Rome, April 9.

**T**HE French Cardinals have endeavoured to engage the Pope to employ his Offices with the Emperor and the King of Spain, in order to obtain a Neutrality for the Duke of Mantua, but without effect, the Pope declaring, That he will not concern himself in this Matter. The Troops that are to serve on the Ecclesiastical Gallies which are to return to the Levant, are commanded to Embark at Civita Vecchia by the 25th of this month, the Venetian Ambassador pressing the Pope to hasten their departure, and to write to the Great Master of Malta that the Gallies of that Order may be ready to meet them at Messina.

**Genoa, April 9.** There are at present 2400 Germans at Final, and three Regiments more are daily expected there; from whence they are to pals by Sea to Catalonia. By several Barks that are arrived here from Provence we are told; That the French are using all the precautions they can for the security of that Coast. We have an Account by a Vessel from the Coast of Barbary, that the Governments of Argiers and Tripoli had received Orders from the Grand Signior, to send a Squadron of their Ships to the Assistance of the Ottoman Fleet in the Levant.

**Milan, April 15.** The Spanish Troops arrived the 29th of the last month before Casal, but there fell afterwards, for three days together, such abundance of Snow, that they could not begin their Works for the Besieging of that place, which is therefore deferred, and the Forces gone back to their Quarters. Three thousand Soldiers are ordered from hence to Catalonia, and they will march to Final, so soon as the Ships that are to Transport them are arrived there. The Minister that has resided here some time on the part of the Duke of Mantua, is ordered to leave this place.

**Warsaw, March 28.** The Tartars who lately made an Incurison into the Country about Lemberg, are all retired towards Budziack, having made a great Ravage on the Frontiers. The Circular Letters are not yet issued for Summoning the Arxerban, tho' the unsuccessful breaking up of the last Diet makes it necessary to have recourse to this extraordinary method for the defence of the

Kingdom. We have Advice, that the Moscovites are preparing to enter into the Country of the Crim Tartars with a very numerous Army, and to attack Ozow; That the Czar designs to command his Forces in Person; and had sent General Gordon before with 10000 Horse to invest the place; and to secure his own Dominions against the Invasion of the Tartars, while his Forces are employed in this Siege, he has ordered a Flying Camp to be formed on the Borders, under the command of General Shermetow; and the Cossacks (who are subject to the Moscovites) to encamp in another Body for the same purpose.

**Vienna, April 16.** Several Conferences of War have been held here his Week, and the General Officers that assisted at them will now in few days be going to their respective Commands. They continue to talk here of beginning the Campaign in Hungary with the Siege of Temeswar, and that the Imperial Forces will be much earlier in the Field this Summer than they were the last. The Sieur d'Assenberg, who Commands the Emperors Gallies and other Vessels on the Danube, is ordered to have them ready by the middle of the next month, to attend the motions of our Army. The Young Prince of Transylvania continues still at this Court.

**Cologne, April 22.** Three of the Elector Palatine's Regiments are ordered to the Upper Rhine, to join the Confederate Army under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden, and will begin their march thither in few days. The Brandenburg Forces that have had their Winter Quarters in this Diocels, are preparing for their march.

**Hamburg, April 23.** They write from Dresden, that the Elector of Saxony will send a considerable Body of his Troops to the Emperors Assistance in Hungary, under the Command of Lieutenant General Smitzendorf; And from Berlin of the 19th we are told, That the Elector of Brandenburg had put off his Journey to Cleves; and had issued Orders for the Officers of his Troops to repair forthwith to their respective Regiments.

**Edinburgh, April 18.** The Parliament of this Kingdom is by Proclamation farther Adjourned till the 9th day of May next.

**Bristol, April 22.** Last Night arrived here the St. Joseph, of; and from St. Sebastian, laden with Wine and Brandy.

Flemant.

*Plymouth, April 23.* Yesterday arrived here from *Jamaica*, but last from *Scilly*, the *Neptune* of London, *Thomas Harrison* Master; she is a Ship of 250 Tun and 24 Guns, and is richly laden. At the same time came in 5 or 6 Coasters, and three Vessels from *Chester*. This day the *Dreadnought*, *Smirna-Factor*, and *Alborough-Ketch*, with 9 or 10 Merchant Ships, sailed from hence to the Eastward.

*Tar-mouth, April 24.* On Saturday last was lost on the Sand called the *Leman Oar*, a Danish Ship of 500 Tun bound to *St. Ubes*, only the Master and one of the Seamen being saved. On Monday passed through this Road 200 Sail of Light Colliers, under Convoy of two Men of War. We have an Account from *Newcastle*, that a great Fleet of Laden Colliers would sail from thence with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather.

*Portsmouth, April 27.* On Thursday passed by the *Isle of Wight* our Homeward-bound *Canary Fleet* for the *Downes*. Yesterday morning the *Sr. Martin Ketch*, of 10 Guns, *Capt. Galaway* Commander, sailed from *Spithead*, and about 6 Leagues from *St. Helens* was met by two French Privateers, one of 8, and the other of 12 Guns, with whom the *Martin* engaged for the space of three hours, most of the time Board and Board; *Capt. Galaway* was mortally wounded, and thereupon the Boatswain, *William Cooper*, took upon him the Command, and maintained the Fight, till both the Privateers bore away, and the *Sr. Martin* is come in here again, having lost several men.

*Whitehall, April 27.* The Baron de *Velbreuk*, Envoy Extraordinary from the *Electer Palatin*, had the 24th instant his Audience of Leave of His Majesty: And on the 26th of their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of *Denmark*, being Conducted by *Sir Charles Cotterell* Master of the Ceremonies.

*Kensington, April 27.* The Inhabitants of the Town of *Clones*, and Mannor of *St. Tern*, in the Barony of *Dartry* in the County of *Monaghan* in *Ireland*, have made an Humble Address to His Majesty, in which they beg leave to express their great Grief and Concern for the Death of the late Queen of Blessed Memory; And as in the late War in that Kingdom, they appeared among the forwardest in His Majesty's Service under the Name of *Miskilling Men*, so they still offer their Lives, and all that is dear to them, to be employed for the Defence of His Majesty's Person and Government, against all his Enemies whatsoever; Which was delivered by the Right Honorable the Earl of *Suffex*.

The Nobility and Gentry of the County of *Kildare*, and the Grand Jury, High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, and others, assembled at the Assizes held for the County of *Catherlough*, have likewise made Humble Addresses of Condolence to His Majesty upon the occasion of the Queens Death, with repeated Assurances of their Duty and Zeal for promoting His Majesty's Service in their respective Stations, and contributing all that

depends on them for the Defence and Support of his Government against all his Enemies. Which Addresses His Majesty accepted very Graciously.
