

# The London Gazette.

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Naples, May 24.

**O**UR Viceroy being informed that two small French Privateers had taken on this Coast some days ago a Vessel laden with Corn, and carried her to the Island of *Ponza*, belonging to the Duke of *Parma*, he sent out two Gallies in pursuit of them, but they were protected by the Castle there, which fired upon our Gallies, and killed several of their Men; whereupon the Viceroy ordered thither the rest of our Gallies, with 400 Soldiers, and several Pieces of Cannon, who obliged the French (who had quitted their Vessels, and had put themselves into the said Castle, being about 150 in number) to surrender at discretion, and the Governor of *Ponza*, with the few Soldiers of his Garrison, they brought away Prisoners, and seized upon the Vessels they found in that Port; leaving in the Castle 20 Spanish Soldiers commanded by a Lieutenant. The Gallies of *Sardinia* are now here, and will depart with the Gallies of *Naples* and *Sicily* about the beginning of the next month for *Catalonia*.

*Lagorne*, May 30. The 24th arrived here an English Ship called the *Rose* of *Yarmouth* from *England*; but left from *Cagliari* in the Island of *Sardinia*, whence she parted about 8 days ago, and brings an account, that the *Balun* Galley had touched there in her Voyage homeward from *Scanderoon* and *Messina*. By a Vessel in 17 days from *Tunis*, we have advice, that *Mehemer* Bey was returned thither, and had repossessed himself of all the places which were taken by the Algerines the last year, except one Castle in which there were about 500 men, who still held out: That the *Tripolins* do now join with the Government of *Tunis* against that of *Argiers*; And that 10 Algerine Men of War came lately to the Bay of *Tunis*, to take in Provisions for their Voyage to the *Levant*, but finding Affairs there in another posture than they expected, they set sail for *Tripoli*, where, 'tis thought, they will not have a better Reception.

From the Camp before *Cazal*, June 6. Our Lines and Redoubts on this side the *Po* are finished; The 30th at night we raised a Battery, which began to fire the next day, and succeeded so well, that we have destroyed all the Mills the Enemy had on the River; They answered us with their Cannon, but with little effect. We shall now begin our Works on the other side the *Po*.

*Turin*, June 6. On the 2d Instant the Duke of *Savoy* took a Review of several Regiments of Horse and Dragoons, which he had ordered to draw together at *Vigon*, and came afterwards thither with Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*; and yesterday they returned to the Camp before *Cazal*, his Royal Highness having before given out Orders for 9 Battalions more of his own Troops to march that way; 'Tis said the like Orders are given to the Imperial and Spanish Foot, and that they are to be in the Camp by the 15th of this month, which makes us believe the resolution is now taken to besiege that place; From whence we had an account by our last Letters, that our Troops had finished their Works on one side the River, and were going to begin the like on the other. In the mean time our Cavalry and Dragoons are Encamp'd at *Vigon*, and 'tis said they are to march from thence next to *Piggierol*. We have yet no news of the motion of the Enemies Forces.

*Vienna*, June 8. The Elector of *Savoy* is expected here about the 15th of this month; His Troops in the mean time march with great diligence towards the *Rendezvous* in *Hungary*. The Imperial Infantry that drew together near *Off* are marched towards *Bays*, and the Horse would follow them in few days; They have made a Bridge of Boats over the *Danube* at *Pest*, which will be removed as there shall be occasion. General *Veterani* assembles his Troops on the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, to observe the Enemies motions on that side. The Turks pretend to have a stronger Army in the Field this Summer, than they have had for some years past, occasioned by the Grand Signior's making the Campaign in Person; Some of their Troops had, by our last Letters, begun to assemble near *Belgrade*; and they work'd without intermission to fit up the House of *Mahomet* IV. for the Sultan's Reception. Some of the Ministers of this Court have received Letters from *Adrianople* of the 9th of *May*, which say the Grand Vicer was

disgraced, and cast into Prison with all his Friends and Favourites, and their Goods seized; and that his Successor (who was advanced to that Station by the Interest of the Sultana Mother) was a very young Man, who had little Experience; but this News coming but from one Hand, we must expect the confirmation of it.

*Halsbronn*, June 13. The Confederate Army continues Encamped near *Gottach*, *Steppach*, and *Eppingen*, where Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* arrived the 11th, and was received with a noble discharge of great and small Shot. The 12th he took a Review of the Forces, which are very advantageously posted, and their Camp strongly fortified; The Troop of *Hess*, &c. are marching to join them, and so soon as they have, Prince *Lewis* will advance towards the Enemy; who are still Encamp'd near *Bruchsal*, and hitherto seem to have no other design than to destroy the Forage on this side the *Rhine*; To prevent their Invasions into the Country of *Wurttemberg*, Prince *Lewis* has ordered the Militia there to be drawn together to secure the Passes.

