Barcelona, April 15.

**T**HE Marquis de Gastanaga has received an Account by Express from Olor, that the Serjeant Major Don Raymondo de Sala, who Commands the Spanish Troops Quartered thereabouts, understanding that the French intended to send a Convoy of Provisions from *Bejala* to relieve the Garrison of *Cassel Follet*, which was in much want thereof, he detached the 12th Instant 5 Troops of Dragoons, with some Miquelets and Country People, to observe the motions of the Enemy, and followed himself with another Body of men; A Party of the Miquelets, who were in the Vanguard, met near *Cassel Follet* 25 French Soldiers; who, upon sight of our men, retired to a strong House, where, after some little resistance, they yielded at discretion; The Garrison of *Cassel Follet*, in the mean time, sent out a Party to succour them, but they were beaten back. Soon after our Troops came up with Two Thousand French Foot, and 500 Horse, who were marching with the Convoy of Provisions, laden on 100 Mules, to *Cassel Follet*, and after a Fight of three hours Routed them; of the Enemy 400 were killed, of which number was a Colonel and several other Officers, and about 300 taken Prisoners, there being among the latter 4 Captains and 5 Lieutenants of the Regiment of *Alsace*; two Captains and one Lieutenant of the Regiment of *Dillon*; one Captain and a Lieutenant of the Swiss Regiment of *Manuel*, with 3 or 4 other Officers, and 9 Serjeants. The loss on our side in this Action was inconsiderable.

*Cádiz*, April 23. Yesterday arrived here from *England* a Fleet of Storeships, Victuallers, Bomb-Ketches, Transport-Ships, and Merchant-men, making in all about 60 Sail, under Convoy of several Men of War commanded by Capt. *Warren*. Admiral *Ruffel* will now very speedily go to Sea with the Fleet. 'Tis said the Gallions and Flota will depart for the *West-Indies* about July next. Yesterday were sent from hence 1200 men for the reinforcing of the Garrison of *Couta*; which, makes so vigorous a defence, that 'tis believed the Moors will at last be obliged to quit the Siege.

*Madrid*, April 28. The good success which our Troops have lately had in *Catalonia*, has given a new turn to Affairs on that side; The last Advices from thence say, the Spaniards had so frightened the Garrison of *Cassel Follet*, that they believed the Enemy would in a short time be necessitated to deliver up that place. The Marquis de *Gastanaga*, Viceroy of that Country, makes preparations in order to have a considerable Army on Foot this Summer; which will be strengthened by 7000 Germans and Italians, who are to come from the *Milanese*; and are to Embark at *Rinal* and *Gemma*.

*Turin*, May 2. The Duke of *Savoy* went hence this morning to view the new Line of Circumvallation, on which they are now Working to streighten *Cuzal*; They have already made it from the *Pa* to the Citadel, being 15 Foot in breadth, and in few days more it will be quite finished; There remain about 4000 Foot and 1000 Horse to Guard the said Line; and upon his Royal Highness's arrival at *Frasinet* (where the Train of Artillery still continues) a Council of War will be held; to resolve whether yet to undertake the Siege of *Cuzal* this Spring, or to Bombard it. The French Troops do not yet draw together; and 'tis said that part of the Cavalry, which has Wintered near the Frontiers of *Piedmont*, are ordered to march to the *Rhina*.

*Vienna*, April 30. The 8000 Saxons that are to serve in *Hungary* are already on their march, being to join the rest of the Imperial Forces by the middle of June, at their Rendezvous near *Buda*; and the Elector himself will be going thither very speedily. General *Caprara* is very ill, and so weak, that if he recovers, he will hardly be able to go into the Field this Summer. General *Veserant* parted from hence last Saturday for *Transylvania*. The Advices from the Frontierstell us, that the Turks are making preparations at *Belgrade* for the Reception of the Grand Signior, who they say will be there before the end of the next month.

*Frankfort*, May 12. The Confederate Forces that are to act on the *Upper Rhine*, are to be at their Rendezvous near *Halbron* by the 25th of this month; and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is expected there about the same time. They write from *Alsace*, that the Mareschal de *Lorge* will be at *Strasbourg* about 8 days hence, and that the first Encampment of the French Forces this Campagne is to be near *Landau*.

*Cologne*, May 13. The Brandenburg Forces that have Wintered in this Diocesis, will begin their march the 24th Instant towards the *Musele*. Six thousand Munsterins march towards the *Rhine*, where they are to serve this Summer.

