UR Viceroy has received Orders from the Court of Spain, to make new Levies of Men in this Kingdom, for Re-inforcing the Spanish Troops in Catalonia and Milan. Confairs of Barbary and other Privateers very much infesting this Coast, it is under Confideration here, to fit out several Vessels and arm'd Baks for the Security of our Navigation.

Rome, Sept. 8. The Pope icems at present tery much enclined to make a Promotion of Cardinals, there being many Places Vacant; The Emperor has named the Abbot Grimani, and the French King the Bissiop of Orleans, to be advanced to that Dignity, but the King of Spain has not yet declared the Person to be promoted at his Nomination. The Cardinal de Feurbin continues his Endeavours to engage the Pope to employ his Offices for procuring a Peace, and has on this Subject had lately feveral Conferences with the Chief Ministers of this Court. We have an Account from Sicily, that the King of Spain has made

Messina a Free Port.

Turin, Sept. 17. The Garison of Cazal is to march our next Monday; and the Troops of the Allies now Encamped near the Town, are ordered to Piedmont. The French are still Posted at Diblon. The Vaudois continue to annoy the Enemy very much with their Excurlions.

Venice, Sept. 17. The Senate having resolved to lend a great Re-inforcement to their Army in the Levant against the next Year, are now treeting with divers Officers who are to make Levies for their Service in Germany and Italy. The Ambassadors of this State to the King of England, continue the Preparations for their Journey, but have not yet fixed any time for their Departure.

Vienna, Sept. 17. We are in a great Expectation to hear some considerable News from Hungay: The last Letters from the Imperial Army, which were of the 7th Instant. telling us, that the Turks, according to all the Advices they had Lips, and our Forces marched with all the Place. Francfort, Sept. 25. The Deputies of the Circles of Francisia and Sustia are to meet here the next Week, to regulate the Winter Quarters for the Confederate Forces on the Roine; in the mean time the two Armies continue in

their former Camps.

Coogne, Sept. 27. The Armies on the Rhine are now going to break up, and to march to their Winter Quarters; The French intend to lodge 10 or 12000 Men along the Moselle. The States of this Diocess are still assembled at Bon, and have resolved to give his Electoral High-

ness the Supplies he Demands.

Brussels, September 28. The Forces of Hesse and Lunenburg began to repass the Meuse at Viser the 24th of this Month, in order to their return to Germany; but the Troops of Brandenburg will continue fome time longer in the Country about Liege, to give a Jealoulie to the Enemy; who, to observe them, keep a good Body of Men between the Sambre and the Mense towards Phillipville, under the Command of the Marquis de Harcourt , and another at Bastegne under Monfieur de Precental, to cover the Dutchy of Luxemburgh. We have advice that 8000 French Horse arrived last Sunday at Bavay, being detached from the Mareschal de Villerey's Army (which lies at Leuze) with Orders to Canton themselves in the Villages between Mons Valenciennes and Maubeuge; The Mareschal de Villercy has likewise sent Detachments both of Horse and Foot from his Army to Re-inforce The Army of the Allies confeveral Garisons. tinues at Lennick St. Quentin; Its believed they will keep the Field yet this Fortnight or threeWeeks, and that they may not suffer by the Weather, Baraques are preparing for the Foot, and the Horse will be Cantoned in the Neighbouring Villages. The Soldiers of the late Garisons in Dixmuyle and Deynse, who were dispersed up and down in the French Conquests, are, as we hear, to Rendezvous at Courtray, and to march from thence to Glent, where they are expected in few Days. We shall have a strong Garison here this Winter. and some of the Regiments that are to compose it, are already arrived. They are hard at work received, intended to attack the Fortrels of at Namur to repair the Forfications of that

Falmauth, Sept. 23. His Majesty's Ships he Joseph and Jolly-Prize, appeared Yesterday off this Harbour, with about 80 Sail, who were joined by above 20 Sail more from hence, being all bound for St. George's Channel. This Day came in a Danilh Ship called the St. John, laden with Deals.

Yarmouth, Sept. 27. Yesterday came hither Captain Anders of London, who on Sunday last, sailed out of the River Elbe, with several other Merchant Ships bound to London; but being separated from them, his Ship unhappily struck upon a Sand near this Coast, where she is lost, but the Men all faved, being taken up by one of our Herring Fishers. This Afternoon of our Herring Fishers. passed through this Road a Fleet of about 150 laden Colliers with their Convoy.

Deale, September 27. On the 25th Infrant arrived in the Downes a Squadron of English Men of War with the Turkey and other Merchant Ships from Cadiz, and this day they all failed again for the River.

London, Sept. 28.
