

7. Candidates who appear from their forms of application to be *prima facie* eligible for appointment to the Indian Civil Service will be subject to such tests as the Civil Service Commission may prescribe in the way of (a) a qualifying examination, written or oral; (b) the production of written evidence, including school record, university record (if any), military record, and personal references; (c) interview by Selection Board; (d) medical examination.

8. Candidates recommended by the Civil Service Commissioners will be accepted by the Secretary of State for India in Council as Selected Candidates for the Indian Civil Service, subject to any further enquiries that he may find it necessary to institute, and will be required to undergo such period of probation as may be hereafter prescribed. At the end of this period of probation they will be tested by the Civil Service Commissioners, or by an authority in India specially empowered in this behalf, in Indian Law and Languages, and in any other subjects which may be prescribed, and in riding. They will not be appointed to the Civil Service of India until they have been certified to have fulfilled these tests."

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that an Open Competitive Examination of Candidates for registration as Temporary Boy Clerks will be held in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, and Belfast, commencing on the 2nd April, 1919, under the Regulations dated the 15th September, 1916, as amended the 12th March, 6th August, and 29th October, 1918, and published in the London Gazette of those dates.

NATIONAL INSURANCE (HEALTH) ACTS, 1911-1918.

Notice is hereby given, under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that it is proposed by the National Health Insurance Joint Committee, acting alone and acting jointly with the Welsh Insurance Commissioners, after the expiration of at least 40 days from this date, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Section 15, read with Section 82 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, by paragraph (F) of the First Schedule to the National Insurance Act, 1913, and by the National Insurance (Joint Committee) Regulations, 1912 and 1913, to make regulations amending the National Health Insurance (Benefits of Invalided Seamen and Soldiers) Regulations (Wales), 1918, so as to provide that those Regulations shall not apply to any insured seaman, marine, soldier, or airman who has been discharged from service on any ground other than that of disease or bodily or mental disablement, notwithstanding that such man has on his discharge from service been certified in the manner referred to in Section 1 of the National Insurance (Navy and Army) Act, 1914 (Session 2), to be suffering from disease or bodily or mental disablement.