*Frankfort*, June 15. The Marschal de *Lorge* is removed with the French Army from *Bruchsal* nearer to *Wiesloch*, into the last of which places he has put 200 men; and his Troops forage near *Hydelberg*; We are told, that the French have provided 100 Wagons, carrying each an Iron Oven, which they are now bringing to their Army from *Neustadt*, being to pass the *Rhine* at *Fort-Louis*. The Forces of the Elector *Palatin*, and the Landgrave of *Hesse*, are on their march to join the Army of the Allies commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, which continues Encamped near *Steppach*; and the Forces of *Munster*, and 3000 *Lunenburger*s, are likewise coming this way, to act in conjunction with the rest of the Confederate Forces on the *Upper-Rhine*.

*Cologne*, June 17. The last Advices from the *Palatinate* give an account, that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* was Encamped near *Steppach*; and the Marschal de *Lorge* not far from *Wiesloch*; That the Army commanded by the latter was at present the strongest by 10000 men; which they have yet made no other use of than to destroy the Country where they come; and 'tis most probable this is all their design. Three Regiments of *Hesse* are marched to the *Bergstraet*, to defend the passage of the *Neckar*; The rest of the Confederate Forces that are to serve on the *Upper-Rhine* are marching thither.

*Paris*, June 17. The Letters from *Toulon* of the 7th Instant give an account, that the Fleet commanded by Admiral *Ruffel* began to appear the 5th, passing by that place, and took several small Vessels; The 6th the Wind changing, they came back again, and in the afternoon stood towards the Isles of *Hieres*, and upon a Signal made by the Admiral with firing several Guns, 30 Ships were detached, who took their Course towards *Final*: They were under great apprehensions at *Marseilles* and *Toulon* of what the Enemy would attempt, and the Inhabitants were about removing their best Goods. The Duke of *Vendosme* being appointed to command the French Army in *Catalonia*, his brother, the Grand Prior, who is a Lieutenant-General, succeeds him in the command of the Forces that are posted about *Nice* and *Antibes*; We have advice, that two Companies of Foot which the Governor of *Nice* had put as a Garrison into a Castle called *Aqua-Dolce*, near that City, had all deserted to a man, after having killed their Commandant, and bound the rest of their Officers, and were got into the Territories of the Duke of *Savoy*; which News has very much surprized them at this Court. The Letters from *Germany* say, our Army continued on the other side the *Rhine*, but had not yet undertaken any thing; and 'tis thought they intend no more than to subsist in the Enemies Country. They write from *Flanders*, that the Marschal de *Villeroy* was marched with great precipitation to defend the Lines which he apprehended the Enemy designed to force; and that he had detached Monsieur *Rozzen* with 30 Squadrons to observe the Enemies motions towards *Jores*: The Duke of *Chartres* was taken ill of a Fever. The Marschal of *Nesmond* is still here.

*Brussels*, June 19. The Earl of *Athlone* marched yesterday from *Leuwin* towards the *Muse*, to join the Forces of *Brandenburgh* and *Liege*.

From New-Castle, the Head-Quarter of the Forces before *Kenaeque*, June 20. in the morning. The Duke of *Wurttemberg* came to *Dixmunde* on Friday last about 10 in the

the morning; in the afternoon he marched with 20 Battalions towards Kenouas, where we Encamped; all Saturday we saw the Enemy very busy in working on their Lines on the right of Kenouas towards Ipres, and they furnished us with some of their Cannon, which had no effect. On Sunday morning Major General Churchill joined us; after Dinner, in marching somewhat farther to our right, we discovered the Enemy had poled themselves of some Hauls on our side the Canal, and had set fire to others; The Grenadiers were detached under the command of Colonel Mayland to beat the Enemy from thence, which they performed with great vigor; farther on the right Colonel Tiffany was sent with a Detachment, sustained by a Regiment of Foot, and there was a very warm fire between them and the Enemy, who were in a little Fort on the other side the Canal; Our Men behaved themselves extremely well, and brought up 6 Pieces of Cannon to the Canal side, where they are now entrenched, and a Battery raised. Both Parties continued firing till late last night. To day we shall raise other Batteries. In the Action yesterday Major General Churchill was in much danger, a Musket Shot passing through his Hat; Colonel Tiffany was hurt in the Hand, and several of his Officers wounded, and some Men killed.

