The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 21st day of October, 1918, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas the Regulations for the Government of Your Majesty's Naval Service provide that an Officer holding Acting Rank shall be entitled only to the lowest rate of full pay applicable to the Rank in which he is acting:

“And whereas a number of Pensioner and Royal Fleet Reserve Men have been granted Temporary Acting Warrant Rank during the period of Hostilities, and we consider that these Officers should be granted the same increments of pay, according to the length of their service in Warrant Rank, as are granted to the Confirmed Officers of similar Rank on the Permanent List of Your Majesty's Navy:

“And whereas the Regulations further provide that the grant of widow's pension to the widow of a Warrant Officer, and of compassionate allowances to his children, can only be authorized in cases where the Officer has completed one year's satisfactory service as Warrant Officer, and has been confirmed in Rank, unless his death was attributable to the service:

“And whereas we consider that the widows of Temporary Acting Warrant Officers should be granted widow's pensions, and their children compassionate allowances, under the conditions applicable to other Warrant Officers, provided the Officer has completed one year's satisfactory service as Temporary Acting Warrant Officer, notwithstanding the fact that Temporary Acting Warrant Officers do not receive confirmation in Rank:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant to these Officers of the increments of full pay authorized for Confirmed Warrant Officers, Royal Navy, and of pensions and allowances to their widows and children as proposed above.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the 17th day of December, 1914, His Majesty was pleased to order that the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, and the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, should extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Act and Regulations have been amended by certain other Acts and Regulations which said Acts and Regulations have been extended to the Isle of Man by various subsequent Orders in Council, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Regulations have been further amended by Orders in Council of the 22nd April, 1916; 12th July, 1916; 6th November, 1916; 23rd November, 1916; 29th November, 1916; 10th January, 1917; 24th January, 1917; 6th February, 1917; 16th February, 1917; 23rd February, 1917; 14th April, 1917; 10th May, 1917; 13th June, 1917; 28th June, 1917; 17th July, 1917; 8th August, 1917; 22nd August, 1917; 29th September, 1917; 23rd October, 1917; 16th November, 1917; 21st December, 1917; 2nd January, 1918; 16th January, 1918; 5th February, 1918; 27th February, 1918; 27th April, 1918; 18th May, 1918; 25th June, 1918; 19th July, 1918; 2nd August, 1918; and the 4th September, 1918:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Regulations amending the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, made by Orders of His Majesty in Council dated the 22nd April, 1916; 12th July, 1916; 6th November, 1916; 23rd November, 1916; 29th November, 1916; 10th January, 1917; 24th January, 1917; 6th February, 1917; 16th February, 1917; 23rd February, 1917; 14th April, 1917; 10th May, 1917; 13th June, 1917; 28th June, 1917; 17th July, 1917; 8th August, 1917; 22nd August, 1917; 29th September, 1917; 23rd October, 1917; 16th November, 1917; 21st December, 1917; 2nd January, 1918; 16th January, 1918; 5th February, 1918; 27th February, 1918; 27th April, 1918; 18th May, 1918; 25th June, 1918; 19th July, 1918; 2nd August, 1918; and the 4th September, 1918, shall extend to the Isle of Man to the extent specified in the second column of the Schedule hereto, and subject to the adaptations mentioned in the third column of such Schedule.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, Sections 6 and 8, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 10th day of October, 1918, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the 6th and

7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, Sections 6 and 8, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Prebend of Marston Saint Lawrence, in the Cathedral Church of Lincoln, and now vested in us:

“Whereas on the vacancy of the said Prebend, which occurred on the 25th day of January, in the year 1861, by the decease of the Reverend Charles Webb Le Bas the then Prebendary, all the property theretofore belonging to the said Prebend (except rights of patronage) became by virtue of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, absolutely vested in us for the

purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us :

“ And whereas the property aforesaid is not subject to any outstanding lease or grant, but is now in our possession, but on account of its character or situation is unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed :

“ And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said property, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said property, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such property, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable :

