Turin, May 16.

OUR Forces are still in their Quarters, except those that are employed in Guarding the New Line about *Cazal*. The Duke of *Savoy* is returned hither; and the Marquis de *Leganes* gone back to *Milan*. The French Troops do not yet begin to move on our Frontiers.

Vienna, May 18. The Emperors Forces in *Hungary*, are on their march to the place appointed for their Rendezvous near *Buda*, where they are all to be by the end of this month. General *Veterani* assembles the Imperial Troops on the Frontiers of *Transylvania* to give the Enemy a Diversion. They write from the Frontiers, that a Party of 80 Turks belonging to the Garison of *Sabatx* appeared the first Instant near *Peter Waradin*, and carried away some of the Country People; upon notice whereof, a Detachment of 100 Hussars was sent from *Peter Waradin*, but they did not meet the Enemy. They use great diligence to finish the Fortifications of that place, and to demolish all the Works that were made the last year while the Turkish Army was Encamped there.

Frankfort, May 26. The Confederate Forces draw together near *Hailbron*, where the Forces of *Suebia* and *Franconia* are already arrived with some other Troops. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* continues at *Gunsburg*, but is expected in the Army about the beginning of the next month. The French are not yet together in any considerable Body; 'Tis still said that their Rendezvous is to be near *Neustadt*.

Paris, May 27. The French King went the 25th to *Marli*, where he will pass some time. The Mareschal de *Lorge* set out the same day for *Germany*, to Command together with the Mareschal de *Choiseul* the French Army on the *Rhine*. The Mareschal de *Villeroi* is gone for *Flanders*, where the Duke of *Chartres* is to Command the Horse under him, and the Prince of *Comi* the Foot; but they are both still here, and have yet set no time for their departure. The General Assembly of the Clergy began the 25th at *St. Germain* in the usual manner. They write from *Rouen* of the 25th, that they are very busy all along the Coasts, to provide for their security against any attempt from the Enemy,

and more particularly at *Havre de Grace*, *Harsleur*, *Quillebeuf*, and other places which lye most exposed; the Inhabitants there having great apprehensions of their being Bombarded. They have the same fears on the Coasts of *Provence*, and use the same precautions for their Defence. They write from *Pignerol* of the 18th, that the Allies had finished their Line about *Cazal*, and that the place was very closely Block'd up. All the Letters from *Catalonia* say, that the French Army on that side is very much weakened by the Losses they have suffered, and will need a great reinforcement to put them upon the same foot they were the last Year.

Brussels, May 29. The Forces of the Allies which drew together at *Sellick* continue still in that Camp, where two Bavarian Regiments of Cuirassiers, who have had their Winter Quarters in *Guelderland*, are expected to morrow or the day following. The English Forces assemble between *Ghent* and *Deynse*, under the Command of the Prince de *Vaudemont*. We hear that the Mareschal de *Villeroi* is returned from the French Court, and that he arrived the 26th Instant at *Valenciennes*; The Army he is to Command, has Orders to draw together near *Courtray*. The Mareschal de *Boufflers* came the 25th to *Mabeuge*, and went from thence towards *Namur*, being to Command a separate Army on the *Meuse*. They write from *Tournay*, that the French, since their making of the new Line reaching from *Courtray* to *Avelghem* between the two Rivers the *Lys* and the *Schelde*, have resolved to Demolish the old Line between *Menin* and *Pons Esperier*. The Count de *Montal* is forming a Flying Camp near *Dunkirk*.

Hague, May 31. The King went from hence yesterday to *Zwylstein*, and this Night His Majesty will be at *Loos*; On Saturday His Majesty intends to go to *Breda*, and to be the next day, or on Monday, with the Army near *Ghent*. Sir *George Rooke* left this place yesterday, in order to Embark for *England*. Lieutenant Admiral *Allemonde* will sail in 7 or 8 days with the Dutch Men of War that are to join the English Fleet in the Channel. The Spanish Envoy is returned from *Zealand*, where the Forces designed to *Catalonia* were ship'd on Friday last; but they were not gone to Sea yesterday, staying for a fair Wind. The Letters from *Cadix* of the 2d of this month tell us, That the Fleet under the Command of Admiral *Russel* lay ready to sail with the first opportunity of Weather; And the Letters from *Madrid* of the 12th say, an Express was come in just as
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the Post was going away, with an Account that the Fleet was sailed from *Cadix*, directing their course towards the *Streights*. The same Letters tell us also, That the *Miquelets* had cut off another Party of 100 French in *Catalonia*, of whom 60, with the Officer that Commanded them, were taken Prisoners, and the rest killed; and that the French had quitted *St. Felix de Guxola*, a Maritime Town near *Palamos*, where the French have had a Garison ever since the ending of the last Campaign.

Dublin, May 17. There are now in this Bay His Majesty's Ships the *Anglesea*, *Douir-Prize*, and *Shoreham-Galley*; The last arrived here yesterday from *Holyhead*. We have an Account from *Carrickfergus*, that His Majesty's Ships the *Dolphin* and the *Pearle*, with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy, passed by that place on Monday last to the Northward with a fair Wind; and the next day arrived in that Port the *Kings-Fisher*. They write from *Limerick* of the 14th, that one of His Majesty's Ships had some days before taken a Vessel near that Harbours mouth, which was laden from thence with Butter for *Dunkirk*.

Falmouth, May 20. Yesterday morning put into this Port two Flushing Privateers, who have taken a small Vessel bound from *Ireland* to *France*, and retaken an English Ship laden with Sugar from the *West-Indies*. The same day arrived here the *Young William* of *Flushing*, Captain *Jacobson* Commander, from *Guinea*; who gives an Account, that the *Charles*, Commanded by one *Avery* (who run away from the *Groynes* the last Year, being one of the three Ships that were fitted out by Don *Arthuro de Bruin* for the Spanish *West-Indies*) had ranged along that Coast, and had taken two Danish Ships richly laden; and that he intended to go and continue his Pyracies in the Red Sea; Four or five of the Danes are come Passengers in this Ship; The rest were prevailed with by *Avery*, to go with him.

Plimouth, May 21. His Majesty's Ship the *Weymouth*, Captain *Jumper* Commander, has within these three or four days taken near *Scilly* a French Privateer of 14 Guns. Yesterday came in the *Mary* Transport Ship from *France*, and brought over Captain *Robinson*, late Commander of the *Hope*, and the Seamen that were taken in that Frigate and the *Dartmouth*. This day sailed from hence the Merchant Ships bound to *Newfoundland* with their Convoy.

Portsmouth, May 24. The 22th passed by this place to the Westward, His Majesty's Ships the *Sterling-Castle*, *Dreadnought*, and *Kent*.

Deal, May 24. Yesterday in the Afternoon sailed out of the *Downes* His Majesty's Ships the *Lincoln* and the *Lyon*, to the Northward; And this day came in a Genouese from *Leghorne*.

Whitehall, May 23. This day the Right Honorable *John Smith* Esq; one of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, was Sworn of His Majesty's most Honorable Privy-Council, and took his place at the Board. And *Christopher Masgrave* Esq; was Sworn Clerk of the Council in Extraordinary.
