- Leigherne, Jan. 10. The William and Mary Galley is arrived here from Newfoundland, and the Blackham Frigate, Russell Galley, and Tunesen from London. We have Advice from Toulon of the 7th Instant, that 4 French Frigats were gone out to Cruise; and that the French Fleet is laid up in that Port. Two Dutch Privateers who Cruise about Malta, have lately taken a very rich Ship bound from Marseilles to Smirna, said to be worth several hundred thousand Pieces of Eight.
- Venice, Jan. 22. The Doge and Senate have received Letters from the Captain General Zeno, dated the first of

this month in the Port of Spainadori, wherein he acquaints them; That being informed the Turkish Fleet, consisting in 22 Men of War, 26 Gallies, and divers other Vessels, was sailed from the Dardaneli to Smirna, to take on Board the Land Forces which were drawn together near that place for the recovering of Scio, he held a Council of War, and then sailed with the Venetian Fleet, composed of 20 Men of War, 20 Gallies, and 6 Galeasses to Spainadori, which being a very convenient Station, over-against Smirna, and so near, that the Enemy could not come out of that Port, without passing almost in sight of the Venetians. He had staid there several days, waiting an opportunity to engage them, and that having afterwards held another Council of War, it was resolved to make use of the first favourable Wind and Weather to attack the Enemies Fleet in the Harbour of Smirna. There are Letters from Messina of the 30th of December which say, that a Merchant Ship was arrived there in 15 days from Smirna, and brought advice, that the Turks had assembled 30000 men in that neighbourhood; That part of their Fleet was come to Smirna, and the rest to Fochia, in order to carry them over to Scio, and 'twas said the Viceroy would himself command in this Expedition; They add, that the Captain Bassa was strangled for having avoided fighting the Venetian Fleet. They write from Napoli di Romania of the 16th of December, that the Seraskier of Negrepoint had received Orders from the Port, to give the Venetians a Diversion in the Morea while the Turks were carrying on their Design against Scio; and that the Provodore General of the Morea was sending all the Troops he could to the Isthmus of Corinth, to reinforce the Venetian Troops that guard the Pass, by which alone the Enemy can enter into that Country.

Vienna, Jan. 19. The Turks marched out of Gyula the 10th Instant; which the Imperialists took possession of at the same time; and they have since begun to raise several new Works for the better defence of the place. The young Prince of Transylvania came hither on the 16th Instant, intending to pass some short time at this Court; General Veterani is likewise arrived here, having left the Count de Truchses to command the Imperial Forces in Transylvania during his absence. The States of Austria have resolved to give the Emperor a Supply for the Service of the War, and to raise Recruits for the Imperial Army in Hungary; which will be considerably augmented against the next Campaign. All the Advices from Constantinople say, that the Turks are very intent upon their design to recover Scio.

Hamburg, Febr. 1. The Letters from Poland tell us, that the Dyet of that Kingdom met at Warsaw the 12th of the last month; but that there had been very warm Disputes among the Deputies about choosing their Marshal or Speaker, wherein they were not yet agreed when these Letters came away. The same Letters confirm our former Accounts of the great want there is of Provisions at Caminiec.

Paris, Jan 31. The Poll Tax is now raising here, which is to be continued during the War; It occasions great murmurings among the People, and discontents among the Nobility: The Clergy are excused from it this year, but instead thereof they are to give 15 millions of Livers at their next general meeting. The Inspectors of the Forces are gone to the Frontiers of Flanders to take a Review of them. A reform is made of 5 men in every Troop, because of the want there is of Horses to supply the dismounted Troopers; and these are made use of towards recruiting the Foot; Great and daily Complaints are made of the Violence committed by the French Officers in killing men by force, which are punished at becau-

they are still paid of late. We hear that the Ships designed for the East-Indies will not sail from Rochelle till towards the middle of the next month. The last Letters from Pignerol say, the Allies have resolved to besiege Casal in the Spring.

Brussels, Febr. 2. The Elector of *Bavaria* has appointed the Count de *Rivers* to go for *England* to make his Compliment of Condolence upon the Death of the Queen. A French Party of 700 Horse and Foot came on Thursday last to *Guidenguien*, but the Garisons of *Acth* and *Ninove* having notice of it, sent out Parties likewise, whereupon the Enemy retired without attempting any thing. A Party of this Garison of 50 Horse and Dragoons brought higher Prisoners on Saturday last, the Burgermaster of *Namur*, with 7 or 8 other Persons, whom they took within Murket Shot of the Counterscarp of that place. The preparations are made here with all possible diligence for the sending 1000 dismounted Troopers and 2000 men more from these parts, to reinforce the Spanish Army in *Catalonia*.

Hague, Febr. 4. N. S. The States of *Holland* have resolved to raise the Hundred Penny twice this year, at four payments as it was the last. The Deputies of the Admiralties continue their Conferences with those of the State about our Sea Preparations, which are in great forwardness, as well as those by Land.

Falmouth, Jan. 24. The *Dunkirke* and other Men of War designed for *Jamaica*, sailed out of this Port the 22th in the Evening, and being joined by the Transport and Merchant Ships from *Plymouth*, they all proceeded upon their Voyage.

Kensington, Jan. 29. The Justices of the Peace assembled at the General Quarter Sessions for the West-Riding of the County of *York*, have in their Humble Address to His Majesty, Expressed their Sorrow for the great Loss all His Majesty's Subjects do sustain by the Death of our most Gracious Queen; and do farther beg Leave to Assure His Majesty, that they will with their Lives and Fortunes defend His Majesty's Person and Government against all His Enemies both at Home and Abroad.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of *Hertford*, have made a Loyal Address to His Majesty, Condoling the Death of the Queen, and Assuring His Majesty, that they are ready to prostrate their Lives and Fortunes for the support of His Majesty's Government, against all his Enemies whatsoever.

The Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the City of *Gloucester*, do in like manner Condole the Death of the Queen, and Assure His Majesty of their constant Loyalty and Resolution to stand by and assist His Majesty to the utmost of their Power against the wicked Devices and Attempts of His Majesty's Enemies at Home and Abroad.
