Leghorne, August 29.

The 24th instant failed hence the *Rose Galley*, Captain *Broome* Commander, for *Tunis* and *Alexandria*; and in her Company departed an English Bark for *Tunis*; and the 25th failed the *Rose Pink* for *Naples*. The *Charles*, Captain *Pickering*, arrived at *Messina* the 7th of this month in 23 days from *Smirna*; The Spaniards have resolved to make *Messina* a Free Port.

*Venice*, Sept. 2. Four hundred new raised Soldiers arrived here this Week, and 1000 more are expected in few days, who will depart with the Convoy for the *Morea* in a Fortnight or 3 weeks. The Ambassadors which this Republick is sending to the King of *England*, will set out some time this month.

*Turin*, Sept. 3. The Imperial Cavalry marched some days ago from *Ocquette* to *Pancalier*, where they are now encamped; The Imperial Infantry, with the Troops of his Royal Highness, continue at *Rivalta*, and the Spaniards at *la Veillane*; The Governor of *Milan*, Prince *Eugene* of *Savoie*, and the Prince of *Commercy*, came hither the 29th past to assist at a Council of War, and afterwards returned to their several Camps; The Duke of *Savoie* will go to the Army in 2 or 3 days if his Health will permit it, not being yet perfectly recovered of his late illness. They write from *Casal*, that the demolishing of that place would be finished in few days. The French continue in their Camp at *Diblon*.

*Madrid*, Aug. 30. On the first instant failed from *Cadix* 4 Dutch Men of War, with the Transport Ships having on Board the Soldiers from *Flanders* designed for *Catalonia*; but the Brigadier who Commanded them, died there some days before of a Fever. The Letters we received the last Week from *Burcelona*, gave an account, that the Spanish Forces, Commanded by the Marquis de *Gastanaga*, were marched to *Palamos*, in order to Besiege it, and that Admiral *Russell* had landed 3000 Soldiers from the Fleet to assist them, and had fired 120 Bombs into the Town with good Success. And by an Express from the Camp before *Palamos*, whence he parted the 24th, we are informed, that the day before arrived there the Troops from *Flanders*, upon which, and the Advice Admiral *Russell* received, that the French were fitting out their Fleet at *Thoulon*, he caused the English Troops to Embark again, and resolved to return to the Coast of *Provence*. The Turkey Convoy with several Men of War from the Fleet arrived at *Cadix* the 20th of this month, and would in few days proceed on their voyage homeward. We do not hear that there has happened any thing of moment at *Ceuta* since the 30th of the last month, when the Moors surprised 400 Spaniards that were posted in some of the Outworks, most of whom were killed or taken; but the Garrison in the Town sallying out, upon the Alarm, beat off the Moors, with a great slaughter; On our first the *Maistre de Camp Marin* was killed, with several other Officers; And the Moors lost above 1000 Men; Since which, a Supply of 500 men have been sent thither from *Gibraltar*, and 400 from *Cadix*, so that we do not apprehend the place to be in any danger.

*Vienna*, Sept. 3. By Letters of the 26th past from the Imperial Camp over against *Peter Waradin*, we have the Account which follows. On the 21th of August we heard, that the Turks as they were finished, their whole Army would pass the same and march towards *Transilvania*, having quitted the design they had at first to attack *Peter Waradin*, upon consideration of the great difficulties they were like to meet with in that Enterprise. The 22th Advice was brought from *Tiul*, and other Neighbouring places, that the Enemy had finished their Bridges; That their Cavalry had begun to pass the *Danube*; and that the Grand *Signior* with the main of the Army was encamped near *Belgrade*.

The 23th several Parties were sent out to get further Intelligence, one of which defeated a Party of the Enemies and took some Prisoners, who were brought into the Camp the 24th, and confirmed our former Advices. Yesterday in the Evening we had an account, that the Sultan and the Grand Visier had passed the *Danube* with the whole Ottoman Army, and that their design seemed to be towards *Transilvania*; whereupon another Express was sent to General *Veterani* to acquaint him with the Enemies Motions; And this morning a Council of War was held, where it was resolved, that the whole Army should march towards *Petfch* on the River *Theysse*, and decamp for that purpose to morrow by break of day. This afternoon a Body of the Enemies Horse appeared on the Hill near *Peter Waradin*, to observe (as it believ'd) the strength and posture of our Army; And in the Evening we received the Confirmation of the Sultan having passed the *Danube*. The Letters from *Transilvania* say, General *Veterani* marched the 13th of this month from *Weissenburg* towards *Savarish*; and would continue his march towards *Caranteker*, having secured all the Passes on those Frontiers.

