## By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

For Apprehending of *William Standish of Standish-Hall in the County of Lancaster Esq;*

**WILLIAM R.**

**W**hereas His Majesty hath received Information, That *William Standish of Standish-Hall in the County of Lancaster, Esq;* hath Conspired, with divers other Disaffected Persons, to Disturb and Destroy the Government, and for that purpose bought up Arms, and Abetted and Adhered to His Majesties Enemies; For which cause several Warrants have issued for the Apprehending of the said *William Standish*, but he hath withdrawn himself from his usual Place of Abode, and is fled from Justice: His Majesty therefore hath thought fit, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and upon an Humble Address from the House of Commons for that purpose, to Issue this His Royal Proclamation; And His Majesty doth hereby Command and Require all His Loving Subjects to Discover, Take and Apprehend the said *William Standish* wherever he may be found, and to Carry him before the next Justice of Peace, or Chief Magistrate, who is hereby Required to Commit him to the next Gaol, there to remain until he be thence delivered by due Course of Law. And His Majesty doth require the said Justice, or other Magistrate immediately to give Notice thereof to His Privy Council, or one of the Principal Secretaries of State. And His Majesty doth hereby Publish and Declare, That all Persons who shall Conceal the said *William Standish*, or be Aiding or Assisting in Concealing him, or furthering his Escape, shall be Proceeded against for such Offence, with the utmost Severity according to Law. And His Majesty doth hereby Promise, That whosoever shall Discover and Apprehend the said *William Standish*, and Bring him before some Justice of Peace, or Chief Magistrate, shall Have and Receive the Reward of Five hundred Pounds, for so doing. And We do hereby Authorize and Require Our present Commissioners of Our Treasury, and Our High Treasurer and Commissioners of Our Treasury for the same being, to make Payment of the said Sum accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Fourteenth Day of March 1694. In the Seventh Year of Our Reign.

**Rome, March 5.** The Cardinal *d'Estz*, now Duke of *Madena*, has sent back his Cardinals Cap to the Pope, which makes the 13th Vacancy in the Colledge of Cardinals. The Venetian Ambassidor continues his Instances at this Court in order to hasten the departure of the Popes Gallies to the *Levants*.

**Legborne, March 7.** This week arrived here a Bark in 4 days from *Toulon*, by which we have advice, that two Magazines with Naval Stores were lately burnt there. We do not hear that the French have yet begun to fix out their Fleet in that Port.

**Milan, March 5.** Our Governor the Marquis *de Leganez*, is returned hither from *Turin*. Every thing is ready for forming the Siege of *Cazal*, but the Cold Weather and the abundance of Snow that covers the Ground, have deferred for some days the execution of that design.

**Venice, March 11.** In the beginning of the next week a great Convey will sail from hence with Provisions and Stores for the Venetian Fleet in the *Levant*, and with this opportunity will be sent thither 1000 Land Soldiers, and 150 thousand Zequins in Money. The Letters from the *Morica* tell us, that our Troops had taken such care to secure the Pass at the Isthmus of *Corinth*, that the Turks have not as yet been able to make any Incurrs into that Country, as they intended, having drawn together a Body of Troops for that purpose.

**Warsaw, March 5.** Since the breaking up of the Dyet the King of *Poland* has called together the Senators to consider what is fit to be done in the present Juncture of Affairs for the Security of the Kingdom; Some proposed that another Dyet should be immediately called, but the time of the year not allowing thereof, others were of Opinion that the King should raise the *Arriurban*; The latter was resolved on, and accordingly Circular Letters are to be dispatched to all the Provinces, summoning the Nobility and Gentry to appear in Arms, but the place and time of their Rendezvous are not yet fixed. On the 4th past a great Body of Tartars, commanded by Sultan *Gerey*, Son of their Han, conducted a Convoy of Provisions to *Caminica*, after which they advanced towards *Lemberg*, committing great Spoil with burning and plundering as they marched. The Crown General, who was on the Frontiers, upon notice of it, assembled the Troops that were quartered thereabouts, but by reason of the shortness of the time could not get together more than 3200 Men, a very small number in comparison of the Enemies, who were reported to be 70000. On the 11th the Tartars appeared in sight of *Lemberg*; and thereupon the Crown General posted the Forces before mentioned, so as that they might be best able to cover the Suburbs, which was believed the Enemy designed to attack; as they did the next morning with great fury; The Poles were in a posture to receive them, and charged the Enemy with such vigour, that they beat them off several times; The Tartars finding they could make no impression upon our Troops; while their main Body engaged them in one place, sent a Party of 6000, commanded by two *Murza's*, to attack the Suburbs (which were only fortified with Palisadoes, a Breast-work, and a small dry Ditch) on the other side; where they succeeded, and entered the same; by which means our Troops were cut off from all assistance from the Town; but this served only to animate our Men the more, to preserve so great a number of People as would otherwise have been exposed to the cruelty of the Enemy, and dividing themselves into two Bodies, they fell upon the Tartars, and beat them again out of the Suburbs, which they had already set on fire. The Fight lasted several hours, and at last the Tartars being discouraged by their several Repulses, retired a mile and a half from the Town, the 12th they marched back 3 miles farther, and on the 14th repassed the River *Niester*, having lost in this Action about 3000 Men, and among them 3 of their principal Officers whom they call *Murza's*, and on our side there were but 100 killed and 160 wounded. The Crown General sent out a strong Detachment to observe them: What damage they have done in their retreat we do not yet hear, but the People having had time to leave their Houses, they have not taken many Prisoners, and by this happy defeat of the Enemy their chief design was disappointed, which was to have made a great Ravage in the Country on this side *Lemberg*.

**Vienna, March 12.** Prince *Lewis of Baden* has been present at several Councils of War since his arrival here, and will shortly return to the *Rhine*. The Officers of the Imperial Forces are commanded to repair to their Quarters; and they talk here very much of opening the Campaign in *Hungary* with the Siege of *Temeswar*. The Advices from the Frontiers say, that the Grand Visier is to Command again the Ottoman Army in *Hungary* the next Campaign.

**Paris, March 21.** The Marechal *de Tostreville* went from hence this morning for *Provence* to encourage the People, who are under great allarms along that Coast, fearing an Insult from the Enemies Fleet: Ours at *Toulon* is not yet fitting out: They are making some new Fortifications at *Marseilles*, but go on but slowly for want of Money. The loss of the two Men of War, the *Content* and the *Trident*, which were lately taken by the English in the Channel of *Malta*, disquiets this Court; the more, for that they apprehend the like misfortune may
