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Cadiz, May 16. N. S.

ON the 9th instant, Admiral *Russell* failed with the Fleet out of this Bay, and came to an Anchor off *Ros* in sight of this place, where he continued till the 10th in the afternoon; He passed *Malaga* the 13th, and has ever since had a fair Wind. The Galeons designed for the *West Indies* are come down to the Bay, and are making in Goods; and the Man of War that are to go out with them, are fitting with all Expedition.

Malaga, May 17. Admiral *Russell* with the whole Fleet passed by this place the 13th, with a fresh Westerly Wind. Captain *Beaumont*, Commander of the *Canterbury*, was sent in with Orders to Captain *Pickard*, and the Men of War in this Road, to follow the Fleet; which they did immediately. Captain *Rosas*, in the *Romney*, is still here with several Vessels under his Convoy, who are taking in a thousand Butts of Wine for the use of the Fleet, and will be ready to sail in 2 or 3 days. The Catalans are all putting themselves in Arms to joyn with the Spanish Forces in order to drive the French out of their Country. We have advice from *Ciuta*, That 500 Spaniards of that Garrison made the last week a Salley upon the Moors, and beat them out of their Trenches, killing a great number of their Men, and taking some Prisoners; They filled up with Earth the first Trench next the Town, and had about 40 Men killed and wounded in this Action: Fresh Supplies of Mingo over daily to reinforce the Garrison, and we expect to hear very quickly that they have made a general Salley upon the Moors, who are very much discouraged by the Losses they have sustained, and the little progress they have hitherto made in the Siege.

Madrid, May 25. By an Express from *Alicant*, which arrived here yesterday, we have Letters of the 18th, which advise, That the Fleet commanded by Admiral *Russell* was then before that Port; and that Rear Admiral *Newille* was gone with 10 Men of War to *Final*, to Convey the Spanish Troops from thence to *Barcelona*. This Court is still at *Aranjuez*. 'Tis said the Galeons will Sail from *Cadiz* the next month.

Legborne, June 6. We are informed by a Vessel which arrived here two days ago from *Thoulon*, That they had received Advice by their Scouts, of Admiral *Russell's* arrival at *Barcelona*, and hourly feared his appearing on the Coast of *Provence*, where they have been at a very great expence in making new Fortifications; and particularly at *Ioulon* and *Majales*. Several Turkish Corsairs having lately infested this Coast, the Great Duke of *Tuscany* has ordered 3 Gallies to be immediately sent out in hopes of meeting with some of them, and they are now on their departure under the Command of Signior *Guidi*.

Turin, June 9. The Troops, we told you in our last were ordered to the Camp before *Casal*, are on their march thither, and other preparations are making for the Siege of that place. 'Tis said, That the Trenches will be opened in 4 or 5 days.

Venice, June 11. They are now preparing here a greater Convoy for our Fleet in the *Levant*, than has yet gone thither at any one time, which may be ready by the beginning of the next month; There are 800 Men at the *Leib*, who are to Embark on these Ships, and more are daily expected from the places where they have been raised. The last Letters from *Napoli di Romania* give an account, That a Body of the Enemies Troops had appeared near the isthmus of *Cerinth*, having with them several pieces of Cannon, and 'twas thought they would endeavour to make an Incurtion into the *Mare*; to prevent which, the Captain General had sent a strong Detachment of the Venetian Forces to maintain that Pass. They write from *Dalmatia*, That the Governor of *Ciclut* understanding that 500 Turks were come into the Neighbourhood of that place to get Intelligence, he sent out a strong Party, who had a sharp dispute with them, killed several, and put the rest to flight.

Vienna, June 11. The Count *de Heydelsheim* went hence yesterday to the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, where he is to serve this Campaign as General of the Horse. General *Caprara* stays till the arrival of the Elector of *Saxony*, who is expected here about the 15th of this month. We have Advice from the Frontiers, That the Radziens commanded by Colonel *Antonio*, had passed the *Danube*, and fallen upon a Party of Turks that were marching with the Basha of *Silestria* towards *Belgrade*, of whom divers were killed, and the Basha obliged to retire towards *Semendria*. Yesterday being the Emperor's Birth Day, when he entered into the 56th year of his Age, he received the usual Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality. His Imperial Majesty has received a Letter from the Czar of *Moscow*, giving an account, That he was marching against the Tartars with a numerous Army.

Frazzfort, June 19. The Army of the Allies is still encamped near *Steppach*, where Prince *Lewis* expects the rest of the Forces that are on their march to joyn him. The French Army lies between *Bruchsal* and *Wistock*, and a strong Party of them in the last of these places. Several Rencontres have happened between the Parties of the two Armies, Our Hussars have taken divers Prisoners, but some of them going too near the French Camp, were attacked by a Party sent from thence, and several of them killed.

Cologne, June 21. The Forces of *Munster* make great marches in order to joyn the Confederate Army on the *Upper Rhine*.

Hamburg, July 17. Prince *Christian*, Second Son to the King of *Denmark*, came the last week to *Braukhusen*, where the Duke of *Zell* has at present his Residence; And from thence continued his Journey towards *Flanders*. The Forces of *Hanover*, *Zell*, and *Wolfenbuttel*, designed to joyn the Prince of *Baden* on the *Rhine*, began their march thither the 5th instant, consisting in 3000 men. They write from *Stockholme*, That the King of *Sweden* had been to view his Troops in the several parts of the Kingdom, and was shortly expected back at *Stockholme*. Letters from *Dantzicke* of the 10th instant say, That a Frigate of 50 Guns, called the *Mars*, which was built there, on account and for the service of the French, is going out run aground, where she was in great danger to be lost.

Paris, June 20. They write from *Thoulon* of the 12th instant, That Admiral *Russell* continued near the Isles of *Hieres* with a Fleet of 80 sail, having sent a Squadron to *Final*; That an English Frigate came the same day these Letters were written almost within Cannon Shot of the Entrance into the Port, and after having staid there some time to observe the posture we were in, returned to the Fleet; And by an Express from the Marechal *de Tourville*, we have an account, That the whole Fleet appeared the 14th before *Thoulon*, which occasioned a great Alarm; And to oppose any attempt the Enemy might make there, 3000 Foot and 400 Horse were posted near the Sea side; The 24 Gallies that were sent thither in great hast from *Marseilles* (not having above half their Men on Board) were placed so as that they might be most serviceable for the security of the Port, the Entrance whereof was likewise secured with great Chains and Booms; The Streets were unpaved, and the Tops of Houses uncovered, and they had planted on Batteries 300 pieces of Cannon and 34 Mortars: The like Precautions have been used at *Marseilles*. Some Letters say, that 18 Spanish Gallies had joynd Admiral *Russell*. The Letters from *Pignerol* of the 12th advise, That the Allies had finished their Batteries against *Casal*, from which they would begin to fire that day, and that the Trenches would be opened the 15th. We have advice from *Perpignan*, That the Duke of *Vendosme* was arrived there, and was going to Command the Army in *Catalonia*. 'Tis said, that besides the ten Millions given by the Clergy, The French King intends to demand of them a further Sum of Money by way of Loan.