*Frankfort*, Sept. 11. The Confederate Army Commanded by *Prince Lewis* of *Baden*, marched the 8th instant from *Rauchenberg* to *Bruchsal*, having on the 6th made a treble Discharge of all their Artillery, with as many Volleys of Small Shot, for the taking of *Namur*. Our Troops before they left *Rauchenberg* made a great Forrage in the Neighbourhood of *Philipburg*, without the least disturbance from the Garrison. We are told, that the French, who lie between *Wormes* and *Altheim* are going to separate their Army; and that a Detachment of theirs have plundered and destroyed several Villages near *Mentz*, treating the Inhabitants with great Cruelty, and without sparing the Churches and Monasteries; The Garrison in *Garison* at *Mentz* were sent out against them, and took some Prisoners. The Munster Troops that lay near that place are marched to *Gernstheim*, and 'tis said they are to rejoin the Confederate Army.

*Paris*, Sept. 12. The Count de *Guiscard*, late Governor of *Namur*, is come hither to give the Court an account of what passed in that Siege. The French King has made the *Mareschal de Boufflers*, a Duke and Peer of *France*, and on his account has resolved to make good the Capitulation with the Garisons of *Dixmuyde* and *Deynse*, and the Cartel, in setting them at Liberty. The Letters from *Provence* of the 5th instant informs us, That Admiral *Russell* appeared the 30th and 31st past before *Marfeilles* and *Thoulon*, which very much surpris'd and allarm'd those places, though the Weather had obliged him to stand off to Sea again; In the mean time the *Mareschal de Tourville* had given Orders to Man the several Posts and Batteries, and for this purpose, the Troops quartered in the Country were drawn towards the Sea-shore; Such of the Men of War as lay in the Road, were ordered to enter again into the Old Port, with all the haste they could, and a stop was put to the fitting out the Fleet, which was to have been ready by the middle of this month. The Marquis de *Nesmond* has taken and brought to *Brest* two East India Ships, the *Princesse of Denmark* and the *Seymour*. They say here, That the Spaniards set down before *Palamos* the 19th past, and that the 25th at night they drew off their Forces again, upon the approach of the Duke of *Vendosme*.

*Brussels*, Sept. 12. The Elector of *Bavaria* came hither on the 11th, and in the afternoon went to the Great Church, where *Te Deum* was Sung for the taking of *Namur*, and the

the Cannon was thrice discharged round the Town; and the next day his Electoral Highness returned to the Army at Limbecke. The Marschal de Villeroi having left Monsieur Proccental with 5000 Horse and Dragoons between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, marched the 9th instant from *Sinck* to *Boffin*, and is since come to *Cambren*, his Camp reaching within half a League of *Aeth*. We have an account from several places of the New Conquests, or the hard and inhuman Usage the late Garisons of *Dixmude* and *Deynse*, received from the French (before the Surrender of *Namur*) to oblige them to take Service in their Troops, and that even the Officers were kept in the Common Prisons, among Criminals, and Persons Condemned to the Gallies. We have had very excessive Rains for several days, which will probably put an end to the Campaign. Mr. *Wolfeley*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, entertained yesterday all the Foreign Ministers here, on the occasion of the taking of *Namur*, and at Night had an Illumination, and Fireworks before his House. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is gone to *Aix la Chapelle*.