*Paris*, May 13. The French King leaves *Compiagne* this day, stays two days at *Liancourt*, and will be the 17th at *Versailles*. The French Forces in *Flanders* are to Rendezvous near *Mabeuge*; as they did the last year, and the Mareschal de *Villeroy*, who is to command them, purposes to be there about the end of this month; Mareschal de *Boufflers* is to act with a separate Army on the *Musele*; The Count de *Montal* commands another Body of Troops about *Dunkirk*. And there is to be a Flying Camp under Monsieur de *Roxan*, between *Ipres* and *Espierre*. The Mareschal de *Lorge* will set out on Sunday next for *Germany*. They continue to provide for the security of our Sea Coasts; At *St. Malo* there are above 200 Pieces of Cannon and 28 Mortars placed on Batteries; and the like care has been taken at *Brest*. We have an Account that the Marquis de *Nesdem*, who is abroad with 5 Men of War, met the 10th past with two English

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English Frigats and a Fireship, and took one of them called the *Hope*, Captain *Robinson* Commander, and sent her to *Belle Isle*; Captain *Robinson* maintained a Fight against the said 5 French Men of War; from 5 in the Evening till 12 at Night, when he was forced to yield having lost many of his men, and being himself wounded, and his Main-Mast shot down. One of the French Ships had Twelve men killed and Forty wounded, and the rest lost likewise divers men.

*Brussels, May 15.* - The Confederate Forces in these Provinces will take the Field in few days. The Prince de *Vaudemont* goes hence to morrow, to command a considerable Body of them near *Denvs*; The rest are to Rendezvous near *Ninove*; and the Elector of *Bavaria*; and the Duke of *Holstein Pleetz*, will be going thither in 3 or 4 days. Several Regiments drawn out of the Garrisons of *Liege*, and *Maastricht*, are come to *Parc* near *Louvain*; and it's said they are to march from thence towards *Flanders*. Count *Serclaes* of *Tilly* is to command a Body of Horse and Foot on the *Meuse*; and there will be a Flying Camp near this City. The Forces designed for *Catalonia* marched two days ago towards *Zealand*, in order to their Embarking. The French will assemble their main Army between *Mons* and *Mabeuge*; and the Marechal de *Boufflers* is to form a Camp on the *Meuse*. The Advices from the New Conquests tell us, that the French design to keep within their Lines this Summer; and for the more easie march of their Troops to succour one another as there may be occasion, 'tis said they are going to make a Way, half a quarter of a League broad, from *Namur* to *Dunkirk*.

*Hague, May 17. N.S.* Don *Bernardo de Quiros* the Spanish Envoy, went hence yesterday for *Zealand*; to see the Troops Embark which are going from *Flanders* to *Catalonia*. Lieutenant Admiral *Allemond* sailed out of the *Texell* on Saturday last with 3 Men of War; And the Ambassador *Van Brandt* parted yesterday from *Helvoet-Sluis* for *England*. They write from *Maastricht*, that Nine Regiments are marched from thence towards *Flanders*. The States of *Holland* met this day.

*Plymouth, May 7.* The 5th Instant put in here a Danish Ship called the *New-Church* of *Bergen* bound for *Lisbon*. This day came in from the Eastward five Outward-bound *East-India* Ships, with some other Merchant-men, under Convoy of several Men of War.

*Newcastle, May 7.* On Sunday last about 100 Sail of Laden Colliers got over the *Bar*, and sailed the next day with their Convoy. And about the same time passed by divers Vessels bound from *Scotland* to *Holland*, under Convoy of two Frigats.

*Yarmouth, May 8.* This day came into our Road about 70 laden Colliers, who informs us, that the rest of the Fleet is not far off; They came out from *Newcastle* last Saturday, being about 100 Sail. Two Vessels are arrived here from *Holland*, whence they came in company of about 30 Sail under Convoy of two Men of War, who are gone for *Harwich*. The *Prince George*, with Recruits from *Scotland*, came in this day; and in the Evening sailed again for *Holland*.

*Poissinmouth, May 10.* Yesterday came to *Spithead* the *Essex-Prize* from *Guernsey* and *Jersey*; in her passage thither she gave chase to two small French Capers, carrying one Gun and 30 men each, and took one of them which she has brought in with her.

*Deal, May 10.* The 8th Instant came into the Downs Lieutenant Admiral *Allemond*, with three Dutch Men of War from *Holland*; And the next morning he came ashore and went for *London*. And in the Afternoon, the *Montague*, and the said three Dutch Men of War, sailed for the *Gunfleet*, to join the rest of the Men of War that lye there under the Command of Sir *George Rooke*, to attend His Majesty in his Passage over to *Holland*.

*Kensington, May 8.* His Majesty has been pleased to Create the Right Honorable *William de Nassau-Seigneur de Zulestein*, a Baron, Viscount, and Earl of this Kingdom, by the Name and Style of *William Zulestein Baron of Enfield, Viscount Epbridge, and Earl of Rockford*.
