Turin, September 17.

THE French have made all the delays they could in the demolishing of Casal, but that Work is now in a manner finished, and the Garrison is to march out on the 19th Instant. The Duke of Savoy is not yet perfectly recovered. The Forces of the Allies continue in their former Camps; and the French at Dblon.

Venice, September 17. We have yet received no confirmation of the Victory 'twas reported the last week the Venerians had obtained over the Turks at Sea; and two Vessels are arrived in Ithria from Smirna, who have not heard of any late Engagement between the two Fleets.

Vienna, Sept. 17. On the 14th arrived here a Courier from the Imperial Army in Hungary, who brought an Account, That they decamped the third from Betfch, and advancing by several days Marches to Little Canifa, pulled the River Theyffe there on the 6th, having sent away their heavy Baggage to Segedin, and encamped the 14th at a place called Aranka, where this Express left them the same day. The Elector of Saxony and the other Generals had resolved to continue their march with all Expedition towards the River Maros, in order to cover the Fortrefs of Lippa; Upon the Advice they had received, That the Turkish Army was decamped from Temiswaer, and marching towards that place, but that by reason of the badness of the Ways, they could not take their march directly thither, but were forced to go about by Arat, which would lose them several days. A Party of our Hussars had defeated 100 of the Enemies Horse, who was sent out to observe our march, of whom 30 were killed, and as many taken, Catana Bassa, who commanded them, escaping very narrowly.

Francfort, September 25. The Confederate Army is still encamped near Durlach; and the French at Guntersblum on the other side the Rhine; and they seem to be preparing on both sides to go into their Winter Quarters.

Cologne, September 27. The Troops of Brandenburg, Hess, and Lunenburg, who were employed in the Siege of Namur, are coming this way, where they are to have their Winter Quarters. They write from Mentz, that a strong Party of Hussars marched from thence yesterday to observe the Enemy, who they heard were going to march from Guntersblum, and to fall upon their Rear.

Paris, Sept. 26. The Marechal de Boufflers arrived at Versailles the 21th of this month. And the next day the Court removed from thence to Fontainebleau. The Count de Thoulouse is returned from the Army in Flanders, where the Campagne seems to be ended. They talk here of several new Edicts that are going to be published to raise Money against the next year, and among others, of one for selling the Revenue arising by the Posts. Here is a Discourse likewise of making a new Levy of Men, to strengthen our Armies. They write from Toulon, of the 14th, That it was intended to fit out 42 Men of War, but for want of Men they could put out but 30, besides 6 small Frigats; And 'tis said they are designed to repairs the Streights: These Letters make no mention of

the Fleet commanded by Admiral Russell. The last Advices from Catalonia say, the Duke de Vendosme was encamped at Wilbat; And the Spanish Army between Blanes and Tordera.

Brussels, Sept. 28. The Army commanded by the Elector of Bavaria marched the 22th Instant from Hall to Lennich St. Quentin; and the Marechal de Villeroy the day following from Cambron to Leuze; and in all probability the Forces will separate in few days, and go into their Winter Quarters. The Parties sent out from Aeth do very much annoy the Enemy, from whom they have within these 8 days taken above 700 Horses and many Prisoners. The Prince de Vaudemont is gone to Loo.

Loo, Sept. 29. The Prince of Nassau, Stadtholder of Frizeland, came hither on Tuesday last, as also the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, to wait upon His Majesty. The Prince de Vaudemont arrived here this Evening; and the Elector of Brandenburg was to set out from Berlin as yesterday, hoping to meet His Majesty here, otherwise intends to follow him to the Hague; From whence several Foreign Ministers are likewise come to this place. We are told His Majesty intends to go to the Hague on Tuesday next; and to return for England as soon as the Convoy arrives.

Hague, Sept. 30. N. S. On the 28th was observed throughout all this Province the Publick Thanksgiving for the taking of Namur, which was accompanied with great and general Rejoycings; and on this Occasion here were very fine Fireworks. We are daily expecting the Garisons of Dixmuyde and Deynse. The Letters from Vienna put us in expectation of a Battle between the Imperialists and the Turks.

Plimouth, Sept. 20. The Turkey Fleet, with the rest of the Merchant-ships from the Streights, under the Convoy of 15 Men of War, passed this day by this place for the Downes.

Cowes, Sept. 21. His Majesty's Ship the Lime, Captain Bowles Commander, has sent in a small Flushing Caper, who was taken on Sunday last by a French Privateer, and retaken on Tuesday by Captain Bowles near Cape la Hogue; On which Coast was Rear Admiral Hopson was with the Squadron under his Command, standing to the Westward.