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by Instrument or Instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty's reign, all or any of the said property formerly belonging to the said Prebend, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with its appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other Public Securities in England.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the herein-named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ All which we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS by Section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, “ That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own Diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any Diocese, or by the Bishops of any two Dioceses, that two or more Benefices, or that one or more Benefice or Benefices, and one or more Spiritual Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, in his or their Diocese or Dioceses, being either in the same Parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed 1,500 persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one Benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such Inquiry it shall appear to him that such Union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the Patron or Patrons of the said Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such Consent being signified in writing under the hands of such Patron or Patrons, the said Archbishop shall, 6 weeks before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own Diocese, a Statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a Copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation, to be affixed on or near the Principal Outer Door of the Church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such Benefices, Sinecure Rectories, or Vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such 6 weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such Union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage, or Vicarages, into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only :

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Certificate in writing, bearing date the 27th day of February, 1918, in the words following :—

“ We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council :—

“ That the Right Reverend Edward, Lord Bishop of Winchester, as Bishop of the Diocese within which are situate the Rectory of Crawley, and the Vicarage of Littleton, both in the County of Southampton, having represented unto us that the said Benefices, being contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population does not exceed 1,500 persons, might, with advantage to the interests of re-

ligion, be united into one Benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case:

"That on such Inquiry it appeared to us that such Union might be usefully made, and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that Edith Annie Churchill, wife of Joseph William Churchill, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the Patron or person entitled to present to the said Rectory of Crawley, and also to the said Vicarage of Littleton, has consented to the proposed Union:

"That 6 weeks and upwards before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a Copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the Principal Outer Door of the Parish Church of each of the said Benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might, within such 6 weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to us, the said Archbishop, against such Union, and no such cause has been shown:

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Winchester, our Inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the Consent in writing of the said Patron of both the said Benefices, and the copies of the Representation and Notice before mentioned, are hereunto annexed:

"And we do hereby certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for uniting the said Benefices into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Rectory of Crawley, situate in the County of Southampton, and Diocese of Winchester, and the Vicarage of Littleton, situate in the same County and Diocese, shall be united into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Second Lieutenant Frank Herbert Calverley, Royal Engineers, in recognition of his gallantry in saving life in July last. The circumstances are as follows:—

In France, on the night of the 19th July, 1918, Lieutenant Calverley was in charge of a party of men unloading 4-inch Stokes gas bombs from limbers, when he noticed that the safety lever on one of the bombs had been broken and that the fuze was burning. Regardless of personal danger, he at once rushed forward and picked up the bomb, fully realising the disaster that would inevitably occur should it explode amongst the men and horses. He carried it to leeward of the dump, where it burst, wounding him in several places. But for his prompt and gallant action there would have been numerous gas casualties and, in all probability, loss of life.

## APPENDIX.

## TRADE.

The Tobacco trade, that is to say, the manufacture of tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, cigarette tubes, and snuff, including all preparatory processes and including also the operations of storing and storekeeping, boxing, packeting, labelling, parcelling and despatching, and all other warehousing and packing operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above mentioned articles.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Albert Medal for gallantry in saving life at sea to

Surg.-Lieut. William Fryer Harvey, R.N.

The account of the services in respect of which this decoration has been conferred is as follows:—

On the 28th June, 1918, two of H.M. torpedo-boat destroyers were in collision, and Surg.-Lieut. Harvey was sent on board the more seriously damaged destroyer in order to render assistance to the injured. On hearing that a stoker petty officer was pinned by the arm in a damaged compartment, Surg.-Lieut. Harvey immediately went down and amputated the arm, this being the only means of freeing the petty officer. The boiler-room at the time was flooded, and full of fumes from the escaping oil. This alone constituted a great danger to anyone in the compartment, and Surg.-Lieut. Harvey collapsed from this cause after performing the operation, and had to be hauled out of the compartment. Moreover, at any time the ship might have broken in two and all hands were fallen in on deck, wearing lifebelts, at the time, in order to be ready for this eventuality. Surg.-Lieut. Harvey displayed the greatest gallantry and disregard of his personal safety in descending into the damaged compartment and continuing to work there amidst the oil fumes at a time when the ship was liable to sink.

