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Milan, Aug. 12.

OUR Governor the Marquis de Leganes is gone to Turin, to assist at a Council of War that will be held there, to consider what may be farther undertaken before the end of this Campaign; and in the mean time, the Forces of the Allies are marching to Piedmont. They are making a great many Mines at Casal in order to demolish the Fortifications of the Town and Cittadel, which will be ready in few days. And then the French Garison will be conducted to Pignerol.

Turin, Aug. 17. The Imperial and Spanish Forces, as well as those in the Service of the Duke of Savoy, that were lately before Casal, are all come back to Piedmont, except the Detachment that remains there under the Command of the Lord Galway, to see the demolishing of that place quite finished; They lie at present in seperate Bodies, at Beinasco, Rivalta, and Orbassan; but 'tis said, they are all to joyn together at the last of these places, where a Camp is accordingly marked out for the whole Army. The French continue at Diklon, and have fortified their Camp.

Vienna, Aug. 17. The Letters from the Imperial Army of the 10th instant, inform us, That General Caprara, after having taken a Review of the Forces encamped at Buckin, marched from thence the 7th to Futacke. The 8th he received Advice from the Frontiers, That the Turkish Forces assembled near Belgrade, and that the Grand Visier was expected there in few days. The 10th, the Elector of Saxony arrived in the Camp, coming by Water from Buda, and being received at his landing by General Caprara, and the rest of the General Officers, and with a discharge of all the Artillery of the Army; after which, his Electoral Highness viewed the Troops who were drawn out in Battalia; The Saxons, with the Auxilliary Forces of Denmark, would joyn the Army in 3 or 4 days, which would then advance towards Peter Waradin. Fresher Advices from the Frontiers, speak of the Visier's arrival at Belgrade the 9th of this month, but make no mention of the Sultans being expected there. Admiral Assenbergh, who has been at Hamburg to raise Seamen for the Emperors Fleet on the

Danube, returned hither the last week, and is since gone for Hungary; The Armed Barks, and other Vessels which he is to Command, have their Rendezvous between Buda and Eszacke.

Dublin, Aug. 21. Every thing is preparing for the meeting of our Parliament on the 27th of this month. Yesterday was declared the Election of Members for this City, who are, Sir John Rogerfon our late Lord Mayor, and William Hancock Esq; Recorder. The 14th Instant arrived in this Bay His Majesty's Ship the Portsmouth Prize with a Merchant Ship of this place from Cadiz, but last from Waterford. The 17th came in the Dover Prize with the James Yacht Pacquet-Boat from Holyhead, and several Merchant Ships from Chester and Liverpool. And the 19th arrived here the Shoram Frigate with about 40 sail from Whitehaven, Chester and Liverpool. They write from Kinsale of the 18th, That His Majesty's Ships the Foresight and the Rochester came in there the 9th of this month, and sailed again the 13th: The 15th sailed thence the Kings Fisher and the Anglesey; and when these letters came away, the Dreadnought Cap. Cole Commander, was off that Harbour. We are told from Vestry that they are in hopes of sailing the greatest part of the year in the East India Ship called the Henry.

Newcastle, Aug. 23. On Tuesday last came in about 70 sail of light Colliers, under Convoy of the Garland Man of War; and yesterday sailed about 90 laden Colliers under the same Convoy to the Southward.

Pembroke, Aug. 20. The 18th sailed out of this Harbour the outward bound West India Fleet, which came from Bristol with their Convoy, having a fair Wind. The 19th came in the Joseph and Jolly Prize, with the Ships under her Convoy for Plymouth. And the same day came in the Sheerness from Cruising.

Falmouth, Aug. 24. The 20th arrived here the Smirna Factor with about 16 sail of Coasters under her Convoy; The same day came in the John of Dublin, and the Duke of Bavaria, both from Ostend, and bound to Dublin; As also the Apple Tree of Amsterdam for Corke. On the 22th passed by this place to the Eastward about 40 sail from Milford, under Convoy of the Joseph and Jolly; And the same evening put into this Port 21 sail of Ships from Maryland, whence they came on the 12th of July; and near the Lizard, the Crown Frigate fell in with them, and Conveyed them into this Port; and yesterday
