Genoa, June 19.

WE have Advice that Rear-Admiral *Neville* is sailed again from *Final*, with the German and Italian Regiments that Embarked there for *Catalonia*; and that he is to rejoin the Fleet Commanded by Admiral *Ruffel* near the *Illes of Hieres*. Here are now in Port 8 Gallies belonging to *Naples*, who will depart in a day or two to join the Confederate Fleet. All the Advices from *Piedmont* and *Milan* say, that the Allies have resolved to Besiege *Cazal*.

Venice, June 24. The Senate continue their Care for reinforcing their Fleet and Army in the *Levant*; for which purpose several Ships are now building in this Arsenal; and they are treating with several Officers about new Levies to be made for the Service of the Republick. The freshest News from the *Morea* is; That the new Captain-General *Melino* was sailed with the whole Venetian Fleet to observe the motions of the Enemies, having left most of the Land Forces under the Command of General *Steinau*, to secure the Passes of *Corinth*. They write from *Dalmatia*, that the Venetians are preparing for some Enterprize on that side, for which they have now a very fair opportunity by the Enemies having drawn most of their Forces from those parts, to join their Army in *Hungary*.

Turin, June 25. They are now Shipping here 10 Pieces of Cannon for Battery, with a great quantity of Bombs, Granadoes, &c. which are to be employed in the Siege of *Cazal*; From whence we hear that the Trenches will be opened the 27th; Several Battalions are marching thither, and when they are arrived there will be about 24000 men before the piece; the rest of our Forces are to encamp at *Vigon*. The French do not yet appear in any considerable body on our Frontiers; They have sent several Battalions towards the Coast of *Provence*.

Vicna, June 25. The Elector of *Saxony* will make but a short stay here, intending so soon as he has received the Emperor's Instructions concerning the Services the Imperial Forces in *Hungary* are to be employed in this Campaign, to continue his Journey towards *Essick*; near which place he proposes to join the Army about the middle of the next month: In the mean time, the Saxon Troops march with all the diligence they can towards the *Danube*. General *Viterani* is Encamp'd on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, with the Imperial Troops that Wintered in that Country, to secure the same against the Incurfions of the Tartars in their march to join the Ottoman Army in *Hungary*. The last Advices from *Turkey*, confirm those we received before of several changes made by the new Sultan; and particularly of the Grand Vifier, the Aga of the Janifaries, the Aga of the Spahi's, and the *Kuler Agassi* chief of the Eunuchs, and

that *Achmet* Bassa was advanced to the place of the first; and several Bassa's recalled to Court, who had served his Father *Mahomet IV.* and were Banished in the succeeding Reign.

Cologne, July 5. They write from the *Upper Rhine*, that the Troops of *Hesse*, *Munster*, and *Lunenburg*, would in few days join the Confederate Army, which in the mean time continued in their advantageous Camp at *Steppach*, and that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* would then have an Army of about thirty five thousand men, and would march towards the Enemy, who were still Encamped near *Bruckfal*; but by the sending away of their heavy Baggage, and their other preparations, they seem to have thoughts of repassing the *Rhine* very quickly; The *Mareschal de Lorge* is very ill, so that his Colleague the *Mareschal de Joyeuse* has at present the Command of the Army. The Allies have removed the Bridges of Boats which they had laid over the *Rhine* at *Mentz* and *Coffheim*; higher up towards *Gernsheim* and *Oppenheim*.

Liege, July 5. Several Vessels are expected here to day, who are going with Cannon and Ammunition from *Maeftrecht* to the Camp before *Namur*; From whence we have an account, that the place was Invested the 2d of this month; His Majesty arrived on the 3d, and the Army took the same day their Posts on both sides the *Sambre*. The Picque-niers are working on the Lines of Circumvallation and Contravallation.

Ghent, July 6. The Army Commanded by the Prince *de Vaudemont* marched the Thirtieth of the last month from *Roufelaer*, and Encamped at *Woutergem*; where the Duke of *Wirtemberg*, with the Forces under his Command, rejoined them the first of this month; And on the 2d, the Prince *de Vaudemont* sent a Detachment of 14 Battalions to our Army before *Namur*, who passed the next day through this City. The *Mareschal de Villeroy* has lain Encamped several days between *Courtray* and *Menin*; and the Prince *de Vaudemont* continues at *Woutergem* to observe him.

