Naples, May 10.

There are now going to Embark 500 Soldiers which have been raised in this Kingdom, to recruit the Neapolitan Regiments in the Service of the State of Milan. The Gallies of this Kingdom will part from hence about the 20th of this month for *Catalonia*; and the Duke of *Turfi's* Squadron which is daily expected here, is ordered to join them.

Rome, May 21. The Pope has ordered 600 Soldiers to Embark on his Gallies, which may be ready to sail from *Civita Vecchia* towards the end of this month for the *Levant*. The Venetian Ambassador has not been able to obtain the Assistance which he has solicited at this Court to be employed in *Dalmatia*.

Milan, May 27. Our Governor the Marquis de *Leganez* is still in the Camp before *Cazal*; and we are informed by our last Letters from thence, that the new Line of Circumvallation, and the Redoubts, will be finished in few days, by which that place is so closely block'd up, that the Garrison cannot for the future receive any Relief from the Neighbouring Country, as they have formerly done. We are told, that the Marquis de *Leganez*, so soon as he returns from *Montferriat*, will go to *Final* to Review the Troop that are to Embark there for *Catalonia*.

Venice, May 27. The Convoy that is now fitting here for the *Levant* will be ready in 10 or 12 days, and with it will be sent thither several Companies of new raised Soldiers. The last Letters from the *Morea* say, the Venetian Fleet would sail about the middle of this month from *Napoli di Romania*; and that General *Steinau* was marched with most of the Land Forces towards the *Isthmus of Corinth*. We have Advice from *Barbary*, that the Algerines have resolved to send 10 of their Ships to join the Turkish Fleet. All things are very quiet in *Dalmatia*.

Turin, May 28. The French Troops continue still in their Quarters on the Frontiers of *Dauphine*; and the *Marschal de Catinat* has, in the mean time, been to visit the Garrisons of *Pignerol*, *Susa*, and other places. Most of the Duke of *Savoy's* Foot is marched to *Cazal*; and the Horse is to Rendezvous near *Orbassan*.

Vinna, May 28. A considerable Body of the Imperial Forces is already Encamped near *P. B.*, and the rest of the Regiments, who are to serve on the *Danube*, have Orders to harken their march thither. The Saxon Troops march by the nearest way to the *Danube*, where Boats are provided to carry them to *Buda*; The Horse marches through *Bolonia*; and the Elector is expected here about the 10th of the next month to receive the Emperors Instructions. General *Petersani* continues to assemble his Forces on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, to give the Enemy a Diversion on that side; and a Flying Camp is going to be formed near *Peter-Waradin*. The Imperialists continue to work with great diligence on the Fortifications of that place, and of *Esicke*. The Letters from *Turkey* tell us, that since Sultan *Mustapha's* coming to the Throne several alterations have been made at that Court; and first *Archmet* Bassa *Caimacan* of *Adrianople* was disgraced; his Goods seized, and he made a Prisoner the 17th of February, but at the Intercession of the *Vizier* was afterwards pardoned, and made Governor of *Mecelino*, and *Necisngi* Bassa succeeded in his place; The 18th of March *Mehemed Effendi* then *Cadilesker* of *Romelia* was made *Musli*, and his Predecessor banish'd to *Egypt*; and several changes were made among the Officers of the *Seraglio*; *Hoffian* Bassa Brother in Law to the present Sultan, and formerly Governor of *Sise*, was called to Court from his Banishment, and made 5<sup>th</sup> *Caimacan* of *Adrianople*; The Government of *Egypt* is given to *Ismael Bassa*, formerly Governor of *Damascus*; and his Successor is the *Cadilesker* of the late Sultan *Achmet*; and some other alterations have been made in the Governments of Provinces. The same Letters say, that the Sultan continues in the Resolution of Combing his Army in Person this Campaign, and that Orders were sent to the Frontiers to have all things in

a readines against his arrival at *Belgrad*; where the Turks begin to assemble their Troops, and have brought together a great many Armed Vessels which are to be employed on the *Danube*.

Hailbron, June 4. The Confederate Forces that Rendezvoused at *Sondheim*, pass'd the *Neckar* yesterday, and Encamped at *Great Gartach*, where they will be joined by the *Palatin* Troops and other Regiments that are now on their march. The French have their first Camp between *Landau* and *Neustadt*, where the *Marschal de Lorge* is said to be arrived from the French Court.

Cologne, June 7. The Forces are now every where in motion; On the *Upper-Rhine* the Confederate Army was, by our last Letters, encamped near *Gartach*, and the French near *Neustadt*. The Troops of *Hesse* and *Munster* form a Camp near *Mentz*. The *Brandenburgers* march to the *Maese*, their Rendezvous being appointed at *Vifer*.

Hague, June 15. N. S. The two Envoys who have been here some time in joint Commission from the Prince of *Liege*, had the 6th Instant their Audience of Leave of the *States General*, and are since returned home. The Prince of *Friseland* returned hither the 8th, having been to view the Bomb Ships in the *Maese*, which now stay only for a fair Wind.

