THE Fleet is making ready with all possible diligence; and most of the great Ships are already careened. The 3d Instant arrived here a Dutch Man of War with 8 Merchant Ships from *Plymouth*; and yesterday sailed hence the *Offend* Convoy. Several Men of War are ordered up the *Streights*.

Madrid, March 16. The Preparations are continued in all these parts for reinforcing the Spanish Army in *Catalonia*. The Letters from *Alicant* of the 21th past advise, that 4 great French Ships laden with Corn were lately cast away by a Storm at *Port Negro* on the Coast of *Barbary*. The Moors do still besiege *Centis*; They lately attack'd an Outwork which they had undermined, but were untermind by the Spaniards, and beaten off with great loss. A thousand Men of those that were in *Girona* when it was taken the last year, are ordered to march to *Malaga*, from whence they will be sent to the relief of *Cuba*. The Conde de *Montellano* is made Governor of the Council of the *Indies*. The Galeons will be sent out about *Midsummer*.

Coruna, April 2. The Spanish Expedition Pacquet Boat, Captain *Francis Chies* Commander, arrived here the 30th past from *Falmouth*, and in his Voyage hit upon a French Vessel bound to *Newfoundland*. The last Letters from *Lisbon* give an account, that the Queen of *Portugal* was brought to Bed of a Prince: And that the *Rochester* had brought in a French Ship laden with Fruit.

Leghorne, March 21. Yesterday morning came into this Road the *Southampton*, *Plymouth*, *Falmouth*, *Carlisle*, *Admiral*, and *Newcastle*, in 10 days from *Messina*, where they left their two Prizes the *Contents* and the *Trident*; The said Frigats stayed here but a few hours, and then sailed again to the Westward with some Merchant Ships under their Convoy; hoping to meet with two French Privateers, who went out of this Port the 18th, and were seen yesterday off *Cape Corso*. The *Ruby*, *Bonadventure*, *Prosperous African*, and *Jacob*, are arrived at *Messina* from *Zanz*: We have advice, that the *Princess*, a Merchant Ship that lately sailed from hence on her Voyage homeward, was met and taken near the Island of *Sardinia* by the two French Men of War who were returning to *Ton* from cruising in the Channel of *Malta*, where they lost their two Companions before-mentioned; Most of the Seamen belonging to the *Princess* were sent to *Gallary*; and some of them are come hither.

Turin, March 28. The Duke of *Savoy* went from hence the 19th, and met the Governor of *Milan*, Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, and the other General Officers of the Army at *Prasina*, where they held a Council of War, and went afterwards to view the Ground about *Casal*, in order to the besieging it; A Train of Artillery is ordered thither, and it is said the Troops are to be all before the place by the 2d or 3d of the next month; In the mean time the Duke of *Savoy* is returned hither for a few days. We hear from *Dauphine*, that the French Troops are preparing to pass the Mountains, and that they are to Rendezvous near *Sala*.

Venice, March 28. The great Convoy for the *Levant* set sail on Wednesday last; and another will be ready to follow in a short time, with which will be sent thither a further Reinforcement of 180 Soldiers. We have Advice from the *Mores*, that the Venetian Forces appointed for the Guard of the Isthmus of *Corinth*, had attack'd some

of the Enemies Troops that were posted near *Toebes*, and had routed them, killing 7 or 800 upon the place, and taking several Prisoners. The Senate have received Letters of the 10th Instant from their Fleet, which continued in the Road of *Spalmatori*, near the Island of *Scio*, to observe the Motions of the Enemy, whose Gallies were at *Motelin*, and their Men of War at *Fecis* and *Smirna*. The new Fortifications at *Scio* are finished, and the place in a very good condition to resist the Turks in case they shall make any attempt upon it; For which their preparations go on but slowly.

Vienna, March 30. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* will go from hence the next week to his House in *Bohemia*, where he intends to stay some few days, and then will return to *Germany* to command the Confederate Army on the *Rhine*. Recruits are sent daily to *Hungary*; and the Imperial Forces that are to act on that side are ordered to be at their Rendezvous in *May*; 'Tis not yet declared who shall command them. There is a Discourse, that the Elector of *Saxony* will send some of his Forces to the Emperors assistance in *Hungary*. An Express arrived here yesterday from *Silesia*, with an account, that the Princess *Radzewille*, Wife of Prince *Charles* of *Neubourgh*, was brought to Bed the 22th Instant of a Son, who died the same day, and she the day following; This Princess was Heiress to a very great Estate in *Poland*. The last Letters from *Turkey* say, the new Grand Signior had continued all the great Officers in the several Stations wherein they served his Predecessor; and that the Turks went on with their design to regain *Scio*.

Frankfort, April 6. The Elector of *Mentz* died the 30th of the last month at *Aschaffenburg*, and is succeeded in that Archbishoprick and Electorate by the Bishop of *Bamberg*, who was before his Coadjutor.

Paris, April 8. The French Kings Journey to *Compeigne* remains fixed for the 26th of this month; The General Officers of the Army in *Flanders* are not yet declared; but 'tis generally believed the Chief Command of it will be given to the *Marschal de Villeroy*: A Detachment of 150 Men is ordered to be made out of each Company of the Musketeers, but 'tis not yet said where they are to serve. The *Marschal de Noailles* has sent away his Servants and Baggage to *Catalonia*; and he himself will follow in a day or two, his departure being hastned by the news of another defeat our Troops in those parts have lately received near *Blanes* on the Sea Coast, which place they had quitted, and in their retreat were attack'd by the Spaniards, and after a sharp dispute put to flight; The French lost in this Action 400 Men, besides Officers. The Frigats that have been fitted out at *Rochefort* and other places on the Ocean, are commanded by the *Marquis de Nismind*, (except some that are designed for Voyages to the *West-Indies* and other parts) and they say he is to have with him in all 15 or 20 Sail, whereof 6 are Ships of good force. The great Ships at *Brest* and *Toulon* are laid up. They are very apprehensive at this Court of some Insult upon their Coasts: *Monsieur de Vaubon* is sent to *Brest*, and is made Lieutenant General of the Marine. *Monsieur Philippeaux*, Son of *Monsieur de Ponsbarrin*, is gone to view the Maritime Places of *Provence*, where we are told they are making a floating Machine with Parapets of Cannon proof, on which are to be planted Cannon, to secure the Entrance of the Port of *Marseilles*. A Fleet of between 30 and 40 Sail of French Vessels bound from *Rochelle* to the Westward, were lately attacked by several English and Dutch Frigats, and most of them taken or destroyed; there being only 5 or 10 of them got into *Havre de Grace*.
