Turin, June 2. They go on with their Works before Casal; and more Forces are ordered that way. The French continue in their Quarters.

Venice, June 3. They continue their preparations here for halting away another great Convoy to the Levant; From whence two Venetian Men of War arrived here this week to be refitted, having on board some Officers who are accused of not having done their Duty in the late Sea-fight near Scio, and about 300 Soldiers who by the Wounds they received in that Action are become unfit for further service; No body is yet permitted to come ashore from these Ships, they being to keep a Quarantine, and a Guard is placed upon the said Officers, and an Inquisitor appointed to examine them. By a Vessel that came from Zara in Dalmatia the 22th of the last month, we are informed, that the Turkish Troops in those parts were in motion in order to besiege Cyclus; and that the Proveditore-General Desfio was drawing together the Venetian Forces to oppose them.

Vienna, June 4. The Imperial Forces continue to draw together near Pest, where the whole Army will be joined in few days; and from thence will march towards Bava. The Elector of Saxony is expected here the next week in his way to Hungary, and during his stay at this Court, several Matters will be Concerned in relation to the Command which General Caprara is to have under him. The Imperialists have made a Bridge of Boats over the Danube at Peter-Waradin, and some Troops have been sent thither to reinforce the Garrison. The Turks begin to assemble their Forces in the Neighbourhood of Belgrade, and have sent a Sum of Money to the Cham of Tartary, with Orders to join the Ottoman Army with a Body of his Troops. General Veterani is going to form a Camp on the Frontiers of Transylvania, to observe the Tartars in their march, and prevent their making any Inroads into that Country. The Imperial Court is returned hither from Luxembourg.

Hailbron, June 11. Prince Lewis of Baden arrived here this Evening from Guntzburgh, and will go to morrow to the Confederate Army which lies encamped at Garsach, being about 22000 strong; The Margrave of Bareith (who commands them in the absence of Prince Lewis) having received advice, that the Marschal de Lorge had passed the Rhine at Philipsburg, sent notice thereof to the rest of the Allies, whose Forces are to act on the Upper-Rhine, that they might hasten their march.

Frankfort, June 12. The Marschal de Lorge being arrived in the French Camp near Neustadt, took a Review of the Army on the 3d Instant, and marched the next day to Philipsburg, near which place they passed the Rhine on the 5th and 6th over two Bridges, and afterwards marched to Bruchsal; where they have begun to Entrench themselves, which sufficiently contradicts the Report of their designing to march on to Hailbron; and by the best account we have of them, their Army does not consist of above 30000 men. The Confederate Army lies in a very advantageous Camp at Garsach; and when the Troops of the Elector Palatin, of Hesse, and Munster, (who are on their march) have joined them, they will be above 40000.

Cologne, June 14. The Troops of Munster, being 6000 men, are on their march towards the Upper-Rhine, to join the Confederate Army commanded by Prince Lewis of Baden, who arrived the 12th Instant in the Camp at Garsach, and had secured all the Passes, and ordered several Intrenchments to be cast up. The French do likewise fortify their Camp at Bruchsal.

Paris, June 13. The Duke of Chartres went hence the 6th, and the Duke of Bourbon and the Prince of Conti

the 8th Instant, to serve in the French Army in Flanders; From whence several Couriers are lately arrived, with an account of the Motions of the Forces of the Allies, who advance towards our Lines between Ipres and the Schelde; and we are told, that Orders have been hereupon sent to the Marechal de Boufflers to join the Marechal de Villeroi. They write from Provence, that they had been very much surpris'd at Marjailles by the appearance of several English Men of War on that Coast, who had taken 3 French Vessels laden with Corn, and gave chase to some others; after which, is said, the said Frigates continued their course towards Final. The Sieur de Genes failed the 3d Instant from Rochell with 3 Men of War; This heaved he is design'd to the South Sea. Monsieur de Nesmond is going to Sea again. The Letters from Pigneroi of the 3d day, the Confederate Troops continued before Casal, and there was a Discourse, that they would alter all formally besiege it. The Assembly of the Clergy still continues; our every body was extremely surpris'd that there was but 10 Millions of Livres demanded of them, whereas it was at first intended to ask above 20 Millions, but the Clergy having intimated to the Court, that 10 Millions was the most they were in a condition to give, it was thought more advisable to rest contented with that Sum, than to endanger a refusal in case they had demanded more. The Marechal de Noailles, who was to have commanded this Summer the French Army in Catalonia, has by Letters from Perpignan desired to be excus'd from this Service on account of the ill state of his Health, but the true reason is thought to be, that not having been able to obtain the Supplies of men which he demanded to reinforce the Army on that side, he could not propose to himself any reputation by this Campaign, but on the contrary apprehended he should have the Mortification to see all those places in Catalonia lost this year, which he took the last; Whereupon Leave has been sent him to return hither, and the Duke of Vendosme who is in Provence, is ordered to repair to Catalonia, and to take upon him the Command of the French Army there. We had a report here the last week, that our Troops in those parts had rais'd the Blockade of Castel-Fisher, and put a Convoy of Provisions into the place, but this is contradicted by fresher Advices; which give an account, that Monsieur de St. Silvestre had indeed made an attempt to relieve that Garrison, and had supplied them with some Provisions, after a very sharp dispute with the Miquelets and Spanish Troops posted thereabouts, who not only killed many of our Men, among whom was a General Officer, but took divers Mules laden with Provisions, and still continue to block up the Town.

