*Danzicke, April 12.*

**T**HE Letters from *Warsaw* of the 5th instant inform us, That the King of *Poland* was very well recovered of his late Indisposition; That the Senators had met several times to consider what is fit to be done in the present juncture of Affairs; and had resolved to summon all the Gentry to appear in the Field on Horseback for the defence of the Kingdom; which resolution the King had approved of, but he had not yet caused the necessary Orders to be issued, for calling the Arrierban together. The Tartars, who conducted the last great Convoy to *Caminnic*, and afterwards made a Ravage on the Borders of *Poland*, are all gone home again, to defend their own Country against the *Moscovites*, who are making preparations to fall upon them with a very numerous Army.

*Vienna, April 16.* General *Veterani* will return in few days to *Transilvania*, with Orders to draw together the Imperial Troops that are quartered in those parts; who, 'tis said, are to be at their Rendezvous by the middle of the next month; The Forces which are to compose the Emperor's main Army are to assemble between *Buda* and *Essecke*; and General *Heusler*, and the Count *de Staremberg*, will be going for *Hungary* some time the next week. The Count *de Techerin*, the Emperors Ambassador in *Poland*, is recalled home.

*Hailbron, April 19.* The Imperial Forces who are to act on the *Upper Rhine* this Summer, under the Command of Prince *Lewis of Baden*, are to have their General Rendezvous near this City; and several Regiments of Horse are already come into this Neighbourhood, where they are quartered in the Villages. In the mean time they continue to work with great diligence on the Fortifications of this City, which

will now be finished in a short time. Some French Regiments have been encamped near *Neustadt*, and from thence are marched towards *Philipsburgh*.

*Berlin, April 19.* The Baron *de Heyde* is on his departure from hence to Command the *Brandenburgh* Forces, who have had their Winter-quarters in the Diocess of *Cologne*; and Lieutenant General *Brandt* is going to *Hungary* to Command those Troops of his Electoral Highness which are in the Service of the Emperor.

*Francfort, April 20.* Two days ago arrived here Prince *Charles of Lorraine*, Son of the Prince *de Vaudemont*, in his way towards *Hungary*, where he designs to make the next Campaign; A Regiment of Horse, and another of Foot, of the Prince of *Hesse Darmstadt*, who are quartered in the Country hereabouts, have received Orders to march to *Hungary*; and 'tis said they will be followed by some other Regiments now in the pay of the Elector *Palatin*. The Imperial forces in these parts are preparing for their march; and we are told that they are to be at their Rendezvous by the middle of the next month. The *Mareschal de Lorge* is expected at *Strasbourg* in 10 days or a Fortnight; and the French Troops, which have Wintered in *Burgundy*, begin to move towards *Alsace*. Prince *Lewis of Baden* is shortly expected at *Hailbron*; where the Margrave of *Bareith* resides at present, to Command in his absence the Confederate Forces quartered near the *Rhine*.

*Cologne, April 22.* The Elector *Palatin's* Regiment of Horse Guards is ordered to march towards the *Upper Rhine*; from whence is expected a Bavarian Regiment of Cavalry, which is to serve this next Campaign in *Flanders*. The States of *Bergues* and *Juliers* are to meet at *Dusel-dorpt* to morrow. The *Brandenburgh* Forces that have Wintered in this Diocess will leave their Quarters in few days, and 'tis thought they will take their march towards the *Meuse*.

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**Cologne, April 23.** The Elector of Cologne continues his Residence in this City, and there is as yet no talk of his removing from hence. We hear that the Confederate Forces are going to form a Camp in *Brabant*.

**Hamburg, April 22.** The Count de Raventlau has raised in these parts a Regiment of 2000 men for the Emperors Service, who are to march to *Ausburg*, and from thence to *Piedmont*. They write from *Dresden*, That the Elector of Saxony is to send 6000 men to the Emperor's Assistance in *Hungary*.

**Castlebaron in Ireland, April 19.** Last night came in here the *Roebuck* Fireship, who on the 16th instant being in Company with His Majesty's Ships the *Hope* and *Anglesey*, (the Captain and Mountague being separated from them two days before) fell in about 4 in the afternoon with 5 French Men of War, the least of them carrying above 50 Guns, against whom they engaged till night, when the *Roebuck* parted from them.

**Pembroke, April 21.** On Friday last came into our Harbour the *Upton Galley*, Captain *Martell* Commander; and the *Russell Galley*, Captain *Ellton* Commander, both from *Legherne*, but last from *Cadix*.

**Plymouth, April 28.** The 26th instant came in here a Swedish Merchant Ship laden with Planks and Deals for *Lisbon*.

**Newcastle, April 28.** Yesterday came in about 80 sail of light Colliers, under Convoy of two Men of War, the *Bonadventure* and *Winchester*. The laden Fleet will sail with the first fair Wind.

**Deale, April 30.** Yesterday arrived in the *Doroves* our homeward bound *Canary* Fleet, under Convoy of His Majesty's Ships, the *Rupert*, *Prudence*, *Woolwich*, and *Blaze* Fireship; and in the afternoon came in a Dutch Man of War, with 14 Sail of Merchant Ships from the Westward, bound for *Ostend* and *Holland*. Last night came in His Majesty's Ships the *Dreadnought* and *Smirna* Factor, with two Merchant Ships from *Jamaica*, and about 50 Coasters. The *Canary* Ships are sailed for the River.

**Kensington, April 30.** The Mayor, Bayliffs, Vicar, Free Burgeffies, Commonalty, and others the Protestant Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of *Clomell* in the County Palatin of *Tipperary* in *Ireland*, have made an humble Address to His Majesty, in which they Condole the Death of the late Queen, and humbly offer their Lives, and all that is Dear to them, for the Defence of His Majesty's Government against all His Enemies; which His Majesty accepted very Graciously.