#### THE WASTE OF FORAGE (AMENDMENT) ORDER, 1918.

Whereas on the 2nd May, 1918, the Army Council did issue an Order entitled "The Waste of Forage Order, 1918."

And whereas it is desired to amend the said Order of 2nd May, 1918.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, the Army Council do hereby order that the expression "Forage" contained in the said Order of 2nd May, 1918, shall for the purposes of that Order mean Hay and Straw and "chaff" or "chop" manufactured therefrom, and not as stated therein.

This Order shall be cited as the Waste of Forage (Amendment) Order, 1918.

### EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND- MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 6.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

#### *Withdrawal of Existing Orders.*

1. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 and the East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1918 (Nos. 3, 4 and 5), are hereby revoked.

#### *Prohibition of Movement of Animals out of, into, or within Zone I.*

2. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into or out of the Zone I. referred to in the Schedule hereto, or be moved along,

over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon, a highway or thoroughfare within that Zone.

#### *Prohibition of Movement of Animals out of Zone II.*

3. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved out of the Zone II. referred to in the Schedule hereto.

#### *Provision as to Farms on borders of Zones.*

4. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Zone II. the whole shall be deemed to be within that Zone, except that where the farm extends to Zone I. and Zone II., the whole shall be deemed to be in Zone I.

#### *Movement of Animals through Zone by Railway.*

5. For the purposes of this Order an animal shall not be deemed to be moved out of the Zone II. where it is moved through the Zone by railway from a place outside the Zone to another place outside the Zone without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within the Zone except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animal within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

#### *Offences.*

6. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

#### *Commencement.*

7. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-eighth day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

#### *Short Title.*

8. This Order may be cited as the EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 6).

Whereas each of the Benefices whereof the names and the names of the Counties and Dioceses wherein the same are respectively situate are stated in the first three columns of the Schedule hereto was avoided on the date stated in the fourth column of the said Schedule opposite to the name of the Benefice by the retirement of the Incumbent (hereinafter called the retired Incumbent) whose name is stated in the fifth column of the said Schedule opposite to the name of the Benefice, now we, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in accordance with our Regulations dated the 25th February, 1915, relating to Grants in aid of Pensions to retired Incumbents (hereinafter called the said Regulations), do hereby grant out of our Common Fund first to the retired Incumbent the yearly sum stated in the sixth column of the said Schedule opposite to the name of the Benefice, and secondly to the Incumbent of the said Benefice and his successors Incumbents thereof, the yearly sum (if any) stated in the seventh column of the said Schedule opposite to the name of the Benefice,

Notice is hereby given that under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and will come into force on 1st November, 1918:—

1. The waters between a line drawn 45° (*N. 64° E. Mag.*) and 225° (*S. 64° W. Mag.*), through Crowlin Beg, and a line 270° (*N. 71° W. Mag.*) from Sandaig are closed to all British and allied ships between sunset and sunrise and to all neutral shipping at all times.

2. Vessels approaching Loch Alsh from the northward are to communicate with the patrol vessel off Crowlin Beg; those from the southward with the patrol vessel stationed at the northern entrance to Kyle Rhea, who will give them the necessary instructions.

3. The patrol vessels will display the white ensign, and at the fore-masthead the special flag for an examination steamer mentioned in Part II. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 814 of 1918, and any subsequent republication thereof.

When the port is closed three red balls will be hoisted in addition to the special flag.

4. When the visibility during daylight is less than one mile, vessels are not to pass the lines defined in paragraph 1.

5. All instructions given by officers in command of H.M. ships or patrol vessels are to be promptly obeyed.

6. *Warning.*—Warning is hereby given that vessels disobeying any order will be liable to be fired on.

*Variation.*—19° W.

*Caution.*
