

GENERAL ORDER OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (TUBERCULOSIS) REGULATIONS, 1918.

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled:—

To the Councils of the several Metropolitan Boroughs, Municipal Boroughs, and other Urban Districts in England and Wales:—

To the Councils of the several Rural Districts in England and Wales:—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1916, and by the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1917, We, the Local Government Board, altered the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1912 (herein-after referred to as "the Regulations of 1912"), so as to provide for the transmission to the Army Council, or to the Chief Commissioner of Medical Services, by every Medical Officer of Health, of the name and other specified particulars of every male person between certain specified ages entered in the Register kept by the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of sub-division (2) of Article XI. of the Regulations of 1912:

Now, therefore, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by the several Statutes in that behalf, We do by this Our Order rescind the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1916, and the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1917, and do alter the Regula-

tions of 1912 and make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—Expressions in these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears, have the same meaning as the like expressions have in the Regulations of 1912.

ARTICLE II.—(a) Every Medical Officer of Health shall forthwith send to the Chief Commissioner of Medical Services, Ministry of National Service, Westminster, London, S.W. 1, in the form shown in the Schedule to this Order, a list containing the names and other specified particulars of all male persons entered in the Register kept by the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of sub-division (2) of Article XI. of the Regulations of 1912 who were between the ages of forty-five and forty-nine years on the first day of January, 1916.

(b) Every Medical Officer of Health shall send to the said Chief Commissioner of Medical Services the name and other specified particulars of every male person between the ages of sixteen and fifty-three years hereafter entered in the said Register within a week after the entry is made therein.

ARTICLE III.—All information received in pursuance of these Regulations and of the Regulations hereby rescinded shall be regarded by every person who has access thereto as confidential.

ARTICLE IV.—Any expenses incurred by a Medical Officer of Health in carrying out the duties imposed upon him by these Regulations and by the Regulations hereby rescinded shall be defrayed by the Local Authority of the District for which he is Medical Officer of Health.

ARTICLE V.—This Order may be cited as the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1918, and shall be in force during the continuation of the present War.
