HE 18th Instant returned into this Port the 6 English Frigats that failed from honce fome time ago, having left at Mession the two French Ships carrying 70 and 56 Guns each, which they took in the Channel of Males. The 20th Admiral Russel eaused Male a. The 20th Admiral Raffel caused the whole fleet to fire their Guos, at a minutes distance between every one, on the occasion of the Queens Funeral. The 21th being the Day of His Majesty's Coronation, it was observed by the Ships putting out all their Colours and Penints, and firing of Guis. The 22th arrived here the great Convoy from England, consisting in 60 Sail; whereupon the Admiral immediately lossed his Toplail, and the whole fleet lies now ready to purto Saa with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather. Malaz, April 26. The Spaniards have lately been very stockful in Caralonia, having taken and killed above 1500 French in three Rencounters; And Troops are marching from all the parts of this kingdom to reinforce our Army there against the next Campagne. Yesterday Embrach dere 2500 Soldiers on Satees, and other Vessels, being designed for Barcelona.