Dublin, May 31. On the 26th arrived here 23 Expreis from *England*, who brought over His Majesty's Commission, constituting my Lord *Capell* Lord Deputy of this Kingdom, and the next morning his Excellency was Sworn in the usual manner; On which Occasion the Cannon were discharged; The Soldiers who were in Arms gave several Volleys, and at night there were Bonfires, with other Expressions of a General Satisfaction. The 23d arrived at *Baltimore* the *Swift of Bristol*, burthen 100 Tun, with Sugar, Cotton, and Indigo, in 8 weeks from *Jamaica*, bound to *Bristol*; and the *Fortune of Liverpool* is come into *Loughswilly*, near *Londonderry*, from *St. Christophers*. They write from *Belturbat* of the 22th, that the day before was taken one *Macquire*, a famous Tory, and sent to *Cavan Gaol*. Yesterday was published here a Proclamation by the Lord Deputy and Council, by which, in regard it is found that the *Coyns Currant* in this Kingdom, have, of late, by reason of the great rise of the value thereof in other parts, been carried away in such great quantities, that without speedy Remedy this Kingdom will be so dreyned of them, that there will not be left sufficient to carry on the necessary Commerce and Trade, at home and abroad; and that the raising of the Foreign *Coyns* of Gold and Silver Currant in this Kingdom, will be the most effectual means to prevent the aforesaid Mischiefs; 'Tis declared and ordered, that the several sorts of Foreign *Coyns* hereafter mentioned, now Currant in this Kingdom, shall from henceforth pass and be accepted in Payments and Receipts at the Rates hereafter mentioned, viz. A Spanish or French Pistol of Gold weighing 4 peny weight 8 grains to pass at 21 sh. and the half Pistol proportionably; The *Ducatoon* weighing 20 peny weight 16 grains to pass

at 6 sh. 8 d. and the half 2nd quarter Ducaton proportionably; The Piece of Eight of Mexico or Sevil, all Dollars and the French Louis weighing 17 penny weight to pafs at 5 sh. 4 d. and the half Pieces of the same proportionably; The Old *Pistru* Piece of Eight weighing 17 penny weight to pafs at 4 sh. 10 d. and the half and quarter pieces of the same proportionably; The Crusado of Portugal weighing 10 penny weight 20 grains to pafs at 3 sh. 6 d. and the half Crusado proportionably. And in case any of the said Pieces shall want of their respective weights, then allowance is to be given of 2 d. for each grain of Gold, and 3 half pence for each half penny weight in Silver; and the Weights new in use in this Kingdom by virtue of a Proclamation issued in the year 1683, and no other, are to be still used for the weighing all the several Coyns above-mentioned, as formerly.

Dublin, June 3. The Letters from Londonderry of the 26th past inform us, that His Majesty's Ships the *Kings-Fisher*, *Anglesey*, *Dolphin*, and *Pearle*, were come into *Loughswilly* for fresh Water, and would sail again a cruising the next day.

Edinburgh, June 1. The Parliament sat yesterday, and all their time was taken up with private Business, after which they Adjourned till Monday morning.

Guernsey, May 25. Capt. Stephens Commander of the *Guernsey* Galley Privateer, cruising on the Coast of *Britany*, took some days ago a French Privateer called the *Noftre-Dame of Morlaix*, carrying 4 Guns, 4 Patereroes, and 50 Men, as also a Vessel of 50 Tun laden with Tin, and brought both these Prizes to *Guernsey*. Capt. Stoly, Commander of another *Guernsey* Privateer, hath lately brought in 3 other Prizes laden with Wine, Salt, and Brandy.

Plymouth, June 4. Yesterday arrived here the *Sea-flower* with Tobacco, Logwood, and Fur, from *Bermudas*, but lost from *Falmouth*.

Portsmouth, June 6. Yesterday sailed from Spithead the homeward bound *Barbadoes* and *O-Porto* Fleets under Convoy of several Men of War.

Deale, June 7. This day came into the *Downes* His Majesty's Ships, *Rochester*, *Crown*, and *Tyger*, with the *Barbadoes* and *O-Porto* Fleets under their Convoy.

Whitehall, June 7. By Letters from *St. Christophers* of the 27th of *March*, we are informed, that the Fleet commanded by Capt. *Wilmot*, having on Board the Land Forces designed for *Jamaica*, were separated in bad Weather near the *Maderas*, but that Capt. *Wilmot* arrived at *St. Christophers* the 23d of the same month, where all the Ships of the Fleet met again in a good condition, and intended to proceed the 28th on their Voyage to *Jamaica*.

Whitehall, June 8. Sir *Edward Ward*, His Majesty's late Attorney General, having received a Writ to be Serjeant at Law, appeared this morning at the *Chancery Bar*, where he took the usual Oaths, and presented to my Lord Keeper a Ring for His Majesty; From thence he went to the Treasury of the *Common-Pleas*, and had his Coif and Habit put on, and performed the usual Exercise and Ceremonies of a Serjeant at Law there, and at the *Common-Pleas Bar*; after which He gave a Noble Entertainment at *Sergeants-Inn* in *Fleetstreet*, and in the Evening was Sworn Lord Chief Baron of His Majesty's Court of *Exchequer*, and received his Patent.
