Cadiz, May 16. N. S.

N the 9th initiant, Admiral Russill sailed with the Fleet cut of this Bay, and came to an Anchor off Retz in lightor this place, where he continued till the 10th in the afternoon; He pissed Malaga the 13th, and has evertince had a fair Wind. The Galeons designed for the West Indies are come down to the Bay, and are taking in Goods; and the Min of War that are to go out with them, are sitting with all Expedition.

Malaga, May 17. Admiral Russill with the whole Fleet missed by this place the 13th, with a fresh Westerly Wind. Captain Beasmont, Commander of the Canterbury, was feat in with Orders to Captain Pickard, and the Men of War in this Road, to follow the Fleet; which they did immediately. Captain Resais, in the Romacy, is still here with several. Vessels under his Convoy, who are taking in a thousand Butts of Wine for the use of the Fleet, and will be ready to sail in 2 or 3 days. The Catalans are all putting themselves in Arms to joyn with the Spanish Forces in order to drive the French out of their Country. Vienna, June 11. The Count de Heydersheim went hence yesterday to the Imperial Army in Hungary, where he is to serve this Campagne as General of the Horse. General Caprara stays till the actival of the Elector of Saxiny, who is expected hereabout the 15th of this month. We have Advice from the Frontiers, That the Radziens commanded by Colonel Antonio, had passed the Danum, and fallen upon a Party of Torks that were marching with the Bissa of Silestria towards Belgrade, of whom divers were killed, and the Bissa obliged to retire towards Semendria. Yesterday being the Emperor's Birth Day, when he entred into the 56th year of his Age, he received the usual Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality: His Imperial Majesty has received a Letter from the Czar of Mojeovy, giving an account, That he was marching against the Tartars with a numerous Army.

Frazefort, June 19. The Army of the Allies is still en-camped near Steppach, where Prince Lewis expects the rest of the Forces that are on their march to joyn him. The French Army lies between Bruchfal and Wischek, and a strong Party of them in the last of these places. Several Rencounters have happened between the Parties of the two Armies, Our Hussers have taken divers Prisoners, but some of them going too near the French Camp, were attacked by a Party sent from thence, and several of them killed.

Bruffels, June 22. The Elector of Bavaria is encampt at Kirkhoven within two Leagues of the Enemies Lines between the Lys and the Schelde. Yeiterday morning his Electoral Highness sent Major General Fagel with a Detachement of 2500 foot and 100 Dragoons, to attack 400 French Foot and 60 Horse, who were posted near a Mill, from whence a view may be taken of their Lines; which from whence a view may be taken of their Lines; which he performed, and beat the Enemy from that Polt; We lost about 20 Men, and the French as many. Edinburg, June 13. The Parliament met the 10th, and the Committioners appointed by His Majefty to enquire into the Slaughter of the Glencoe Men prefented, by their Prefident, certain private Articles, Treated and Agreed in July 1691, between the Errl of Brodalbine and Majer General Buchan, with feveral of the Highland Clans then in Rebellitin, as also the Depositions of the Land of Glengarie and Colonel Hid, containing Informations of High Treason sgainst the Earl of Brodalbine, touching the faid Articles, which being Read, after some Debate, it was put to the Vote, whether they should now proceed upon this Information of High Treason against the faid Earl, and it was carried in the Affirmative, and en Order given to the King's Advocate to raise Summons of Treason against the Earl before the Parliament; And it was ordered that the Earl of Brodalabine be committed Prisoner to the Catile of Edinburgh, in order to his Tryal. An Address from the Ministers of the Synodis, And the Draught of an Add for Encapaging the Expertation of Victual were Read, and both ordered to lie upon the Table; After which the Parliament adjourned till the 12th, when they had before them the Draught of an Add about Church Discipline, and referred is back to the Committee.
