Naples, January 9. The Gallies of this Kingdom and of Sicily, have met with very bad Weather in their return from *Barcelona*, which obliged 6 of them to put into *Civita Vecchia*; and the rest are arrived here, except one which is missing.

Rome, January 15. The Pope has upon the Instances of the Cardinal *de Fourbin*, granted the French King the Nomination of an Archbishop of *Cambray*, as often as that See shall become vacant during his Life; which was much opposed by divers Cardinals, who endeavoured to preserve a free Election by the Chapter. The Count *de Martinitz* is shortly expected here with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor. The Ambassador of *Venice* has received Advice from the *Levant*, by the way of *Otranto*, that the Captain-General *Zeno* was filed with a resolution to attack the Turkish Fleet, which was taking Soldiers on Board at *Smirna* for the Expedition against *Scio*; so that we expect every day to hear that there has happened some considerable Action in those parts.

Vienna, Jan. 22. The 18th arrived here an Express from the Baron *de Hayn* Governor of *Segedin*, with an account, that the Emperors Forces took possession of the Castle of *Gyula* the 10th Instant, the Turkish Garrison marching into the Palanke or Lower Town, where they would continue two or three days till the Wagons and Provisions that were to be furnished for their march to *Temeswaer* were ready, according to the Capitulation. We have Advice from the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, that a Party of Radziens had passed the *Danube*, surpris'd the Palanke of *Passarowitz*, cut in pieces most of the Turks that were posted there, and afterwards retired with their Booty, and the Prisoners they took, to their Quarters: And that

another Party of Radziens which marched towards *Temeswaer* had met and defeated a Party of 60 Turks, and brought back with them the Officer that commanded it, with several other Prisoners. 'Tis said that the Count *de Raventclau* has made an Agreement with the Ministers of this Court to raise a Regiment of Foot for the Emperors Service, which is to consist of 2000 Men, and to be compleat in April next.

Kensington, Jan. 31. This day the most Reverend Father in God, *Thomas*, Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*, was, by His Majesty's Command, Sworn one of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

January 31. This Evening Count *Aversberg*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, had his first Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess of *Denmarke*, as also of the Prince, being introduced by Sr. *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.

And the Viscount *de Font Arcada* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Portugal*, was conducted to His Audiences of Their Royal Highness's in the same manner.

Kensington, Febr. 2. The Mayor, Deputy Recorder, Justices of the Peace, Aldermen, and Burgesses of *Taunton* in the County of *Somerset*, and the Grand Jury, Constables, and other Officers, assembled at a General Sessions of the Peace, have in their Humble Address to His Majesty. Expressed their great Affliction for the Death of the Queen, and do Assure His Majesty, that they will continue to contribute their best Endeavours, to the utmost of their powers, for the support and maintenance of His Majesty's Royal Dignity and Happy Government; Which was delivered by their Representatives in Parliament.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of *Bath* in the County of *Somerset*, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty, Condoling, with Expressions of their great and real Sorrow, the Death of the Queen, and Assuring His Majesty, that they will adventure and engage their Lives and Fortunes for His Majesty's Service against all His Enemies at Home and Abroad; Which was delivered by their Representatives in Parliament.

The Justices assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the County Palatine of *Durham*, together with the Grand Jury for the same, have in a like Address to His Majesty Expressed their great Sorrow for the Death of the Queen, and that they think themselves indispensably obliged to serve and assist His Majesty to the utmost of their power against all those that shall oppose or obstruct the quiet and felicity of His Majesty and these Nations; Which was delivered by their Representatives in Parliament.