Hague, July 8. The States of *Holland* are to meet again the 15th of this month. There are Letters from *Messina* of the 9th past, which say, The Homeward-bound Turkey Ships continued in that Port, expecting a reinforcement of their Convoy.

Edinburgh, June 28. The Parliament met yesterday, and passed 4 Acts; 1. Against Blasphemy. 2. Against Prophaneness. 3. Against keeping Markets on *Saturdays* and *Mondays*. 4. Against Irregular Baptisms and Marriages: The House took notice of a Paper that had been Printed and Dispersed by *Mr. Hugh Dalrymple*, reflecting upon the Proceedings of the Parliament with relation to the *Glenoe* Business; And the same was Voted to be false and calumnious, and

the Author ordered to ask Pardon of the House, as he did. Then the Parliament proceeded in the Business of *Glencoe*, and Examined the Orders given by Sir *Thomas Livingston*; and after some Debate the Question was Stated, Whether Sir *Thomas Livingston* had reason to give the Orders he had given or not, and it was unanimously resolved in the affirmative. The Ministers of *Aberdeen*, who protested against the Commission of the late General Assembly, were called before the Parliament and Examined thereupon. After which the Parliament was Adjourned till *Monday* next.

Guernsey-Road, July 1. The Fleet Commanded by the Lord *Berkley* arrived here this day; and his Lordship intends to Sail to-morrow towards *St. Maloes*.

Pembroke, June 30. On the 23d Instant we had an Account from *Tenby*, That a Privateer Sloop had chased a Vessel on shore near that Town, and had taken another, whereof notice being given to Captain *Walby* Commander of His Majesty's Ship the *Lizard*, then in our Harbor, he sailed immediately without staying for the Provisions he came hither to take on Board, and went in pursuit of the Privateer; About 4 in the Afternoon he retook the Prize, being a Vessel of about 40 Tuns bound to *Wexford*, and called the *Katherine* of that place; And being afterwards informed that the same Privateer had chased that Afternoon another small Vessel over the *Bar* of *Burry*, followed him thither, but not thinking it safe to go in with the King's Ship, he got a small Vessel from *Tenby*, and putting on Board her 4 of his Guns and 40 men, went himself to take the Privateer, leaving the charge of the *Lizard* to his Lieutenant; The 25th he got over *Burry-Bar*, shewing but 6 men on the Deck till he came to an Anchor by the Privateers side, who after firing 10 or 12 Guns yielded, (without any mans being hurt on either side) together with a small Vessel his Prize, called the *Betty* of *Comb*; This Sloop has never a Deck, of 10 Tuns, 4 Pieces, 21 men, 7 whereof are Irish, Rows with 16 Oars, and is called the *Gift of God*, belonging to *Nantes*; The Prisoners are brought hither.

Falmouth, July 1. Last Saturday in the Evening arrived here the *Concord* of *London* in 6 Weeks from *Antegoa*, *Arthur Guile* Master, bound to *London*; He met with no Ships in all his Voyage till the day he came in, when he saw off the *Lizard* a Squadron of His Majesty's Ships Commanded by the Marquis of *Carmarthen*.

Plymouth, July 2. Yesterday came into this Port several Merchant Ships bound to *Newfoundland*, and other parts, with their Convoy; as also a Portuguese Ship called *Nostra Signora*, with Salt and Wine from *Lisbon*. This day sailed hence to the Westward divers Coasters, under Convoy of His Majesty's Ship the *Joseph*.

Bristol, July 3. His Majesty's Ship the *Glossifer* sailed out of *Kings-Road* on Sunday last, having under her Convoy the *Canterbury* and *Greenfish* Storeships bound to *Kingsale*, with 17 sail more bound to *Ireland*, and the *Leeward Islands*. The same day came in the *Dove* of *Bristol* in six Weeks from *Jamaica*, which Island she left in very good health.

Weymouth, July 3. The *Hastings* Frigate, Captain *John Draper* Commander, is come into this Road with several Outward-bound Merchant Ships, who say they heard much shooting all last Night from the French Coast; which is confirmed by the Quaker Ketch, who is come in with some Coasters.

Deal, July 5. This morning came into the Downs His Majesty's Ship the *Assistance*, who left the Fleet last Monday in *Guernsey-Road*. Yesterday in the Afternoon came in two Dutch Men of War.

The Mail from Holland of Tuesday last is not yet come in.