From the Kings Camp at Bussels, June 20. N. S. The Duke of Wirtemberg went hence the 17th, early in the morning, to Dixmude, and marched the same day with 20 Battalions of Foot, which were Encamped near that place under the command of Major General Eilenberger, to Kenouas, where he was joined yesterday by 8 Battalions from hence, commanded by Major General Churchill. Monsieur de Mentel is Encamped on the other side the Fort, having had a considerable Reinforcement from the Marechal de Villeroys Army. The Elector of Bavaria continues at Kirkbove near Houtervre; From whence we have an account, that the Enemy having posted themselves with about 800 men at a Windmill on a rising Ground on this side their Lines, the only place from whence their Works could be discovered, they were yesterday by Order of the Elector attack'd by Brigadier Fogell, and forced back within their Lines. The Marechal de Villeroys continues between Ipres and Menin. The Count de Soissons arrived here yesterday, intending to pass the Campagne as a Volunteer. An Express is just now arrived from our Forces before La Kenouas, giving an account, that the French having posted themselves of the Post, where we were to place our Batteries, they were attacked by a Detachment of our Men commanded by Coll. Maitland, and beaten out with the loss of some Officers and Soldiers on both sides; Colonel Tiffany is shot through the Hand, and 'tis said, a General Officer of the French, whose Name is not yet known, is killed; Our Batteries were preparing when these Letters came away, and may be ready to morrow morning.

Hague, June 21. Lieutenant Admiral Alenon, with the Men of War and Bomb Ships, lies in the Texel ready to sail with the first fair Wind. On Sunday last a Dutch Man of War engaged with 3 French Capers on the Coast of Zealand, and took one of them, which he has brought to Helvoetsluys. We have an account from Euckhusen in North-Holland, that on the 17th instant a Frigate of 20 Guns called the Fame, which was going out to Convey the Herring Fishes took Fire by some accident, and was blown up with its own Powder, there being on board above 80 Persons who all perished except one Man who was taken up very much hurt. On Friday night last happened a Fire at Amsterdam on the Admiralty Wharf, which burnt 8 or 9 Houses, but was happily put out before it reach'd those where the Stores are laid up for the Men of War, or did any damage to the Ships that lay hard by unrigg'd, or to the new Ships that were on the Stocks; only a small Yacht that was building there was burnt. The Hull Fleet is arrived in the Texel.

Edinburgh, June 8. The Parliament sat yesterday, and had again under Consideration the Act about Regulating and Seizing up Post Stages in this Kingdom, whereof the Debate was adjourned; Then they went upon some private Affairs, and afterwards adjourned till Monday next. The Committee of Parliament have Examined several Witnesses upon the Complaint against the Viscount of Stair, and are to make their Report to the Parliament at their next Meeting.

Chester, June 11. On the 9th Instant the Mary Paquet Boat (with 3 Mails from Ireland) was taken by a French Caper of 4 Guns and 35 Men; The Mails were thrown over-board; and the Vessel Ranfomed for 200 l. for payment whereof they kept the Master; and the 10th the William Paquet Boat that was going over to Dublin with the Letters of this day's postright was taken by the same Privateer.

Yarmouth, June 14. This morning about 15 Sail of Ships passed by on the back of our Sands to the Southward, which it's believed came from the East Country. Several other Vessels appear now in sight, which we take to be our Fleet from Holland.

Portsmouth, June 15. The 12th His Majesty's Ship the Shrewsbury, with several other Men of War, the Bomb Ships, Fireships, and Tenders, arrived at Spithead from the Downs: And yesterday in the evening came to this place my Lord Berkeley, who was immediately on board the Shrewsbury, where the Blue Flag

was hoisted on the Masthead. The Marquis of Cambridge sailed yesterday to the Westward.

Gravel, June 15. This morning passed by the back of the Goodwin Sand a Squadron of Dutch Ships, whereof 3 carried Flag; amongst them Admiral Alenon who are going to the Rinezenour in Spithead.

The Governor and Council of the Island of Barbadoes have made an humble Address to His Majesty, declaring the deep fence they have of the great loss his Majesty and his Kingdoms have sustained by the death of the late Queen of blessed Memory; And join with the rest of his Majesties Subjects in an humble Concoance Guard and Protect his Person and Throne; and to Crown all his Undertakings with Successful Victory, that his Majesty may secure the Peace and Repose of his own Dominions and all Christendom, upon such good and lasting Foundations as shall be above the Power of his Enemies at home or abroad to disturb; And devote to his Majesties Service, in their several Stations, their Lives and Fortunes, and all that can be dear to them.
