Cadiz, September 5.

Orders are come from *Madrid* to hasten the departure of the Galeons, which 'tis thought will be ready to sail in 3 weeks. They are going to Embark here a fresh Supply of Men for the assistance of the Garison of *Ceuta*.

Malaga, September 6. The Moors do still continue the Siege of *Ceuta*; They have at last finished the Line, on which they have been working several months, and have built Forts on the Points towards the Sea-side; but they have not the effect proposed, which was to hinder the Besieged from receiving any Succors, seeing several Vessels have arrived at *Ceuta* with Supplies sent from hence and *Cadiz* since these Works were finished; The Spaniards at the same time are making a new Line about the Place of Arms, without the Town, as also some other Outworks, which they carry on without any disturbance from the Enemy.

Corunna, October 4. By the last Letters from *Madrid* we have an account, that the *Essex* Man of War, Captain *Wright* Commander, with the two French Prizes, the *Content* and *Trident*, which sailed from *Messina* about the end of *August*, were arrived at *Malaga* in their Voyage towards *Cadiz*.

Leghorne, September 19. The *Blackam* Frigate, Captain *Newman*, will sail this week for *London*, and the *Charles*, Capt. *Pickering*, for *Smirna*; The latter is to touch at *Tunis*, and land there the *Bassa*, Brother to *Mahomet* Bey, who came hither some time since, upon the Algerines becoming Masters of *Tunis*, and having remained here at the Great Duke's Charge, resolves, now that Government is again settled under the Bey, to return home.

Milan, September 22. The Campagne drawing towards a conclusion the Governor of *Milan* is shortly expected here, and some Officers are already arrived to dispose matters about the Winter Quarters. We are assured, that the Viceroy of *Naples* has received Directions from the Court of *Spain* to make a new Levy of Men for the service of this Country.

Turin, September 24. The Marquis *de Leganes*, Governor of *Milan*, went from hence some days ago to the Spanish Camp; These Forces as well as the Imperialists and the Troops of his Royal Highness continue in their former Posts; and 'tis believed they will separate so soon as their Winter Quarters are settled. We hear the French encamped at *Diblon*, are preparing to do the like; The Deserters, who come from them, say, they have lost a great many Men this Campagne by Sickness as well as Desertion.

Venice, September 23. The Noble *Francis Zorzi*, of about 18 years of age, was made this week Procurator of *St. Mark*, paying 25000 Ducats towards carrying on the War; 'Tis said he intends to accompany the Ambassadors of this State to *England*, who will depart hence the next month. The Senate continue their care, with great application, for reinforcing their Army in the *Levant* against the next Spring, and have made Agreements with several Officers for the Levies they have undertaken in *Germany* and other parts for the Service of this Republick. The Soldiers now at the *Lido* will Embark in 4 or 5 days, in order to pass to the *Levant* with the Convoy that may be ready to sail by that time.

Vienna, September 24. The Emperor has named the young Count *de Wallestein* to go with the Character of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Brandenburg*, and he will begin his Journey thither in 4 or 5 days. The last Letters from the Imperial Army in *Hungary* are dated the 18th of this month, of which you have already had an account. Orders have been sent to the Governor of *Croatia* to draw together the Militia of that Countrey, in order to make some attempt upon the Enemy. They write from *Poland*, that a Detachment of their Troops had made an Incurfion into *Moldavia*, and had defeated a Party of Turks, and brought back several Prisoners and a good Booty.

Cologne, October 4. By the last Letters from the *Upper-Rhine* the Confederate Army was still encamped near *Durlach*, and the French at *Guntersblum* on the other side of the *Rhine*, but 'twas thought they would both quickly separate, and go into their Winter Quarters; To settle which Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* has had several Conferences with the Deputies of *Franconia* and *Suabia*. The Germans fortifie

esse *Eppingen*, and some other Places on that side, to secure the Country against the Excursions of the Garrison of *Philipsburg* during the Winter.

Hamburg, September 20. The People in all these parts have expressed an extraordinary Joy for the taking of *Namur*; Sir *Paul Rycout* His Majesty of *Great-Britain's* Minister here, gave a very Noble Entertainment to all the Foreign Ministers in this place, and the principal Persons of this City; At *Bremen* this common Joy was celebrated with much Solemnity and with publick Prayers for the Preservation of the King, and happy Success of His Arms; and the City of *Lubecke* have appointed Sunday next for a Day of Publick Thanksgiving on the same Occasion.

Brussels, October 5. The Armies in *Flanders* are separated and marching to their Quarters. The Allies intend to post a good Body of Men along the *Meuse* during the Winter. The *Brandenburg* Forces under the command of General *Fleming* are still on this side the *Meuse*, and the Jealousie they give the Enemy, obliges Monsieur de *Harcourt* to stay with the Troops under his command between *Dinant* and *Gruet*, and Monsieur de *Precontal* at *Bastogne*. The Elector of *Bavaria* has made Monsieur *Vander-Grooten* Intendant of the Province of *Namur*, whither he will be going in few days.

Dublin, September 28. The two Houses of Parliament have passed *An Act for taking away the Benefit of Clergy from him that doth stab another, not having a Weapon drawn*; as also *An Act for Prevention of Frauds and Perjuries*. The Commons have gone through the Poll Bill in a Committee of the whole House, and it is to be reported next Tuesday. There are now in this Bay His Majesties Ships the *Speedwell* Capt. *Wiwell* Commander, the *Pearle*, the *Dolphin*, and *Portsmouth* Prize.

Falmouth, September 30. His Majesties Ship the *Norwich* failed hence this morning with divers Merchant Ships bound to *Ireland* and other parts.

Plimouth, October 1. This day failed out of this Port the *Ormond* Galley of and from *London* bound for *Zant*; as also a *Genouefe* bound home from *Amsterdam*.

Cowes, October 2. A Dutch Privateer called the *King William* of *Middleburgh*, has brought in here the *St. Joseph* of *Nantes*, laden with Wine, Brandy, and Piece Goods for *Lisbon*, which he took lately in the Bay of *Biscay*.

Portsmouth, October 3. His Majesties Ship the *Jersey* has brought her Prize mentioned in my last to *Spithead*, being a French Privateer of 8 Guns and 40 Men.

Dantz, October 4. The Merchant Ships that sailed out of the *Downes* to the Westward under Convoy of the *Warspright*, were forced back yesterday in the afternoon by the strong Westerly Winds.

Whitehall, October 5. Mr. Secretary *Johnston* returned hither yesterday in the Evening from *Scotland*, having been in the Northern Parts of that Kingdom; where the greatest part of the Ministers that had not before taken the Oaths, have now complied and taken the same, in Obedience to the late Act of Parliament.
