Paris. Aug. 22. The Siege of Namur is at present the great Subject of People's Discourses here; and Couriers p. is trequently between our Army and the Court. The Detachment from the rench Army on the Rhine arrived at Rosroix the 17th, where they were met by Monsieur de Procontal, who was sent by the Mareschal de Villeroy, to condust them to his Army. They write from Thousen, that they shall have 30 Men of War ready to sail by the 15th of the next month. In my last, mention was made of a Sally the Enemy made the 18th, of which I can now inform you more particularly: That day the Count de Rivera, Master of the Horse to the Elector of Bavaria, and my Lord Cutts reliev'd the Trenches. About 11 a Clock at night the Enemy made a Sally with 200 Dragoons mounted, and 500 Grenadiers; they first made an Attack on our Right with 160 Grenadiers, where the Count de Rivera, vinting the Night-Posts, immediately repulsed them; and then miking an Attack on our Lest, where my Lord Cutts had juit

The 23d, Our Batteries continued to play with good Success, making Breeches along the side of the Cohorne, next to the Town, and in other of the Eaemy's Works.
