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THE Duke of Savoy is recovered of his late Illness; but has not yet hied a day for his going back to the Army: 'Tis thought he will expect the return first of the Courier that was lately diputed to the Court of Vienna. In the mean time the Imperial Forces, and those of his Royal Highness that lay in seperate Camps are joined together at Rivalta, from whence they will decamp to morrow; The Spanish Trops continue in the Valley of Susa. They write from the Camp at la Marguerize of the 4th, That the Demolishing or the Fortifications of Cazal was almost finished, and all things preparing for the departure of the Garison, which 'twas believed would march out about the 8th or 9th of this Month; they are very much weakned by sixthess and Desertion, most of the Germans having engaged themselves with us in the Troops of their own Nation; and a whole Regiment of Monsferrins being entred into the Service of the Duke of Savoy. So soon as the said Garison has less Cazal, our Troeps that are now there under the Command of my Lord Galmay, will march to joyn the Army in Piedmont, though there is no great appearance that any thing considerable can be undertaken during the rest of this Campagne, the Season being so far advanced.

The Troops from Flanders were landed at Barcelona, but had not yet joyned the Spanish Army, being gone into Quarters of Refreshment. The Turkey Convoy was the 22th Itill at Cadiz, and would probably continue there fome days longer: Several Men of War from the Fleet are come home with them.

Kinsale, Sept. 3.
