They seem at this Court to be now very intent again upon the design of making *Caserta* a free Port. The Pope has ordered his Gallies to return to the *Levant*, and 'tis thought they may be ready to sail by the beginning of *April*.

*Paris, Febr. 25.* The Letters from *Messina* of the first of this month confirm the news we had the last week by a Merchant Ship called the *Julish* concerning the Engagement between *Capt. Kildgrew* in the *Plumet*, and two French Men of War who were cruising in the Channel of *Malta*, and that upon the coming in of another English Frigate they were both taken; but differ from the former Account in this, that they do not make mention of either of the Prizes being sunk at Sea, but say that one of them carrying 64 Guns was brought to *Messina*, and the other of between 70 and 80 Guns to *Trapano*, another Port in *Sicily*: The Body of *Capt. Kildgrew* was brought ashore at *Messina* the day these Letters were written. There is no fresh news come from the *Levant*, by reason of the bad Weather and contrary Winds we have had of late, which likewise hinders the departure of the great Convoy which now lies ready to sail with Stores and Provisions for the Venetian Fleet. Yesterday in the afternoon was felt here an Earthquake, but it did no other harm than to throw down some Chimneys.

*Turin, Febr. 26.* The Confederate Forces in these parts are ordered to be in a readiness to march by the 6th of the next month; and no body doubts but that their design is to besiege *Casal*. A Party of 21 *Vaudois* advancing some days ago towards *Marsaglia*, to intercept the Provisions which are carried from the Neighbouring Villages to *Pignatol*, the French upon notice of it, sent out 200 Dragoons, commanded by *Capt. Poole*, to attack them; The *Vaudois* defended themselves a long while, but at last being overpowered by the Enemies number, demanded quarter, which was granted, but so soon as they were disarmed the French stript them and put them all to the Sword; This is the greatest loss the *Vaudois* have suffered in any Rencounter since the War, and they will doubtless revenge it in a short time.

*Milan, Febr. 28.* The German Troops that have Wintered in the Dutchy of *Molana* begin to be in motion, being ordered to march towards *Casal*; so that 'tis believed the Siege of that place will be formed in few days; There is in it at present a Garrison of about 3000 Men.

*Prague, March 4.* Prince *Lewis of Saxe* came to this place the 28th of the last month from his House in *Bohemia*, and was very kindly received by the Emperor; Several Conferences have been since held about the Affairs of the War, and the Designs of the next Campaign. 'Tis said that five hundred thousand *Florins* have been lately ordered to *Milan* to be employed for the Siege of

*Casal*, and that this will be shortly followed by a greater Sum. The Emperor has not yet declared who shall command his Army in *Hungary* the next Summer: The preparations that are making in our Frontier places on that side do more and more confirm the Opinion many have that the Imperialists design to besiege *Transilvania*. General *Peterani* is preparing for his return to *Transilvania*, but the young Prince *Abafel* will probably make a longer stay at this Court. The last Advices from *Turkey* say, that the Grand Visier was not yet gone from *Adrianople* upon the Expedition against *Salo*, and it was doubted whether he would go at all. The Enemies preparations for the Campaign in *Hungary* are very backward.

*Frankfort, March 10.* The Imperial Troops that are quartered near the *Rhine* are all to be compleat the next month. The Commissaries provide Magazines at *Haidbron*, and other places, from whence the Army may most conveniently be supplied during the Campaign. The French do likewise lay up great Stores of Forage at *Landsau* and *Philipsburg*. They write from *Alsace*, that a Detachment was ordered to be sent from thence towards *Piedmont*.

*Paris, March 11.* The French King has put off his Journey to *Compeigne* till the end of the next month, and they say the Review of the Troops of the Household is appointed to be there on the 8th of *May*. The Dauphin does not go to *Flanders* this Campaign, and 'tis generally believed the *Mareschal de Villeroy* will have the Command of the French Army in those parts; and that the *Mareschal de Boufflers* will Command a separate Body of Troops towards the *Meuse*. The *Mareschal de Tourville* will return in few days to *Toulon*; where, as 'tis said, they have not yet begun to fit out the Men of War. The Gallies are making ready at *Marseilles*, and they are raising several new Batteries for the security of that Port; The Inhabitants of *Marseilles* are in much apprehension of being bombarded; and some of the principal talk of retiring from thence; Two Ships belonging to that place have been lately taken by the English, one of them being bound to *St. Malo*, and carrying 16 Guns. They are still arming out several light Frigats at *Rochefort* and *Rochelle*, and they say some Ships are likewise fitting at *Brest*. The *Mareschal de Choiseul* is to command this Summer on the Coast of *Normandy*. The Poll Tax is very grievous to the People, and they find already it will not raise above half of what was at first expected. The Letters from *Pignatol* of the 27th past do confirm our former Advices of the Enemies design to besiege *Casal* so soon as the Weather is proper for it.

*Brussels, March 13.* On the 6th Instant Prince *Thomas of Lorraine*, Son of the Prince de *Vaudemont*, arrived here from *Vienna*. The 7th the Elector of *Cologne* returned to *Liege*. The 9th came hither the Count de *Sales*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoie*, and the day following he had Audience of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, whom he Complimented upon his Marriage.
