

1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Milton Abbas aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that Burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz. :—

MILTON ABBAS.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Milton Abbas, in the County of Dorset, and in the Churchyard attached thereto; Provided that in a vault belonging to Elizabeth Marlow and now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed of the body of the said Elizabeth Marlow at her decease, subject to the condition that the coffin be separately enclosed by stone-work or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 25th day of March next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 25th day of March.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of Downing College, Cambridge, on the 25th day of January, 1919, and sealed on the same day, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

A STATUTE to alter the Statutes of Downing College in the University of Cambridge, which amending Statute was duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, and held on the 25th day of January, 1919, and having been passed at such Meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting is now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We, the Master, Professors, and Fellows of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) in the exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby alter the existing Statutes of our said College in the manner following:—

By repealing Statute XXIV., intituled "Of Stipends," made on the 22nd day of March, 1881, by the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of the said Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and by substituting therefor the following Statute, to form an amended Statute XXIV.:—

All stipends shall be payable on the first day of February and the first day of August in

each year. All stipends and official salaries shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly. But the vested interest of any Master, Professor, Fellow, or Scholar, who was elected before the 25th day of January, 1919, shall be regulated by the same Statute whereby it was theretofore regulated. Any stipend which falls due after the termination of the Mastership or of a Professorship or Fellowship, and before the vacancy thereof is filled up, shall be invested in the public funds in the name of the College; but in the case of a Scholarship any such stipend shall be assigned by the Governing Body to some deserving Student of the College.

The salaries of all Officers shall be determined from time to time as the Governing Body shall think fit.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamation, dated the 18th day of December, 1918, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamation, dated the 18th day of December, 1918, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:—

(1) That the following headings should be deleted:—

(A) Aerated and mineral waters, except unsweetened mineral waters;
