Kinsale, March 29.

Yesterday came into this Harbour from the *Groyn* the *Spanish-Alliance* Pacquet-Boat, Captain *Hutchins* Commander, who took near that Coast two Vessels laden with Salt, Wine, and Brandy, from *Rebelle*; The Masters and most of the Men are now on board Captain *Hutchins*, but the two Prizes he sent back to the *Groyn*; He brings an account, that our Fleet at *Cadiz* was fitting out with all imaginable diligence, and would be ready to go to Sea before the end of *March*. This morning came in His Majesty's Ship the *Kings-Fisher*, Capt. *Hicks* Commander, and brought in with him an English Vessel which he re-took from the French.

Kinsale, April 5. On the 30th past sailed from hence the *Pearl* Frigate for *Dublin*; and the *Spanish-Alliance* for *England*; On Wednesday went out the *Kings-Fisher* to look after the French Privateers that have lately appeared on these Coasts, and there having been since much shooting heard to the Westward of the *Old-Head*, is hoped she has met with some of them.

Corke, March 29. This Evening was brought in the Heads of Capt. *Leary* the great *Tory*, and one of his Men, being killed by three of his own Party, whom he designed to have treated in the same manner to obtain his Pardon.

Kilkenny, April 6. On Thursday last, three Dragoons, of the Troop that is quartered here, seized upon three Men near this place, one of which was a Rappery called *Brenan*; who to save himself offered to make great discoveries; but as they were on their return to this place they were set upon by 8 other Rapperies, who lying in a Cabbin fired upon the Dragoons as they passed by, and rescued *Brenan*, but none of our Men being hurt, two of them raised the Country, and the third came hither to give notice of what had happened, whereupon Capt. *Warren* went out immediately with a Party of 25 Dragoons, and about two hours after had fight of the Rapperies, who betook themselves to the Bogs; and the Horse by that means being un-

serviceable, 9 or 10 of the Dragoons quitted their Horses, and pursued them, while the rest surrounded the Bog; and at last killed 4 of them, and took the other 4 Prisoners, who were brought hither, and are now in Gaol.

Dublin, April 9. This morning came into our Bay the *Pearl*, Capt. *Holmes* Commander, from *Kinsale*. The Proclamation that was put out by the Lords-Justices for suppressing the *Tories* or *Rapperies* has very good effect, for we have an account, that the Heads of divers of them have been since brought in, and some by their own Men.

Falmouth, April 6. The 2d Instant came in the *Spanish-Alliance* from the *Groyn*, but last from *Ireland*. The same day arrived here a Danish Ship belonging to *Copenhagen* to lade Tin for *Bilboa*.

Plimouth, April 9. Yesterday came into this Port seven Dutch Men of War from the French Coast, who will sail again so soon as they have taken in some Provisions: This day arrived here three Swedish Merchant Ships from *St. Ubes*, and two Dutch Privateers from cruising.

Yarmouth, April 12. This day passed through our Road 3 Men of War with a Fleet of above 60 Light Colliers bound to *Newcastle*.

Deale, April 12. Yesterday came into the *Downes* about 24 Sail of Coasters from the Westward, with their Convoy, and immediately sailed again for the River.

London, April 13. This day was Launched at *Deptford* a new Bomb Vessel named the *Thunder*, built by Mr. *Edward Snelgrove*.

Kensington, April 11. The Count *de Rantzau*, Chamberlain to the King of *Denmark*, and his Envoy Extraordinary, to Condole the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory, had yesterday his Audience of Leave of His Majesty; and this day of Her Royal Highness the Princess of *Denmark*, Conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterell* Master of the Ceremonies.

Kensington, April 13. The Grand Jury and Second Inquest for the County Palatine of *Chester*, at the Assizes held at the Castle of *Chester* the first

first day of April, made an Humble Address to His Majesty, in which they declare, that although other of His Majesty's Subjects have had earlier opportunities of Expressing their great Grief for the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory, yet none are more deeply affected with the Sense of so irreparable a Loss than they are; They pray for His Majesty's long Reign over us, and Assure His Majesty, that they will, to the utmost of their Power, stand by and support His Majesty and His Government, against all His Enemies both Foreign and Domestick; Which was delivered by the Judges of the Assize there.
