

Brussels, April 10. The Duke of Holstein-Ploem went from hence the last week to *Molines*, and returned thither again yesterday in the Evening, together with the Duke of *Wirtemberg*. The *Marschal de Boufflers* was some days ago at *Courtray*, and gave Orders for making a new Line or Fortification between the Rivers *Lys* and *Schelde*, to cover *Courtray* and *Harlebecke*, and we hear since that the French have drawn together a Body of their Troops to protect the Workmen that are employed in this Service; and in order to hinder this design of the Enemies, we are told that the Troops of the Neighbouring Garrisons are ordered to move towards *Flanders*; and part of these quartered in this City will begin their march to-morrow. *Brieadier Lumley* arrived here the last week, and had Audience of their Electoral Highnesses of *Bavaria*, to Compliment them upon their Marriage in the Name of His Majesty of *Great-Britain*. A Party of the Garison of *Huy* has again carried away 3 Vessels laden with Hay that lay in the *Mense* near *Namur*, and missed very narrowly of taking a 4th that had on board several Pieces of Cannon. The French have begun to Bake Ammunition Bread at *Mons* for their Forces that are to assemble near that place.

Hague, April 12. N. S. The States have laid an Embargo upon all Merchant Ships until their Fleet shall be Manned. The Spanish Envoy has made an Agreement with the Owners and Masters of several Ships to Transport 3000 Men from *Flanders* to *Catalonia*; who are to Embark in few days at *Flushing* in *Zeland*. Several Bomb Vessels are fitting out at *Rotterdam*.

Falmouth, April 1. This day came in here the Spanish Expedition in 7 days from *Corunna*. In her passage outward she took a French Ship of 60 Tuns.

Chatham, April 5. This day was Launched at His Majesty's Yard a New Bomb Vessel Named *The Serpent*, built by Mr. *William Lee*, His Majesty's Master Shipwrights Assistan: at the said Yard.

Whitehall, April 6. The Count de *Butlere*, Envoy from the Duke of *Savoy*, had the 4th Instant Audience of Her Royal Highness the Princess, and the next day of His Royal Highness the Prince of *Denmark*, to Condole the Death of the late Queen, to which he was Conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterell* Master of the Ceremonies.

Kensington, April 6. The High Sheriff, Grand Inquest, and Justices of the Peace for the County of *Warwicke*, met at the late Assizes there, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty, in which they Condole the Death of our late Gracious Queen of Blessed Memory, and beg Leave to give His Majesty a faithful Assurance of their readiness to serve His Majesty to the utmost of their Power, in opposition to all His Majesty's Enemies whatsoever; Which was delivered by *William Bromley Esq;* and *Andrew Archer Esq;* Knights of the Shire for the said County.

The High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County of *Cornwall*, do in like manner with the deepest Sorrow Condole the Queens Death, and Assure His Majesty, that they will with their Lives and Fortunes assert His Majesty's Rightful and Lawful Title to these Kingdoms, and Support and Defend His Sacred Person and Government, against all His Enemies at Home and Abroad.

The High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County of *Heresford*, do in an Humble Address to His Majesty, beg Leave to Express themselves to be deeply afflicted for the Death of the late Queen, and under the strictest Obligations of Duty and Gratitude to Assure His Majesty of their firm Adherence and constant Fidelity to His Majesty's Person and Government, and that they will be most vigilant and active in supporting His Majesty's Interest and Government against the open Assaults, and secret Insinuations, of all His Majesty's Enemies, and pretended Friends, whether Foreign or Domestic; Which was delivered by the Right Honourable the Lord *Coningsby*.
