Turin, September 7.

THE Duke of Savoy is recovered of his late Illness; but has not yet fixed a day for his going back to the Army: 'Tis thought he will expect the return first of the Courier that was lately dispatch'd to the Court of Vienna. In the meantime the Imperial Forces, and those of his Royal Highness that lay in separate Camps are joined together at *Rivalta*, from whence they will decamp to-morrow; The Spanish Troops continue in the Valley of *Susa*. They were from the Camp at *la Marguerite* of the 4th, That the Demolishing of the Fortifications of *Cazal* was almost finished, and all things preparing for the departure of the Garrison, which 'twas believed would march out about the 8th or 9th of this Month; they are very much weakened by sickness and Desertion, most of the *Germans* having engaged themselves with us in the Troops of their own Nation; and a whole Regiment of *Musferrins* being entered into the Service of the Duke of Savoy. So soon as the said Garrison has left *Cazal*, our Troops that are now there under the Command of my Lord *Galway*, will march to join the Army in *Piedmont*, though there is no great appearance that any thing considerable can be undertaken during the rest of this Campaigne, the Season being so far advanced.

Vienna, September 7. The Letters of the 2d Instant from the Imperial Army near *Betsch* on the River *Theysse*, give this account; On the 27th of the last month we left our Camp near *Peter-Waradin*, and marched towards the River *Theysse*; The 28th we continued our march, during which Major General *Gronsfelt* who some days before was sent out with a Detachment, rejoined us; The 29th we advanced within two miles of *Betsch*, and the Elector of Saxony and General *Caprara* went to view the situation of that place, and the Bridge that is there over the River *Theysse*, and afterwards ordered the whole Army to pass the same, which the Foot began accordingly to do that night, and was followed by the Artillery and the Cavalry the next morning, who all encamped on the other side the River not far from the Town. The same day the Generals were informed, that the Turks had brought all their Armed Vessels from the *Save* to the *Danube*; That they had got together above 100 Armed Barks and Gallies, on which they had put a new Reinforcement of Men commanded by two Bassas, and that their design was thought to be to attack *Tisul*; Whereupon Orders were dispatched to the Governor of *Peter-Waradin* to send 600 men with several Pieces of Cannon to strengthen the Garrison of that place. The 31th we received Intelligence, that the Turkish Army marched to *Temeswar*; The Elector of Saxony held a Council of War, and it being found, that we could not continue our march directly towards *Lippa*, as was at first intended, seeing the Country was in many places unpassable by reason of Morasses, &c. and that besides the Army could not be supplied with Provisions if they advanced too far from their Magazines on the *Theysse*, we was resolved to repass that River, as we did on the first Instant, and pass our selves in our first Camp two miles from *Betsch*. Our Parties brought in some Prisoners, who reported, that the Grand Signior encamped the 31st near *Temeswar*, and that his design seemed to be against *Lippa* and *Transylvania*; This Advice was afterwards confirmed by several ways; Upon which our Generals resolved to march towards *Little Canisa*, and having there passed the River *Theysse* we shall continue our march towards *Lippa*, where we propose to arrive in 7 or 8 days: The

Horse accordingly began their march this day; and the Foot will follow to-morrow. Expresses have been sent to General *Veterani*, and to the Governor of *Lippa*, to give them notice both of the Enemies, and our Movions.

Francofort, Sept. 15. The Confederate Army is marched from *Brucksal* to *Durlach* for the Convenience of Forage; and Prince *Leans* of *Baden* is gone to *Stuttgart*, from whence he will return in few Days to the Army, which in the Interim is Commanded by the Margrave of *Baden Durlach*. The French lie Encamped in two Bodies, their Horse at *Oppenheim*, and their Foot at *Gantersblam*.

Paris, Sept. 16. The Duke of *Chartres* is returned hither from the French Army in *Flanders*, where the Campaigne is look'd upon to be in a manner ended. The Marechal de *Villeroy* was on the 10th Instant Encamp'd about a League from *Aeth*, having sent back most of the Troops that were drawn out of the several Garrisons to Reinforce his Army. Notwithstanding all the Orders that have been given about raising the Poll-Tax, there is still a great number of People who have not paid it by reason of their Poverty; and the Court was for some time unwilling to proceed to Extremities, apprehending the ill Consequences they might have, but the Necessity of raising Money has at last forced them to give Orders for the seizing the Persons and Effects of such as have neglected to pay the said Tax. The Letters from *Mersilles* of the 7th say, they had no News of the Confederate Fleet, since the first of this Month, when they were obliged by the Weather to stand off to Sea. They write from *Brest* of the 11th, That 'twas believed the Marquis de *Nesmond* would go out no more this Season; and that they were disarming two of the biggest Ships of his Squadron, but that the rest would return to Sea to Cruize. The Letters from the French Army in *Catalonia* tell us, they were Encamped the 30th of the last Month at a Place call'd *Balau*.

