Rome, March 19.

Sunday last being the Popes Birth-Day (when he entered into the 81 year of his Age) the usual Complements were made him by the Cardinals and Foreign Ministers. We are told, that the Matter about the Duke of Modenas resigning his Cardinals Cap is now adjusted, and that the Ceremony of it will be performed in a Consistory to be held for that purpose on Monday next; The Treaty that was said to be on foot about a Marriage between him and the Princess Dowager of Parma is not like to go on; that Princess having no inclination to enter into any new Alliance; and they now talk of the said Dukes Marrying with a Daughter of Prince Pamphilia. The design of making Civita-Vecchia a free Port meets with many difficulties, and tis thought it will be quite laid aside at last; among other Objections to it, is that of the unwholesomeness of the Air there. The Chapter of the Church of Freisingen in Germany have, upon the vacancy of that See, made a double Election, part having chosen the Dean, and the rest having postulated the Elector of Cologne, to be their Bishop, and the Matter lies now before the Pope for his determination. The Venetian Ambassador has not obtained the Succors he solicited here, to be sent to Dalmatia, but the Pope has ordered his Gallies to return with those of Malta to join the Venetian Fleet in the Levant. Prince Livio Orsini, Nephew to Pope Innocent XI. is very dangerously ill.

Legborne, March 21. By a Vessel from Argiers, which parted from thence about the beginning of this month, we have advice, that the Forces of that Government, who were lately employed in the War against Tunis, are returned home with a great Booty of Slaves, Gold, Silver, Camels, Mules, &c. greatest part whereof they made themselves Masters of at the taking of the City of Tunis; and the Riches they found in the House of the Bey of Tunis is said to have amounted alone to above Two Millions of Pieces of Eight: The Algerines contented themselves with the plunder they got, and restored to the Tunizeens all the Places they had taken from them. They were fitting out at Argiers 10 Men of War, which they designed for the assistance of the Turks in the Levant in pursuance of the Order they had received from the Grand Signior.

Milan, March 23. Prince Eugene of Savoy went from hence last Saturday towards Mortara; and our Governor the Marquis de Leganes set out the same day with several General Officers, to meet the Duke of Savoy near Casal, and to Concert all Matters about the Siege of that Place; which is finally resolved on; The Troops are accordingly

on their march thither, and they say the Trenches will be opened the 3d or 4th of the next month. In the mean time an Imperial Order has been published in Monferrat, by which all such as are Natives of that Dutchy, and at present in the French Service at Casal, are required to leave the said place in 14 days, upon pain of being treated as Rebels.

Venice, March 28. The Letters from Spalatro of the 6th Instant inform us, that the Batta's of Albania and Bessia had received new Orders from the Ottoman Port to use their utmost Endeavours to regain Cyclus, and that they were making preparations for that purpose; whereupon General Delfino, who commands the Venetian Forces in those parts, had sent 2000 Men to reinforce that Garrison; and had ordered some new Works to be built for its better defence. Several Companies of new raised Men are expected here the next week, and others soon after, who are to be sent by the next Convoy to the Levant, which may be ready in a fortnight or 3 weeks; and by that time two new Men of War of 70 Guns each, will be Equipped, and in a condition to put to Sea.

Vienna, March 30. General Veterani will part from hence the next week for Transylvania; The Imperial Troops who have had their Winter Quarters near the Danube, are ordered to Rendezvous in the Neighbourhood of Essecke, and those in Upper-Hungary near Peter-Waradin; The Discourse continues of their designing to open the Campaign with the Siege of Temeswaer; in order whereunto Magazines are provided in several of our Frontier places. The Vessels that are to serve on the Danube are fitting out, and may be ready by the end of the next month. The King of the Romans was on Tuesday last present in the Emperors Council for the first time.

Cologne, April 5. The Duke of Croÿ began his Journey from hence on Saturday last towards Vienna; It is not yet known whether he is to have any Command in the Emperors Army this Summer. The Elector of Cologne's Regiment of Horse Guards which has at present its Quarters in this Diocess, is ordered to march towards Liege. The Brandenburg Forces that have Wintered in these parts are likewise preparing for a march.

Hamburg, April 8. They write from Berlin, that their Electoral Highnesses of Brandenburg intend to remove from thence about the end of this month to Clevel, to pass greatest part of the Summer there. The Letters from Warsaw of the 19th of March say, the King of Poland had been very much indisposed, but was well recovered; That the Circular Letters for summoning the Arriercban were not yet sent out; and that the Differences between the General of Lithuania and the Bishop of Vilna were gone to such a height, that twas apprehended they might have very ill consequences. There are Letters from Moscow of the

6th of February which advise, that the Czars had resolved to make War upon the Tartars; and had given Orders for drawing together a very numerous Army, which would be commanded by Czar Peter, and was to be at its Rendezvous in the month of May.

Hague, April 12. N. S. The last Letters from Flanders inform us, that the Duke of Holstein-Plou designed to go as this day from Malines towards Dyrise, where a flying Camp is forming to observe the Enemy, who have drawn a Body of their Troops together to cover the Workmen that are employed in casting up a Line between the Lys and the Schelde. 'Tis said the Confederate Forces will be at their Rendezvous about Sunday next. The Spanish Troops designed for Catalonia are to embark at Flushing the 15th of this month.

Falmouth, April 6. On the 3d Instant two French Prizes laden with Wine and Brandy, were brought into Mountsbay, having been taken by two Dutch Privateers: And some days ago came into this Port the Galley of Flushing, John Willard Commander, from cruising on the French Coast, where he took two French Ships, one of which he burnt, and the other was retaken by two French Ships of 18 and 26 Guns.

Yarmouth, April 8. This day came into our Road 20 Sail of laden Colliers bound to the River; and we hear by Letters from Newcastle of the 6th Instant, that a great Fleet of Colliers lay then ready to sail.

Whitehall, April 9. This day was published His Majesty's Proclamation for the Speedy and Effectual putting in Execution the Act of Parliament for Regulating the Measures and Prices of Coals.

Kensington, April 9. The High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen of the County of Gloucester, met at the late Assizes held for the same, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty, in which they beg Leave to testify their real and sincere Grief for the unspeakable Loss His Majesty and His Kingdoms have sustained by the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory; pray for His Majesty's Health, and the Success of His great Undertakings for the Preservation of the Laws and Liberties of these Kingdoms; and do humbly Assure His Majesty of their constant Loyalty and Resolution to stand by and assist Him to the utmost of their Power, against all His Majesty's Secret and Open Enemies; Delivered by the Right Honourable Charles Lord Viscount Dunstons, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

The High Sheriff and Grand Jury for the County of Essex, at their late Assizes, do, in their Humble Address to His Majesty, beg Leave to Condole the Death of the late Queen, and to Assure His Majesty of their Loyalty and Fidelity to His Sacred Person and Government, which they will, to the utmost of their Power, Support and Defend against all His Majesty's Enemies whatsoever; Which was delivered by Sir Rowland Gwyn, Knight of the Shire for the said County.
