at a great Council of War. Prince Eugene of Savoy has frequent Conferences with the Imperial Ministers about the Affairs of Piedmont. The Sieur d'Assenberg, Admiral of the Emperor's Fleet on the Danube, is returned hither from Hungary, and has given the Court an account, that the preparations which are to be made by him, are in all the forwardness that can be desired. The Letters from Constantinople of the 15th of November confirm our former Advices of the great Confectionation which the taking of Scio has occasioned among the Inha-

bitants of that City, and that the Ministers of the Ottoman Court are so sensible of the ill Consequences it may have, that they now turn all their Thoughts and Care towards making their utmost Efforts for the recovery of it; to which end Directions were sent to Ibrahim Bassa to draw together a Body of 20000 Men near Smirna, and the Captain Bassa was commanded at the same time to be in a readiness to sail with the Fleet, consisting of 20 Men of War, 15 Gallies, and 25 Brigantines, in order to favour this design. The last Letters from Hungary say, that Wagons and Horses were provided for the Garrison of Gyula, which would march out in 2 or 3 days.

Francfort, Jan. 23. The States of the Upper-Rhine are to meet the 25th of this month, to consult about several matters relating to the preparations for the next Campagne; which are already settled by the Circles of Suabia and Franconia. We hear from Alsace, that the French have begun to raise the Poll Tax in that Country; and that they compel the People, besides the heavy Taxes that are laid upon them, to furnish Corn, &c. for their Magazines.

Paris, Jan. 25. The Poll Tax which is now going to be raised is divided under 22 Ranks. The Dauphin and Princes of the Blood are comprehended under the first, and pay 2000 Livres each, &c. the next Payment is 1500 Livres, then 1000, &c. and the lowest 20 Sols, which last is to be paid by all sort of Persons but those that receive Aims. The Clergy is Taxed as well as other Persons, but will be excused from paying it this year, because a greater Sum is expected from them at their next general meeting. The last week was published here an Order for reforming 5 Men in every Troop of Horse; and 'tis thought the like will be done in the Dragoons. Six Ships are fitting out at Port-Lewis for the East-Indies, which may sail about the middle of the next month; 3 of them being for the Company's Account, and the other 3 Men of War. The Court here is gone into Mourning for the Duke of Parma.

Brussels, Jan. 26. The Elector of Bavaria has demanded of this City a new Subsidy for the Service of the War, and the Magistrates and Commonalty are now assembled to consider of the manner of raising it. The Letters from the Frontiers say, that the French, for want of Horses to recruit their Cavalry, have reformed 5 Men in every Troop; which is now to consist only of 35 Troopers. The Mareschal de Boufflers is returned to Lisse, where, 'tis said, he is very much indisposed. We hear that 3000 Men are to be sent from these parts to serve in Catalonia under the command of the Count de Thian, who is making preparations for that purpose.