From His Majesty's Camp at Limbeck, Sept. 13. On the 10th instant the Landgrave of *Hesse* took his leave of the King in order to his return to *Cassel*, and his Troops will soon follow him: The same day our Army marched from *Limbeck* to *Boit-Seigneur-Isaac*, and the day following to this place. The French Army marched likewise on the 10th from *Banch* to *Cambren* near *Aeth*, where they continue having their head Quarters at *Chieure*. Yesterday His Majesty took a Review of the whole Army, and intends to put them on Wednesday next for *Loos*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* came hither this Evening from *Brussels*, and acquainted His Majesty, That the Marschal de *Boufflers* had sent an Officer to let him know, That the French King, will upon his being set at Liberty, release the Garisons of *Dixmude* and *Deynse*; And His Majesty has taken the Marschal *W. de T.* at the said Garisons shall be sent back to Loos as the French King has notice of his a rival at *Dieren*.

*Breda*, Sept. 16. The King came hither last night, having left the Army on Wednesday last at *Limbecke*, under the Command of the Elector of *Brandenburg*; And His Majesty will set out again to-morrow morning very early, intending to be that night at *Dieren*, and to get thence in a day or two to *Loos*. His Majesty has given Colonel *Coulthrop's* Regiment to Sir *Matthew Bridges*, before Lieutenant Colonel of the same Regiment, in which Post he is Succeeded by Major *Bood*.

*Hague*, Sept. 16. N.S. The King is expected at *Loos* next Saturday. The Pensioner, and several Members of the States, are gone in the mean time to wait upon His Majesty at *Breda*. The States have appointed the 28th of this month for a Thanksgiving for the taking of *Namur*. We hear that the French have at last thought fit to release the Garisons of *Dixmude* and *Deynse*, having, upon the Arresting of the Marschal de *Boufflers*, better considered the Obligations of their Capitulations and the *Carrel*; By the terms of which, the Officers and Soldiers of the said Garisons were to be Prisoners of War, and to be treated according to the *Carrel*; And by the latter it is expressly agreed, That all Prisoners whatsoever taken either in the field or in Towns, shall be Released and sent back in 15 days by Exchange, or upon paying their Ransoms.

*Edinburg*, Sept. 5. Last night a Flying Packet brought the good News of the taking of *Namur*, whereupon my Lord Chancellor called a Council, and Orders were given for firing the Guns from the Castle, and Ringing of the Bells; and at Night the Streets were filled with Illuminations and Bonfires, and all other publick Demonstrations of a General Joy. The Council have appointed a day of Thanksgiving for His Majesty's Preservation, and the happy Success of His Arms, to be kept on Sunday the 15th instant in *Edinburg*, and a week after on this side of the River *Tay*, and on Sunday the 22th on the other side of that River.

*Blimburgh*, Sept. 8. On the 4th instant came in the *Dreadnought*, *Stirling Castle*, and *Anglesey* from the Westward, as also the *Spanish Alliance* Packet Boat from the Channel.

*Amsterdam*, Sept. 10. The 7th instant Admiral *Almond* came to *Spitsbroeck* with six Dutch Men of War from the *Dreadnought*. There is now no sight of this place between

40 and 50 fail, supposed to be outward bound Merchant Snips.

*Deale*, Sept. 10. The 8th instant sailed out of the *Dreadnought* to the Westward, His Majesty's Ships *Mary*, *Lion*, *Saints*, *Factor*, and *Machine* Fireship, with all the outward bound Merchant men; and last Night came in the *Arch-Angel* with seven fail of Merchant Ships from *Norway*.

*London*, Sept. 9. Yesterday being Sunday, the Thanksgiving for His Majesty's Preservation, and the glorious Success of his Arms in the taking of *Namur*, was Devoutly and Religiously kept in this City; And this day, by Order of my Lord Mayor, there were all publick Demonstrations of Joy by Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and Fireworks. The Thanksgiving was in like manner observed in the City of *Westminster*: On which occasion, the Earl of *Romney*, Master General of the Ordnance, having ordered a Firework to be made in *St. James's Square*, it was accordingly prepared by Colonel *Richards*, and fired this Evening, to the great Satisfaction of all that saw it: At the same time divers Triumph Chambers were discharged, and His Majesty's Foot Guards being drawn up in the Square, gave 3 Volleys of running Fire, the whole performed in very good Order; After which my Lord *Romney* gave a great Entertainment. The night ending with Bonfires and Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and other publick Rejoycings.