Brussels, Sept. 18. The Army Commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria* is still Encamp'd near *Hall*, his Electoral Highness having his Quarters in the Castle of *Limbeck*; where 'tis believed they will continue yet some days, and then march to *Ninove*. The Marechal de *Villeroy* lies still at *Cambron* near *Aeth*, from whence he sent on Wednesday last a Detachment to their Lines in *Flanders*. The Count de *Montal* is with 3 or 4000 men between *Courtray* and *Menin*. The Princes of *Brandenburgh* and *Hanover*, who have made this Campaigne in the Confederate Army in *Flanders*, are come hither, and will set out in few days on their return home.

Flageu, Sept. 20. N.S. The King left *Bredalaft* Saturday morning, and came that night to *Dieren*, where His Majesty staid two days, and would go this morning to *Loo*. The States intend to increase the number of their Forces by Land and Sea, for the next Year. The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* is gone to *Cleve*, to meet the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, who is arrived there in his way to *Loo*; after which the Landgrave will return to *Cassel*. They write from *Maastricht* of the 17th, that the *Marschal de Boufflers* was released, and gone to *Dinant*. Letters from *Madrid* of Sept. 1. say, That Admiral *Ruffel* having resolved, upon advice of the Enemy's fitting out their Fleet at *Toulon*, to return to the Coast of *Provence*, and caused the English Troops to Embark again, the Spaniards had thought fit to defer the Siege of *Palamos* till his Return. The Troops from *Flanders* were landed at *Barcelona*, but had not yet joyned the Spanish Army, being gone into Quarters of Refreshment. The Turkey Convoy was the 22th still at *Cadix*, and would probably continue there some days longer: Several Men of War from the Fleet are come home with them.

Kinsale, Sept. 3. The 30th came in here the Exchange of *London*, burthen 200 Tuns, and carrying 18 Guns, *John Breholt* Commander, who failed again the first instant for *England*, under Convoy of the *Sterling Castle*. This evening failed all the *Bristol* Ships, under Convoy of the *Tyger* and *Betty* hired Men of War.

Dublin, Sept. 6. On the 29th past my Lord Deputy went to the House of Lords, attended in the usual manner, and the Commons being sent for up, and having presented *Robert Roebart* Esq; whom they had chosen to be their Speaker, his Excellency was pleased to approve of him; And the Commons being returned to their House; Both Houses resolved to return their Thanks in Address to his Excellency for his Speech at the opening of the Parliament; which they presented to his Excellency the 31th of *August*; Since which they have proceeded with great Unanimity in the Consideration of the Matters before them.

On the 4th instant the House of Commons resolved *Nemine Contradicente*; That they will to the utmost of their Power stand by and assist His Majesty and His Government against all His Enemies, Foreign and Domestick.

Yesterday they passed the Bill for an Additional Excise, and sent it up to the Lords.

And the Commons have resolved to give His Majesty a farther Supply, as well to discharge the Debts upon the Crown (a State of which has been laid before them by Order of the Lord Deputy) as to maintain the Charge of the present Establishment.

This day my Lord Deputy gave the Royal Assent to such Bills as had passed the two Houses, viz.

An Act for an Additional Duty of Excise upon Beer, Ale, and other Liquors.

An Act for Taking away the Writ De Hereico Comburcndo.

An Act declaring all Attainders, and all other Acts made in the late pretended Parliament, to be void. An Act to restrain Foreign Education.

An Act for the better securing the Government, by disarming Papists.

An Act for the better settling of Intestates Estates.

Plymouth, Sept. 10. This day failed hence 6 Suedes for *Lisbon*. No Ships are come in here these last two days.

Deale, Sept. 13. Yesterday in the afternoon came into the Downs His Majesty's Ship the *Prince of Orange*, and the *Roebuck* Ketch, with several sail of Merchant Ships from *Holland*.
