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Naples, March 1.

THe Gallies of this Kingdom and of Sicily are making ready in order to joyn about the beginning of the next month with the rest of the Spanish Gallies. They continue to raise Men here for reinforcing the Spanish Troops in Catalonia, as well as the Milaneze.

Rome, March 12. 'Twas expected the Ceremony of the Duke of Modena's resigning his Cardinals Cap would have been performed in the Consistory that was held on Monday last, but it is deferred for some days. The Venetian Ambassador does press the Pope to assist the Republick with some Troops to serve against the Turks in Dalmatia, seeing they are obliged to employ the greatest part of their Forces in the Levant; but all he has hitherto obtained is, that the Pope will continue to send his Gallies with 10 or 1200 Land Men, to their assistance. The Great Duke of Tuscany has put off his Journey to Leretto till the beginning of the next month. Several Persons of Quality are going from hence to be present as Volunteers at the Siege of Cazal, which we are assured by all our Advices from the Milaneze will be speedily undertaken. The Pope cannot yet be prevailed with to make a promotion of Cardinals, tho' he is much pressed in it.

Venice, March 18. There are Embarked 1000 Land Soldiers on the Convoy that lies ready to Sail with the first fair Wind for the Levant, and 2000 more will follow them in a short time; with which, and the other Reinforcements that have been sent to the Venetian Army, we hope they will be in a condition, not only to maintain the Conquests they have already made, but to attack also some other of the Turkish Islands in the Archipelago.

Turin, March 18. Prince Eugene of Savoy went from hence the 13th instant to give the necessary Orders for the march of the German Troops quartered in the Montserrat, and the Burchies of Mantua and Parma, who are to be employed in the Siege of Cazal, and to morrow the Duke of Savoy, accompanied with Prince

Charles of Brandenburg, will part from hence to meet the Governour of Milan, and the Generalls of the Confederate Forces at Frasinet, in order to hold a Council of War, and to fix the time for the Rendezvous of the Troops, and to begin the said Siege, which has been somewhat retarded by the coldness of the weather. The 15th passed by this place two Battalions, who came from Verceil, and are ordered to Mondou, to strengthen the Forces that are posted for the security of the Country on that side; and we hear that a strong Reinforcement will be likewise sent to Coni. The Advices from Dauphine say, the French do all they can to hasten their preparations for the Relief of Cazal, and that they are expecting a Body of Horse from Burgundy; but there lies so much Snow upon the Alps that they cannot yet think of passing them.

Warsaw, March 12. Since the breaking up of the Diet, the Senators have had several Meetings to consider what is to be done for the security and defence of the Kingdom, and have taken such Resolutions as they judge most proper in the present Conjuncture. The Tartars that lately made an Incurtion into the Country about Lemberg, are gone home again, having left the Garison of Caminiec provided with subsistence for several Months. The Differences still continue between the General of Lithuania and the Bishop of Vilna, which do very much disturb the publick Affairs.

Vienna, March 19. The Officers of the Imperial Forces are commanded to repair to their respective Commands; The Recruits that have been raised in these parts are sent to Hungary; and Magazines are provided in such of the Frontier places as may be most convenient for supplying the Army during the Campaign. General Heusser will set out for Hungary in 10 days or a Fortnight, to hasten the Rendezvous of the Imperial Forces; and by the Preparations that are made, 'tis generally believed some Siege is designed. The News from Turkey of the Death of Sultan Achmet, and of Sultan Soliman's succeeding him, is confirmed; as is likewise that of the Grand Vifier's being continued in his Station, with the other principal Officers of the Port. The last Letters from those parts tell us likewise, that their preparations for the recovering of Scio went on very slowly; that the Troops they were drawing together for that Service consisted

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consisted mostly of new raised Men; and that the Grand Visier did decline going to Command in that Expedition. The Marquis d'Esté is arrived here with the Character of Envoy from the present Duke of Modena, and its said he is charged with a Commission to Negotiate about a Marriage between the said Duke and the Princess Dowager of Parma, the Empresses Sister. The Count de Staremburg, President of the Council of War, and Governor of this City when it was last Besieged, had the misfortune some days ago to fall from his Horse and to break his Leg, and he is very dangerously ill.

Frankfort, March 27. The Margrave of Barceith, who Commands the Confederate Forces on the Rhine in the absence of Prince Lewis of Baden, and has at present his Residence at Hailbron, has given out Orders to the Officers to have their Companies compleat, and all things in a readiness to take the Field in May. The French have begun to raise the Poll Tax in Alsace, which is very uneasie to the People who are extremely impoverished by the War.

Falmouth, March 25. On the 23th instant came into Mountsbay two Dutch Men of War, with about 20 sail of Merchant Ships from Ireland, (but last from Milford,) and two Ships from Cadix, and two more from the West Indies; which 4 Ships last mentioned joynd the rest off the Lizard.

Plymouth, March 26. Yesterday in the Evening passed by this Port the Convoy bound to the Streights, which sailed from Spithead the day before, having a very fair Wind. This day came in a Swedish Ship, called the *Susanna*, bound to the Westward.

Portsmouth, March 29. The *Charles Galley* came this day to St. Helens, having taken the 27th instant off *Dungenesse* a French Snaw of 2 Guns, 2 Pattereroes, and 17 Men, belonging to *Dumkirke*, and sent her to *Rye*.

Kenington, March 30.
