and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Saint Breock, in the County of Cornwall, and in the Diocese of Truro:

"Whereas by virtue of an Indenture, dated the 18th day of May, 1917, and made between John Athelstan Laurie Riley, of No. 2, Kensington Court, London, Esquire, of the one part, and George Thornton Skilbeck, of Saint Petroc House, Little Petherick, Cornwall, and the Right Reverend Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, of the other part, it was witnessed that the Advowson or right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Breock was conveyed as to one moiety thereof unto and to the use of the said George Thornton Skilbeck, his heirs and assigns, in fee simple, and as to the other moiety thereof unto and to the use of the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, and his Successors in the Bishopric of Truro, in fee simple, but so that the first and every alternate turn of presentation shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Thornton Skilbeck, his heirs and assigns, and so that the second and every alternate turn of presentation shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, and his Successors in the said Bishopric of Truro for ever:

"And whereas the said conveyance was made with the intention of vesting one moiety of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage and presentation in the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, in right of his See, and the said John Athelstan Laurie Riley, and the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, are desirous that anything which by way of further assurance or otherwise may be required effectually to carry out that intention may be done, and have applied to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that a Scheme under the Acts hereinbefore mentioned may be prepared for the said purpose, and submitted to Your

Majesty in Council:

"And whereas the said John Athelstan Laurie Riley and the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, are consenting to this Scheme, the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, as party to the said Indenture of the 18th day of May, 1917, and as the Bishop of the Diocese in which the said Benefice of Saint Breock is situate, approving of and accepting the transfer of a moiety of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage and presentation as required by the Acts hereinbefore mentioned, or by some or one of them:

"And whereas the transfer of the share or portion of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Breock, which is hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson, so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Saint

Breock:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John Athelstan Laurie Riley (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme, and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), We the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty

in Council ratifying this Scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Breock, upon the second vacancy thereof, and thenceforward upon every alternate vacancy thereof for ever, (being a share or portion of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of the said Benefice), shall be transferred to the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, and his Successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforward become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Truro, and his Successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them,

or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immedately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Truro.