From His Majesty's Camp at Beelaer between Roubaer and Ipres, June 16. N.S. On the 10th Instant the Earl of Athlone marched with 40 Squadrons of Horse from the Elector of Bavaria's Camp towards Louvain, to observe the Marechal de Boufflers, who lay then at Gosseliers; and on the 11th the Marquis de LaFors was detached from our Camp at Arfele with 3 Brigades of Horse to reinforce the Elector's Army. The 12th His Majesty de camped from Arfele, and the Army marched in 4 Lines to Roubaer, being 5 Leagues, and in our march we took 50 of the Enemy Prisoners: The 13th we continued our march 3 Leagues farther to this place; and one of our Parties routed two of the Enemies Parties, whereof several were killed and some made Prisoners, being pursued to the Walls of Ipres. The Marechal de Villeroi, who commands the Enemies main Army, marched the same day from Escaraffe, and is now Encamp'd behind the Lines between Menin and Ipres, having detached 10000 men to reinforce the Marechal de Boufflers, who is come to Pont Esperie. The Elector of Bavaria marched the 12th from Ninove, Encamped the 13th near Audenarde, and will be this Evening near Hauverive within 2 Leagues of the Marechal de Boufflers between the Lys and the Schelde. The Enemy have another Body of Men between Ipres and the Fort de Kenogues commanded by Monsieur Monal, to observe Major General Elzeberg, who is with a flying Camp near Dixmuyde. The Troops of Brandenburg, with those of Munster, and 8 Battalions of the Garrisons of Mactricht, Liege and Huy, making together a Body of near 25000 men are marching towards Nimur: Thus you see the situation of the several Camps; Ours is within 4 or 5 miles of the Enemies Lines between Ipres and Menin; and about the same distance from both those Garrisons. Our Troops forage every day near the Lines without any Disturbance from the French Army, which is Encamp'd on the other side of them. And as we live now in the Enemy's Country and destroy their Forage, so we oblige them to feed within their own Lines, and to consume what used to furnish their Magazines.

Hague, June 17. N.S. Lieutenant Admiral Allemond lies at the Texel, with the Men of War under his Command, and the Bomb Vessels, expecting the first fair Wind to Sail to the Rendezvous on the Coast of England. The William and Mary Yacht with two Yachts more arrived yesterday at Helvoetsluis, from England, Convoied by the Lyon and Centurion, having on board the Earl of Rivers, Lord Cutts, &c. who are gone to Flanders. The Letters from Madrid of the 26th past give an account, that Admiral Ruffin intended to Sail from Cadix the 8th of the same month, but the Weather proving calm, it was the 10th before he got out to Sea; and the 18th the Fleet was seen off Alicant, sailing up the Mediterranean with a fair Wind. The Letters

from Piedmont say, the Siege of Casal was resolv'd on, and that the Trenches would be opened about the 14 or 15th of this Month.

Edinburgh, June 6. The Parliament met the 3d Instant, and had some Debate about the Ways of raising the Supply, and referred it to a Committee to consider if any, or what part of the same should be rais'd by an Additional Excise; A Petition of Mr. Duncan Robertson was read, containing a Complaint against the Lord Viscount of Strath, President of the Session, the Consideration whereof was refer'd to a Committee. After which the Names of the Earl of Melfort, and others now in France, who were summon'd to appear in so many days under Penalty of High Treason, were call'd over, and farther time allow'd till the 14th Instant; and then they adjourn'd till the next day, at which time they pass'd an Act, changing the way of Dictating and Writing in Criminal Processes before the Justice Court. The Draught of an Act for Limiting and Restraining Sureties was likewise read and approv'd; The Draught of an Act about the Sale of Bankrupts Estates was read, and order'd to lie upon the Table; as also an Act concerning Short Prescriptions; and the Parliament was adjourn'd till this day; when they pass'd an Act for the Sale of all Bankrupts Estates for the Use of their Creditors; They had under Consideration an Act for Settling Post Stages throughout this Kingdom; and afterwards went upon the Regulation of the Prices of Wines; and then adjourn'd till tomorrow.

Plymouth, June 9. His Majesty's Ship the Weymouth, a Fourth Rate of 50 Guns, was lately brought into the Wet and Dry Dock here, and Cleaned in the latter with success, and great dispatch, the said Dock being now completed.

Deal, June 11. Yesterday Sailed out of the Downes the Shrewsbury, Northumberland and Winchester, with 12 Bomb Vessels (who came in the same day from the River) for Portsmouth. Portsmouth, June 11. There are now coming in between 30 and 40 Sail from the Eastward, which we take to be the Men of War and Bomb Ships from the Downes.

Whitehall, June 11. This Morning one of the Kings Messengers returned hither from His Majesties Camp at Beelaer in Flanders, whence he parted last Sunday Morning; The Letters he brought were Dated the day before, being the 8th O. S. and give an account, That the Duke of Wirtemberg went the 7th in the Morning to Dinant, from whence he march'd with the Forces that lay thereabouts to invest the Fort of Kenogues; That they came before that place the same Afternoon, and in the Evening broke ground in Order to Attack it, and on the 8th Major General Churschil marched with a considerable Detachment from His Majesty's Camp to join the Duke of Wirtemberg.
