Bombarding of GRANVILLE.

Whitehall, July 12.

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His Evening arrived here an Express with Letters from my Lord Berkeley, which give an Account, That Capt. Benbow, who after the Bombarding of St. Malo was detached with 8 Frigats and 8 Bomb Vessels, the latter commanded by Coll. Richards, being arrived before Granville, a large populous Town, they began to Bombard it on the 8th Instant about 9 in the morning, and continued till 7 at night with very good fuccess, setting the Town on fire in several places, and leaving it all in Flames; so that we believe it is quite destroyed; The Inhabitants in great confusion endeavoured to fave their best Goods; and they play'd upon us from the Shore with several Cannon and two Mortars, but without doing us any harm, for we had not one Man killed or wounded; only Capt. Long of the Granada Bomb Vessel is huit by the bursting of a Mortar. On the 9th Capt. Benbow rejoined my Lord Berkeley in Guernsey Road; From whence his Lordship sailed the 10th along the French Coast, and was the 11th, when this Express was dispatch'd, off Cape de Hague. The Weymouth had taken a French Man of War of 12 Guns and 60 Men, who was fent by the Mareschal de Choiseul to observe our Fleet.

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
